



Nonprofit proposes RV park for the homeless in Northwest Austin

The City of Austin has proposed two pieces of property for the Mobile Loaves & Fishes Community First! Village. City staff is gathering community feedback on the two sites before presenting them to City Council for approval.

The City of Austin and nonprofit Mobile Loaves & Fishes have partnered to create an RV park that would provide a home for chronically homeless individuals.

The city and MLF recently proposed two possible sites for the project: one in Northwest Austin near the corner of Braker Lane and Burnet Road at 10414 McKalla Place and the other located near Austin-Bergstrom International Airport on FM 973 and Platt Lane.

"We have proposed to the city for a number of years, 'City, if you will provide us with a tract of land, anywhere in the city—we don't care where it is—we have two requirements for that tract," MLF President Alan Graham said. "We need the entitlements—the zoning, utilities, etc.—to do what we're proposing, and secondly, we need a transportation link or the ability to solve the transportation link."

The announcement of the Northwest Austin site drew mixed reviews from neighbors. Most who opposed the Northwest Austin location cited the possibility of diminished home values, increased crime and decreased urban renewal in the area.

"If the organization is really interested in our community, let's get them when they're young [before they become homeless]," said Ashlee Parker, a Windsor Park resident. "We only have one library and one park in our

Major retailers pause developments in The Domain

Select projects move forward even through weak economy

For years, the buzz surrounding retail developments in Northwest Austin held that national upscale retailers Saks Fifth Avenue and Nordstrom would move into The Domain. While these projects are on hold, other Domain projects, including Whole Foods Market, a 9-acre park, a Fiat dealership and many smaller retailers, continue to progress despite difficult market conditions.

Chad Marsh, managing principal for Endeavor Real Estate Group, said Nordstrom and Saks Fifth Avenue representatives had agreed in 2006 to open stores at The Domain under Endeavor management. When the economy dipped, all parties jointly decided to put the agreement on hold pending a stronger marketplace.

"I don't see that developing in the foreseeable future—we've pressed the pause button on that

but have not pressed play again yet," Marsh said. "We stay in touch with them and hope to eventually bring them to The Domain, but at this time, there are no

Springwoods MUD annexation effective Dec. 31

The City of Austin's annexation of the Springwoods Municipal Utility District and some surrounding areas will be completed Dec. 31, and about 824 acres, once located within the city's extraterritorial jurisdiction, will become part of the city and begin paying city property taxes.

The annexation will end a three-year process and complete an agreement between the city and the MUD, which is a political subdivision authorized by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality to provide water, sewage, drainage and other services, and set a tax to provide facilities and services.

The Springwoods MUD, formed in 1979, is located east of US 183 between Pond Springs Road and Parmer Lane in Williamson County, with land north and south of Anderson Mill Road totaling 468 acres. The annexation will also include approximately 356 acres of non-MUD area to fill the holes within Springwoods MUD and make a continuous city boundary, City Planner Virginia Collier said.

"Having one continuous boundary makes it easier for providing public safety," Collier said, adding that it helps because there is no question of who is in the county and who is in the city in neighborhood pockets.

Residents of the Springwoods area already receive water and electricity from the city, but their police, fire, road maintenance and solid waste services were provided by the county or emergency services district and private providers. After annexation, the city would provide all services.

The MUD could hold an election in May to continue on as a limited district that would maintain the park and swimming pool, provide solid waste services and enforce deed restrictions. The





Business Profile | LiteFoot Bikes

When a friend asked for help with a bicycle project in 2007, David Dennis ordered a gasoline engine conversion kit to fit the bike. A motorized bicycle called a Schwinn Whizzer, popular in the 1950s, inspired the work.

As the slumping economy made working in the bank industry unappealing, Dennis decided to stop tinkering and start selling the road cruisers instead.

"I've always loved screwing

around with things," Dennis said. "I like to take things apart, but putting them back together is sometimes something else."

It took more than a week of constant tinkering to get the machine to work reliably.

"When you put together something for the first time and you don't have an example, it's like putting a puzzle together with no picture to refer to," Dennis said.

Once his first bike was roadworthy, he realized he was sitting on a

potential business opportunity.

"Everywhere I went, people stopped me on the street and asked where they could get one," he said.

Dennis founded LiteFoot Bikes in South Austin in 2008. The name refers to the pedal assistance riders receive from electric motors or gas engines mounted on the bicycle. He moved the shop to Northwest Austin in May 2009 for better real estate.

A base model for a gas-powered bicycle costs about \$700 and can cruise at about 30 mph. LiteFoot is the only Austin company that custom builds motorized bikes.

"We really custom-build bikes that are tailored to our customers," Dennis said. "We can keep

it stock or deck it out with all the bells and whistles, and a lot of customers really like making it their own."

LiteFoot also offers electric bicycles for those who prefer a quieter, greener ride. Electric bicycles cost about \$1,250, can travel up to 50 miles on an eight-hour charge and need little upkeep.

On average, the store sells about 18 bikes per month with the record being 32 in August 2009.

LiteFoot Bikes' sales are poised to improve since the company was recently awarded a contract with the Army and Air Force Exchange Service to be the exclusive provider of motorized and electric bicycles to the on-base shopping center at Fort Hood.

Dennis and his employees are building 25 bicycles to be delivered to the base in November.

"We're finally getting some traction," Dennis said. "So far it's been credit cards and nail biting, but I think people are finally seeing that these bikes are really cool and useful."

At the age of 17, Glenda Bone's love of pets led her to purchase her first pet store, The Blue Reef, in Grand Prairie, Texas. She later sold that store and moved on to other ventures, but the desire to own another store was always in the back of her mind.

"My parents used to call me Elly May from 'The Beverly Hillbillies,'" Glenda said. "She would drag home every animal around, and my parents would call me Elly May because I would be bringing home everything from puppies to kittens to baby birds. It didn't matter; I would drag it home."

Glenda and her husband, Joe, decided to purchase Gallery of Pets in 2006 after the original owners, Marge and Bob Bowen, decided to sell the store after almost 30 years in business. Glenda had previous pet shop owner experience, and Joe had sold pet supplies as a wholesaler to pet stores.

The couple, who also own an aquarium maintenance and cleaning business, had visited the shop to purchase supplies and heard about the Bowens' plans to sell the store.

"It's an awful lot of work, but it is rewarding," Glenda said. "We get to meet a lot of people that are animal people, and usually animal people are pretty good people. They're usually compassionate."

The store features a large selection of bird supplies including cages, seed and a large selection of toys and accessories, as well as the birds themselves. In July the couple added approximately 1,000 square feet to the store to expand the bird supply selection.

"We have mostly birds. We get hand-fed birds that are raised in Texas," Joe said. "We get them when they are very young and we hand feed them. That way, they will bond with people, they are much easier to handle, and they are less likely to bite."

All of the birds go through a process of socialization and isolation before sent home with their new owners. Joe and Glenda put the bird in a cage with another bird and then in a cage alone. If the bird does not lose weight and continues to eat on its own, it can be taken home.

"Once they can maintain their weight, we know they are going to be all right in a cage," Joe said. "If you just take a bird and pull him out of a group and send it home, sometimes it will starve to death."


Along with having a large selection of birds and bird products, the store's big seller is dog and cat food. Most of the food selections are gluten-, corn- and soy-free, Joe said, because it is common for dogs and cats to have food allergies to those products.

'Very few of our foods will have those in it, but we prefer to sell grain-free foods to keep the allergies down," Joe said. "If a dog is scratching, and he doesn't have fleas, that could be the cause."

The store also has a variety of freshwater and saltwater fish and fish supplies, and the couple are in the process of renovating the saltwater fish area to replace the older aquariums and update the space.





Neighborhood Dining | The Water Tank Bar and Grill

On a Tuesday afternoon about a dozen Austin residents relax with a cold drink at The Water Tank Bar and Grill. Some exchange jokes with the bartender—who they know by name—while others play pinball or watch sports replays on ESPN.

Regulars account for more than half of the bar's customer base, co-owner Charles Anderson said, and it is the comfortable and inviting atmosphere that keeps bringing them back.

"We just have a lot of real friendly, neighborhood people," he said.

Anderson and his business partner, Ray McEachern, bought the neighborhood bar at 7309 McNeil Road in 1994. At the time the bar served only beer and had a limited menu, but it has since expanded to a full bar and grill with food items ranging from tacos to chicken fried steak.

The bar originally opened as The Water Tank in 1986. Though Anderson is not certain where the name comes from,

he suspects it has something to do with the City of Austin water reservoir located half a block down the road.

Anderson said his one goal when operating The Water Tank is for customers to have fun.

Neon beer signs cover the walls and big screen TVs are set on ESPN. The bar features multiple pool tables, an arcade room, jukebox and a large stage where musicians play Monday and Wednesday nights.

On nights with no live music at the venue, people of all ages belt out their favorite tunes on a karaoke machine.

In addition to beer and other alcoholic beverages, The Water Tank serves fresh, never frozen, food. Anderson said the most popular items are hamburgers (\$4.99-\$7.99)—half off on Monday nights—and 8-ounce New York strip steaks (\$13.99 with two sides). One-dollar tacos on Tuesdays are also hit, he said.

After a long night of karaoke, customers can come back in the morning for sausage, bacon and omelets. A breakfast menu is served every Saturday and Sunday until 3 p.m.

Anderson said while the food is good, it is the friendly staff that sets The Water Tank apart.

"We just want everyone to enjoy themselves," he said.



Local History | Austin State Hospital

The Austin State Hospital was created in 1856 when then Texas Gov. Elisha Pease signed a bill from the Sixth Texas Legislature to establish the Texas State Lunatic Asylum, which was the first of its kind west of the Mississippi River. Construction on the hospital started in 1857.

The hospital opened with 12 patients May 11, 1861, in a limestone three-story building, which still stands and serves as the hospital's administrative offices.

Through the years, the hospital has added buildings to manage growth. The original threestory building remains, as well as the power plant built in 1895, the main gate house from 1904 and the laundry built in 1911. Other buildings were destroyed by fire or demolished to make way for newer facilities. At its peak in 1965, the hospital had approximately 3,254 patients.

In its early days, the hospital was self sustaining. Patients and staff helped grow food,

and livestock was kept on the grounds to produce meat and dairy products.

After 1896, new dormitories were built and a sewing room, a tailor shop, a bowling alley, a carpenter shop, a main dining hall, a kitchen, a chapel, a dairy room, an ice factory and a female infirmary were added to the grounds, according to "History of State Lunatic Asylum" by James Fowler.

At the time it was built, many believed that individuals with mental illness could regain their sanity in a stress-free, "idealized environment," according to the hospital's history. The asylum was built to provide a "healthy diet, exercise, fresh air, rest, a daily routine, social contact and a kind but firm approach."

In 1925, the name was changed to Austin State Hospital after the Legislature removed the words "lunatic" and "insane" from state institution names. There are 10 other state hospitals in Texas.

While the hospital began as a way to isolate patients from the outside world in the hopes of easing their mental stress, the stresses of various eras still had their effects on the hospital. Throughout several periods of time the hospital was overcrowded and in disrepair. During the Depression, repairs were left unmade as resources were redirected. Later during World War II, personnel and resources were directed toward the war effort, caring for the mentally ill became a low priority and no treatment program existed, according to Fowler.

Desegregation began following the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

After desegregation, the hospital was divided into nine treatment areas, including specialty programs such as the Children's Psychiatric Unit and the Alcohol Rehabilitation Center. Today, the hospital has three large services: Adult Psychiatric Services, Specialty Adult Services and Child and Adolescent Psychiatric Services.

The adult services program consists of eight acute adult admission units, and the specialty services includes a Medicare-certified older adult unit, deaf services and longer-term cognitive

and multiple disability units.

The children's services includes programs for children up to the age of 12, an adolescent girls unit and an adolescent boys unit. The hospital has a maximum capacity of 299 patients and serves a 38-county region for adults and 71-county region for child/adolescent services.



Former Asian chamber leader appointed to Asian American **Resource Center board**

Austin City Councilwoman Randi Shade appointed Erica Estetter to the Asian American Resource Center Advisory Board Nov. 4. Estetter is the former executive director of the

Austin Asian American Chamber of Commerce.

The center, which is expected to be completed in 2012, will be built on about 15 acres near the intersection of Cameron Road and Rutherford Lane. The project will include an amphitheater, reception center, meeting rooms and offices, a Main Street-style retail area, classrooms and a performance hall.

The next planning workshop for the center is Dec. 9 from 10 a.m. to noon in room 1101 of City Hall, 301 W. Second St.

Survey finds Austin residents satisfied with city services

City staff contracted with Kansas-based ETC Institute for an annual city survey. The firm specializes in helping local governments gather data from residents to enhance community planning.

Among the survey's findings presented Oct. 14 to City Council:

- Improvements to sidewalks, streets and police service should be the city's priority, if officials want to improve resident satisfaction ratings.
- Residents collectively expressed the lowest satisfaction for parks

and code enforcement services, which ETC attributed to Austin's rapid growth.

- Residents' satisfaction level with City of Austin services ranks higher than the national average.
- · Austin has among the most satisfied residents compared to 28 benchmark cities with a population greater than 250,000 that were included in the survey.

Council approves items related to WTP4

The council approved several items during its Oct. 28 meeting related to the construction of Water Treatment Plant 4 and the Jollyville Water Transmission Main.

A \$2.24 million purchase agreement to acquire about 13 acres of land at 10900 RM 2222 was approved. The land is needed for working shafts, material storage and a staging space for both the Jollyville and the Forest Ridge water transmission mains.

Sharon Blythe, representing the Spicewood Springs Tunnel Coalition, opposed the item and said it would endanger the areas's habitat. She added that the city's parks and recreation board voted 7-0

not to take action until environmental studies were completed.

City staff said some studies have been completed, but not the specific requests made by the board. Staff said additional assessments will be done once the project is further along in the design process.

The council voted 4-3 on the item, with council members Chris Riley, Laura Morrison and Bill Spelman voting against.

The council also approved a \$36,911 construction contract with Central Road and Utility Ltd. for WTP4 Bullick Hollow Roadway Improvements for the treatment plant's raw water pump station. Left-turn lanes will be added on the road, the pavement will be widened and restriped and utilities will be relocated.

The item passed 4-3 with Riley, Morrison and Spelman opposing. City partners with TDS

for recycling needs

The City of Austin launched a new contract with Texas Disposal Systems for the processing of its single-stream recycling materials effective Oct. 1. The new system does not affect customers or

change how items are collected biweekly through the curbside services and 90-gallon blue carts.

"By taking our recyclables to TDS, we're not only supporting a local business, we're also saving on transportation and processing fees," said Bob Gedert, the Solid Waste Services director. "Our goal is to continue to provide excellent service to our customers, promote waste reduction and increase resource recovery."

The contract at this point is a short-term, one-year contract with options to extend.

When Candice Coleman was 15 years old, she dropped out of school and had to rely on the kindness of friends and strangers.

These days, she owns a house, is attending college and owns a personal training business, Fit4Purpose. The 24-year-old's change in fortune started when

she learned about Foundation Communities' free tax preparation service in 2004.

"The tax center took the burden out of figuring out where and how to prepare my taxes," Coleman said. "I feel incredibly ahead of the game, when I get it all done."

Foundation Communities

offers apartment and duplex communities and support services that help people with low- to moderate-income reach their educational and financial goals. The help can come in the form of coaching, financial literacy classes, grants, social activities and tax preparation assistance.

Free tax preparation is offered to those who earn a maximum adjusted gross income of \$50,000 a year for a family of four.

While many people may not be thinking about filing income tax returns yet, the nonprofit is recruiting volunteers and providing training in December and early January to prepare for next year's tax season. No financial background is needed and free training is offered to help volunteers pass an Internal Revenue Service certification.

Keary Kinch, director of communications for the group, said its staff recruits more than 1,600 volunteers for the tax centers every year and at least one-third comes from Northwest Austin.

The nonprofit's Community Financial Center, 2600 W. Stassney Lane, is open all year and

also offers help with financial coaching, small-business or selfemployment issues and finding money for college.

Prospective students can apply for grants and find scholarships. The Cash for College program is funded by the Michael and Susan Dell Foundation.

Clients can set up Individual Development Accounts that include dollar-for-dollar matching up to \$2,800. Recipients can use the money to start or expand a business, pay for school or as a down payment on a house.

Tax preparation services are offered at seven neighborhood centers open January through April. A center serves North Austin at the Goodwill Community Center, 1015 Norwood Park Blvd.

Linda Paulson, tax services coordinator, said the tax service is the most common way clients enter the nonprofit's system. Volunteers prepared more than 18,000 tax forms this year for more than \$30 million in returns.

"This is not just about taxes it's about capturing the tax moment to education our clients about financial literacy," Paulson said. "That tax return is usually the biggest chunk of money they receive all year. We show them how to leverage that money."

For Coleman, success means having a plan for her two boys, Jeremiah, 4, and Jacob, 2. She has joined every program Foundation Communities offers.



neighborhood. That would be a more proactive approach."

City of Austin Health and Human Services Director David Lurie said the city is still looking at the two proposed sites, and staff has not developed a timeline for when they would go to City Council for final approval of the project.

"The city is trying to break the homeless cycle," Lurie said. "No decision has been made. We are out here trying to determine if [the Northwest Austin location] is a good site."

City staff is working with the two communities to gather feedback before a site is selected.

"It could be that neither site is selected, and we have to go back and look for another one," Graham said.

Community members are encouraged to voice opinions to the City Council, Lurie said at a community meeting. The city could host more informational meetings, but there are no more scheduled in Northwest Austin at this time, Graham said.

Site selection

City staff was first directed by council June 24 to seek approval from the Federal Aviation Administration to use a parcel of land near ABIA for the park or to find a piece of city-owned property and report back within 60 days.

"At the end of the process, after we looked at that, that really was not feasible and was not something that we were going to gain FAA approval for," said Burt Lumbreras, assistant city manager for Community Services. "I think the City Council recognizes that Mobile Loaves & Fishes does some tremendous work in the community, and they work very hard to find affordable places to live for those with little to no income."

To determine what sites in its inventory could be used for the project, city staff used a set of criteria, including the size of the site, occupancy and zoning of the site and its proximity to transit.

Utility connections, proximity to needed facilities, such as health care, and the characteristics of the site, including the terrain, were also considered.

If selected, MLF would have to pay approximately \$5 million to develop it, and enter into a lease agreement with the city, Graham said.

While no lease agreement has been made, Guernsey said there would most likely be a provision that would tell MLF it would either have to share the property or give it back to the city.

The McKalla location is on the city's surplus property list and could also be developed by the city for the Kramer Lane Service Center, which offices different city departments, if the operation needed to be moved, said Planning and Development Review Department Director Greg Guernsey.

Residents who attended a community meeting in late October were concerned with the site being used as a residential development because it was occupied by a chemical company and is zoned for limited industrial. A previous attempt at developing the site led to the discovery of potentially hazardous materials.

"The city remediated the site," said Molly Scarbrough, City of Austin planner. "Most of the site is OK for residential development, but there is a small area within the site that has been marked off that hasn't been tested enough to be OK'd for residential."

Guernsey said the city has already taken care of the chemical issue. He added that zoning changes would not be required because the development would be considered a commercial use, which is allowed under the current zoning.

Creating community

MLF began the Community First! initiative in 2005 to provide permanent housing for chronically homeless, unaccompanied individuals with a disability who have been continuously homeless for more than a year or have had at least four episodes of homelessness in three years.

The program serves approximately 45 people in 40 RVs located at RV parks throughout Austin, Graham said. The campers are purchased by MLF, but can be donated, he said. The Community First! Village, which is a new model for the nonprofit, will be the first of its kind in Austin.

Potential residents must qualify to live

there and be able to contribute to the community. Rent for an RV would be \$325 a month, which would include water and \$60 worth of electricity. The resident would be required to pay for additional electric usage, Graham said.

At capacity, which is expected to be 100 RV lots and 50 camper cottage units, the park could serve 150-175 individuals. The plans call for on-site, 24-hour management, community rooms, offices, laundry



facilities, restrooms, gardens and trails to be incorporated into the park.

"It's a hand-up model to give them an opportunity to heal and rediscover their purpose in life," Graham said. "The goal is to get them up off the streets and integrate them back into the community so they have a purpose-filled life."

Technology Report | IBM, chamber partner to boost small businesses



At the inaugural Austin Innovators and Entrepreneurs Series meeting IBM Fellow John Cohn said he often makes a fool of himself to encourage children to pursue technology careers. Cohn emphasized the ripple effect of the unplanned consequences of innovation.

Business leaders gathered in Northwest Austin in early November to encourage collaboration among Austin's regional entrepreneurial community.

The Austin Innovators and Entrepreneurs Series, an effort between the Greater Austin Chamber of Commerce and IBM Venture Group, held its first session Nov. 4 at IBM Corporation's campus on Burnet Road. More than 350 people gathered to listen to speakers John Cohn—an IBM leader and a former cast member of Discovery Channel's

"The Colony"—and Mayor Lee Leffingwell, who spoke via video conference.

By providing access to IBM's resources, the series hopes to grow a base of innovative companies. The series will offer programs throughout the year for those interested in the technology industry, including entrepreneurs and investors. Area entrepreneurs will be invited to participate in free bimonthly forums intended to provide an opportunity for networking, public discussion and collaboration among technology leaders.

The program is part of a larger effort known as The Greater Austin Technology Partnership, which the chamber initiated in September. The partnership will develop and help direct a long-term strategy for the technology industry in Austin, which will include business attraction, retention and expansion as well as encouraging startups, according to a chamber news release.

The partnership is an effort to bring together industry leaders, educators, entrepreneurs, investors and local government officials to further grow a local foundation of innovative high-tech companies.

Susan Davenport, senior vice president of global technology strategies for the Greater Austin Chamber of Commerce, said about 100,000 people in the area work in the technology industry, which provides about a quarter of the region's overall payroll. This makes technology one of Austin's primary economic drivers.

The chamber's current economic development strategy makes plans five years out, Davenport said. Helping technology businesses flourish is a priority because of its strong influence on the local economy.

"This partnership is a way to ensure that technology, academic and local leaders are at the table as we develop the long-term vision for Austin's technology future," Davenport said. "We're talking about looking 10 to 20 years out."

Barry Mayer, chairman of the chamber's board and president of Tokyo Electron U.S. Holdings, recognized the need for the partnership and advocated for its development.

"Our businesses and our lives are rapidly changing through new technology innovation and its application," Mayer said. "The fact is we are educating our young people for jobs that don't exist today. It is, therefore, critical we bring tech's brightest executives and entrepreneurs to the table to help guide the chamber's work."

Greater Austin Technology Partnership

Inside Information | 'Austin City Limits' studio heads downtown

For 36 years, "Austin City Limits," the longest running music series in American television history, has been taped from Studio 6A on The University of Texas campus, but it will soon move to a custom-made venue downtown that producers say will attract a larger audience and retain the same intimate setting for which the show became famous. "ACL" had its final taping in Studio 6A with Lvle Lovett Nov. 8.

Construction on the venue is to be completed in January. The show announced its new schedule Nov. 19, with the first taping to happen as soon as February 2011.

"ACL" Executive Producer Terry Lickona said although Studio 6A once fit 800 people, its capacity was reduced to 320, and as the show's popularity grew, it became apparent that a larger space was needed.

"Moving to a new space that we could design from scratch and accommodate for more people has been a goal for a long time," Lickona said. "Having a full-time music venue that operates year-round—as opposed to a festival—will hopefully have as much or more impact."

Expanding beyond the city limits

The show, which was restricted to only 10,000 square feet, will expand into a threestory venue that will contain 85,000 square feet of studio space with a capacity of 2,700 people. The venue—dubbed The Moody

Theater—is being constructed alongside the new W Hotel at the corner of Lavaca and Second streets. "ACL" tapings will be intimate, with an audience of no more than 800 people, Lickona said.

"ACL" will operate in the venue 45 days out of the year. The venue will be available for other live music events that will utilize its total capacity for the rest of the year.

"The studio is exciting for what it's going to do for Second Street and downtown," said Elaine Garza, founder of Giant Noise, The Moody Theater's public relations firm.

Going to the rock show

By spring 2011, Austinites will be able to approach the corner of Lavaca and Second streets, see the studio's cube-like appearance and enter a large courtyard with a statue of Willie Nelson in the front. A staircase brings patrons to the first floor of the venue where a bar and public deck overlook City Hall. An exterior staircase on the southwest corner of the building goes up another two stories and provides a view of Lady Bird Lake.

When entering the venue, patrons will see the stage with a large backdrop illustrating the skyline of Austin. "ACL's" new home will be the only venue in Austin, and one of three in the nation, to be certified for Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design—or LEED—which means it follows green building standards.

While the move may detract from the tradition of attending an "ACL" taping in Studio 6A, Lickona said it will not affect Austin's uniqueness.

Days before a taping, chosen radio stations, typically KGSR or KLBJ, announce a location and time for people to pick up free tickets. Tickets do not guarantee entry.

"There is nothing more gratifying than bringing great music to great people wherever they are through 'ACL," Lickona said.



city does not have the authority to enforce deed restrictions, Collier said.

After annexation, the MUD's board of directors would have to call an election and propose an additional tax rate.

"I anticipate that [the board] will vote to approve that," said Gregg Krumme, Springwoods MUD's attorney. "Ultimately the voters will have to decide whether the limited district will stay around or not."

If approved, the limited district would be in effect for a 10-year period. If the limited district does not gain voter approval, the city would provide those services and the city would absorb the MUD's facilities within 60 days of the election, Krumme said.

"Residents and property owners just adjacent to the city limits use a lot of city services and drive on roads that are paid for with city tax money," Collier said. "By including them in the tax base, people [will] pay for services they're using."

The 356 acres of non-MUD

land will receive all of its services from the city. Those residents could continue using a private solid waste hauler for up to two years, Collier said.

Based on the most recent estimates from the city in February, residents with an assessed home value of \$161,446 will see an increase in property taxes and fees of about \$47 a month if a limited district is in place and about \$32 without a limited district. The estimates were completed with the 2009 tax rate. However, the final bill will depend on a home's value and tax and fees approved by the city in September 2011.

Residents will receive their first tax bill including City of Austin property taxes in October.

The city first listed Springwoods MUD for annexation in 1997, but on the eve of annexation, an agreement was struck between the city and residents to postpone annexing the MUD, Krumme said.


"When the district entered into the Strategic Partnership Agreement, they were replacing an existing agreement that just extended the date out," he said. "So the reason they entered into any agreement was because if they didn't, they were going to be annexed in 1997."

The annexation received mixed reviews from residents who were concerned about increased costs. Others were in favor of annexation because of the addition of city ordinances.

"My personal opinion is that most people would rather not be annexed, but I think most of the residents understand that the district entered into an agreement with the city with regard to annexation, and we are moving forward in accordance with that agreement," Krumme said.

The final reading of the annexation ordinance was Nov. 18.

Annexation definitions

Municipal Utility District: It is a political subdivision of Texas that is authorized by the Texas Commission on Environmental

Quality to provide water, sewage, drainage and other services. A MUD may adopt and enforce necessary charges, fees and taxes to provide facilities and services.

Austin full purpose: Austin provides municipal services, voting privileges and taxing authority and regulates land development. The

Springwoods MUD could hold an election in May to create a limited district for 10 years and maintain its own recreational facilities and solid waste services and enforce deed restrictions.

Austin limited purpose: The area has city ordinances, regulations and zoning codes but no city taxes or full municipal services. Residents may vote in City Council and charter elections but not on proposals to issue bonds. Areas must convert to full purpose jurisdiction after two years unless property owners consent to waive this requirement.

Extraterritorial jurisdiction:

This is unincorporated land within five miles of Austin's boundary that is not within the city limits or ETJ of another city in which Austin is authorized to annex land. The city regulates land subdivision with limited authority over the creation and expansion of special districts, such as municipal utility districts. No city taxes are collected, and no services are provided other than land development review. ETJ residents may vote on city referendums that impact ETJ residents.



concrete plans."

The uncertain economy also delayed plans for Whole Foods Market to move from its current location in the Gateway Center to The Domain, Marsh said. A smaller version of the Austin-based upscale market is being planned, but he said the store will not be ready for shoppers for at least three more years.

Whole Foods representatives announced plans earlier this year for three new Austin stores: at Hill Country Galleria, The Shops at Arbor Trails and its move into The Domain.

Plans originally called for a more than 100,000-square-foot space for Whole Foods at The Domain and a 250,000-square-foot, 10-story office building above the store, but the sour economy put an end to the office project, Marsh said.

Whole Foods plans to move into a 55,000-square-foot space at The Domain. Design and permitting work is under way to prepare for construction, which is planned to start in the fourth quarter of 2011, for a projected opening date in spring 2013. The building will include an approximately 115-car parking area underneath the market.

The project will take about 20 months to build with about eight months of that time devoted to meeting Whole Foods' strict building specifications.

"Each Whole Foods store is unique, as opposed to a Walmart that just stamps them out," Marsh said. "This will be a uniquely crafted and complicated project, but it will be a very nice space when it's all said and done."

Residences, park in development

Endeavor plans to open a 9-acre park at the same time it opens its first multifamily development at The Domain.

Marsh said the 300-unit project is in the conceptual phase and plans call for ground to break before the end of 2011, but no completion date has been set.

Marsh expects to complete a roughly mile-long hike-and-bike trail before spring 2013 that will allow pedestrians and cyclists a more leisurely pace than is available on surrounding public roads.

Plans call for arrows and shared bike lanes to be painted on The Domain's largest collector street, Alterra Parkway, which is partially completed and scheduled to open with the completion of the Whole Foods Market construction.

Dealership to open

Nyle Maxwell Family of Dealerships was awarded rights Oct. 21 to become among the first new U.S. Fiat dealers. The former Round Rock mayor and owner of the auto group said the recent economic slowdown presents an opportunity to expand, hire and take chances.

The 6,000-square-foot showroom is planned to open in February 2011 and is expected to employ about 25 workers. Maxwell hopes to earn an Alfa Romero franchise in 2012.

"I think it's a good bet that Fiat is going to do well here in Central Texas and the Austin market," Maxwell said. "Nationwide, we may be coming out of a recession, and certainly some local families have felt the tight economy, but in general, Central

Texas hasn't felt the pain of the recession like the rest of the country."

For the first two years, the dealership will offer a single model, the Fiat 500, but it will be available in 14 colors and will include dozens of options, Maxwell said.

"The Domain gives us the right advantages for demographics, visibility and a wonderful centralized location," Maxwell said. "It's really an exciting time for us to be able to offer this state-of-the-art, very fashionable lifestyle automobile in Austin."
