Katy area hospitals expand to increase accessibility

Facilities continue to bring medical care closer to fast-growing area

Four hospitals in the west Houston and Katy areas are expanding their campuses in an effort to make a trip to the hospital a little more accessible.

"Our hospital is frequently full, and the population in Katy continues to grow. I'm excited for our hospital to offer our same type [of] quality, to expand our services, be able to keep more patients and expand our capacities to population growth," said John Kueven, chief operating officer of Memorial Hermann Katy Hospital.

Memorial Hermann

Memorial Hermann Katy Hospital will open a new patient tower the first week of January with additional projects opening from spring until the fall of 2016. The new tower will expand nearly all of the Katy hospital's services on the first four floors, Kueven said.

"Katy is still the fastest-growing area in Houston," Kueven said. "We're projecting more than a 13 percent growth rate over the next five years in Katy, and we often are at capacity. Our ER is full and our hospital is full, so really in January [that] gives us a lot more See Health care | 19



Boutique brings east and west coast style to Katy

former flower shop in downtown Katy is now a place for fashion. Southern Gossip Boutique, at 5609 Third St., took up residence last August to bring coastal fashion and home goods to the Katy area.

"I like the idea of people realizing that down South, we're pretty fashionable, too," boutique owner Nita Bailey said. "For the most part, when people think about fashion, they think about [Los Angeles], they think about New York, and I want to give [people] a taste of that in the South.

"I love [selling clothes from the coasts], and ladies seem to love it, too, especially here in downtown Katy where I hear it's just different from the other shops," Nita said.

The clothes in the store are always changing, and Nita said they suit different occasions, from date night and girls' night out to everyday attire.

"We like to work with vendors that once they're done with the fabric, they move on to something else. That makes us very different because we have new shipments every week," she said.

The boutique not only sells clothes, but it also has hats, handbags, jewelry, shoes, and a selection of prom and homecoming dresses as well as home decor items and gifts.

The boutique celebrated its first anniversary Aug. 1. With a longtime love of fashion, opening the store was a dream come true, Nita said.

"That's just always been a love of mine," Nita said. "I love putting pieces together. I love working with different textures and different looks and trying something different."

Nita said helping customers coordinate pieces is one of her specialties.

"We really consider ourselves stylists, not salespeople, so when people come in and want to work here at the shop I always tell them, 'I'm not looking for a salesperson; I'm looking for a stylist' because anybody can check somebody out," Nita said.

She said customers sometimes bring in outfits from their homes to ask her for fashion help.

"We encourage [customers] to do that and to do complimentary style sessions to add some freshness to their existing wardrobe," Nita said.

She runs the store with help from her daughters, Alexis and Angelique.

"People come here for the clothes, but they also come for [Nita], and it's so amazing to see," Alexis said. "Her goal is to make everyone feel beautiful and confident and special, so she really wants everyone from the age of 25 to 85 to feel fabulous and I love watching her interact with the customers," Alexis said.

Snappy's Cafe and Grill

Eatery serves homestyle meals and community connectivity

since Alex Tsounakas and Bobby Katsabas opened Snappy's Cafe and Grill 13 years ago in Old Town Katy, the restaurant has remained a hub for small-town chitchat and homestyle fixings.

"We have a large buffet every day, homemade," Tsounakas said.

The menu on the Katy eatery's buffet changes from day to day, but one item is served all week long: chicken-fried steak.

Along with the food, Snappy's is known for its small-town attributes—a place where community elders come for coffee every day to discuss the news and maybe Houston Texans defensive end J.J. Watt.

"The old-timers, they're all here every morning," Katsabas said.

Operating with the values of safety and trust, Tsounakas said he and Katsabas do not even open their own restaurant.

"A customer opens our restaurant. He's got the key, and he comes every morning at 4 or 5, makes some coffee and they'll sit here until we get here," he said.

In another nod to old-time dining, Snappy's still allows smoking, but only until Jan. 1, after which they will allow smoking from 6-8 a.m.

Tsounakas said the restaurant is not required to make the change but wants to accommodate customers who want a smoke-free environment.

"We've got a lot of families coming in with little kids so we have to respect that," Katsabas said.

Snappy's supports its local schools and sports: it lists information about Katy ISD on its menu and displays Katy High School Tigers apparel.

"We're kind of headquarters for the Katy Tigers here," Tsounakas said.

The restaurant even has a menu item

geared toward Katy's hungry high school football players. The Katy Nation Tiger Mania serves four eggs with chicken breast, bacon, sausage, pancakes and choice of hash browns, grits or home fries.

When Katsabas and Tsounakas opened Snappy's in 2002, Tsounakas said it seemed like a good business decision because of the growing Katy community. Now, the restaurant boosts hometown pride with its Katy memorabilia and sponsorships.

"It's where everybody gathers to get together," Tsounakas said. "Everybody knows everybody."

The lunch buffet includes a choice of one meat and three veggies or two veggies and a cup of soup (\$7.75).

Thursday: meatloaf and either sausage with cabbage or chicken with rice, chicken-fried steak (variable)





1 First Street storm sewer improvements

The First Street storm sewer project, which has accompanied construction of a new City Hall in downtown Katy, was completed Nov. 13. The sections of street between First and Second streets and between avenues D and C, is now open. The Katy City Council awarded the bid for the project April 13. Construction crews installed a large drainage pipe in an effort to improve storm drainage downtown.

Timeline: April-Nov. 13, 2015 Cost: \$327,967

Funding sources: city of Katy

2 Spring Green Boulevard roundabout

Construction crews will begin construction on a roundabout at the intersection of Crossover and Katy Flewellen roads in early 2016. Grand Parkway park and ride facility doubles its parking spaces

Katy-area commuters gained access to additional parking space Oct. 26. The Grand Parkway park and ride location added nearly 450 new parking spaces, which more than doubled the location's existing 423 spaces.

The new spaces are considered interim parking while a new 1,650-space parking garage is constructed at the northeast corner of the I-10 and Grand Parkway frontage roads, said Clint Harbert, senior director of system planning for the Metropolitan Transit Authority of Harris County.

The parking structure will break ground in early 2016 and should be complete by fall 2016, he said.

"Ridership growth [at the Grand Parkway location] has been growing for some time," Harbert said.

About 400 cars parked at the location when it launched in 2008, and that number has doubled to 800 per day, Harbert said. Commuters were parking in undesignated lot space, which

prompted the need for expansion.


"We were over-parked. New Quest has been very helpful [in working with METRO to provide more space]," he

Commercial real estate lender New Quest Properties owns the property and will fund the estimated \$21 million cost of construction for the parking structure. A long-term lease with METRO will reimburse the company for the cost of construction, METRO Asset Management Specialist Andrew Buchmann said.

When the parking structure is complete, demand on opening day is expected to be 1,000-1,300 cars per day, Harbert said.

Daily ridership at Grand Parkway has seen a more than 14 percent increase between 2014 and 2015, according to METRO ridership data.

"This is a very successful park and ride [location]," Harbert said. "We're continuing to find ways to help people get downtown."

Four water pipeline projects to keep up with region's growth

The West Harris County Regional Water Authority will allocate \$1.126 billion in bond funding to complete four water pipeline projects between 2015 and 2019.

The water projects will help the authority reach surface water usage goals mandated by the Harris-Galveston Subsidence District. According to the mandate, the water authority must convert the water it pumps to 60 percent surface water by 2025 and 80 percent surface water by 2035.

"To do this takes an extensive program of construction to deliver this volume of water," said Bruce Parker, the president of the authority's board of directors, at a town hall meeting Oct. 22.

The meeting was held to present timelines for the upcoming water pipeline projects.

The mandate aims to prevent subsidence, or the sinking of the ground as a result of withdrawing groundwater.

The first mandated goal for the WHCRWA was to convert local water usage to 30 percent surface water by 2010.

"We have achieved this goal and are currently running about 36 percent conversion," Parker said.

Board of directors Vice President Larry Weppler said the authority has been teaming with other entities to try to reduce the cost of conversion.

Projects include the Luce Bayou Project, which will bring water from Trinity River across to the San Jacinto River into Lake Houston. That water will then be picked up and used by the Northeast Water Purification Plant.

The total cost of the project will be \$350 million, and the WHCRWA's share is \$70 million, Weppler said.

In addition to that project, the Northeast Water Purification Plant will be expanded at a cost of \$1.28 billion. The local authority's share of that project is \$320 million.

Surface water supply project

The project will be west Harris County's primary source of water. The project is 39 miles long and it will be the most expensive endeavor of several water pipeline projects for the West Harris County Regional Water Authority.

There is also the Surface Water Supply Project, a 39-mile long project that will carry water from the Northeast plant to west Harris County.

"It is going to be our primary source of water," Weppler said. "That project is estimated to cost about \$680 million. It will be shared with North Fort Bend Water Authority. We have a 55 percent share in that. That cost is \$375 million."

Weppler said once the water gets to west Harris County, it will have to be split among all of the municipal utility districts in the area, adding about 75 miles of varying sizes of water pipelines. The project costs \$361 million.

To pay for all the projects, the authority will be selling bonds every year and adjusting its fees for water per 1,000 gallons to the MUDs in the authority.

"We're trying to very good stewards of your money and deliver a project that is as efficient and economical as possible," board assistant secretary Eric Hansen said.

Voters in Harris, Fort Bend counties approve bond propositions

FORT BEND COUNTY/HARRIS COUNTY Every bond measure on the ballot in Harris County won voter approval during the Nov. 3 election. Likewise, voters in Fort Bend County overwhelmingly supported all four propositions of a \$98.6 million bond initiative with each proposition garnering more than 60 percent of voter support.

The Harris County ballot included a proposal for \$700 million in bonds for road construction, \$64 million for flood control, \$60 million for parks projects and \$24 million for a new county animal shelter.

"I think all four of them got the attention of voters, and they overwhelmingly approved them," Precinct 3 Harris County Commissioner Steve Radack said.

Voter turnout in Harris County was 20.5 percent, according to unofficial election results from the county. There were 420,970 people who voted out of 2,054,717 registered voters.

The road bond referendum was passed by 73.3 percent of voters with 26.7 percent voting against the measure.


"Roads, transportation, go hand in hand with many issues, and one of them is public safety," Radack said.

The \$24 million animal shelter bond item was also approved by 61.7 percent of voters while 38.3 percent voted against it.

"I think the animal shelter is something that is badly needed," Radack said. "The other one is very old. Now and in the future, we'll get more animals adopted."

In Fort Bend County, 69 percent of voters supported Proposition 1 of the bond with 48,366 votes tallied. Proposition 2 received 61 percent support with 48,116 total votes. Seventy percent of voters supported Proposition 3 with a total of 48,323 votes. Proposition 4 also received the support of voters with 60 percent voting in favor and 48,028 votes cast. Of the 373,832 registered voters in the county, 49,947 cast a vote in the election, which puts the voter turnout at 13.36 percent.

The bond funds address needs, such as park improvements, upgrades to the Fort Bend County Fairgrounds, library expansions and new criminal justice facilities.



Katy ISD considers partnership with Simon Youth Foundation

KATY ISD Katy ISD could partner with the Simon Youth Foundation to help students who dropped out of the district get back to school and earn their GED diploma.

The Simon Youth Foundation, a nonprofit created by Simon Property Management, partners with school districts that include a Simon property within district boundaries.

KISD Chief Academic Officer Christine Caskey said a 5,000-square-foot space has been identified should the partnership move forward.

The Simon Youth Foundation would contract with an

architect and build out an academic setting at Katy Mills. The foundation would also pay the lease for the space for the duration of the partnership, which can be renewed every four to five years, Caskey said.

The district would pay for staff and technology. There would need to be five to six teachers, a counselor and a coordinator, Caskey said, along with a possible part-time social worker.

The district's goal is to get the program up and running by fall 2016, she said.

Houston-area taxpayers continue to cover care for uninsured population

Local health care providers, hospitals learn to cope with state's decision not to opt into national Medicaid expansion

Health care providers across the Greater Houston area are grappling with the effects of an evolving Medicaid program. As the area grows, taxpayers increasingly cover the cost of public care, Harris County Judge Ed Emmett said.

"The Harris County Health System has to provide indigent health care—someone has to pay for these services. Right now, the private taxpayers are paying for it," he said. "If we had Medicaid expansion, that [Harris County health] tax bill could be reduced quite a bit. Unfortunately, the state leaders try to make it seem like part of the [Affordable Care Act]—it's not."

Essentially, Harris County taxpayers are contributing more than \$600 million a year of local property taxes to provide indigent care, said Ken Janda, CEO of Community Health Choice, a nonprofit health plan which provides insurance to individuals across the Greater Houston area.

"That number could likely be cut in half if we did expand [Medicaid]," he said. "Therefore, we could lower property taxes or take those dollars and fill a few potholes or do other things."

Expansion details

The Affordable Care Act assumed each state would expand Medicaid coverage for individuals living between zero and 138 percent of the poverty line—more than 1 million Texans—who would not qualify to purchase a subsidy through the health insurance marketplace. However, the Supreme Court ruled the expansion would be optional by state, and Texas decided to opt out.

While it was initially thought the decision to opt out would affect public hospitals the most, particularly in urban areas, it has affected all hospitals, said John Hawkins, senior vice president for government relations for the Texas Hospital Association.

"I think the reality is, with the high number of uninsured people in the state, and just the existing number of Medicaid patients and low payment on rates, it impacts all hospitals," he said. "Any hospital that is running a true emergency room is going to see a lot of uninsured [patients] coming in through the ER."

In Harris County, Emmett said a Medicaid expansion program would enable the state to draw down federal funds to reimburse the county and private hospital systems like Memorial Hermann that provide indigent care.

"We still have populations that are uncovered because of the failure to expand the Medicaid program, and so that really places a greater reliance on the safety net hospital system," said Dennis Laraway, executive vice president and chief financial officer for Memorial Hermann. "Memorial

Hermann is a very important safety net provider in the Houston community. That's part of our mission."

Expanding coverage

The only groups that can qualify for Medicaid in Texas are pregnant women, children and disabled adults, Janda said.

"The rationale is that [other populations are] able-bodied adults who should go out and get a job," he said. "But when you look at the details, most of them are women taking care of small children or have chronic mental health conditions that make it impossible to keep a job."

Adult males and females without children are not covered under the system, Laraway said. These people end up becoming charity care patients that hospitals are not reimbursed for under the existing system.

"If we look at our [Harris County] population from fiscal year 2015 and the percentage of our population [living] from zero to 134 percent of the federal poverty level that theoretically would have qualified for Medicaid—but for us represent charity care—it was over 50,000 patients with a potential reimbursement of approximately \$75 million," said Michael Norby, executive vice president and CFO of Harris Health System.

There are 19,000 existing patients in the Harris Health System living

between 138 percent and 150 percent of the poverty line who were left without Medicaid coverage and unable to qualify for the insurance marketplace when the ACA was passed, Norby said.

"If you evaluate the total number of uninsured patients in the county, there are over a million," he said. "If you look at our data, I probably see about 200,000 of that million. [Of] the other 800,000 [patients], maybe 200,000 are visiting other providers' emergency rooms and 600,000 just aren't getting care."

Expansion politics

Political discussions about Medicaid expansion focus on increasing the number of people served, but Emmett said the number of indigent residents covered would not change. He said the purpose of an expansion is to increase federal reimbursement.

In 2015, the federal government funded Medicaid expansion programs in other states at 100 percent, Norby said.

"That would've meant, for Harris Health alone, an incremental \$75 million in reimbursement for care provided," he said. "We ended up, in fiscal year 2015, with a \$17 million loss. We would've had \$58 million more to provide incremental care for other segments of the population that didn't have access to care."

Alternatives to Medicaid expansion include waivers and block grants that would enable the state to draw funds from the federal government and disburse them for health care, said state Rep. John Zerwas, R-Simonton.

Zerwas authored House Bill 3791, a Medicaid expansion alternative, in the 2013 legislative session.

"We proposed [HB 3791] to give the commissioner of Health and Human Services and the governor authority to provide waivers [through services such as] health savings accounts, [a] copay [system] and rewards for healthy behavior—things we might see in private market plans that foster personal responsibility rather than an entitlement mentality," Zerwas said.

The bill did not make it to a House vote, and no major legislation was proposed in the 2015 session. A waiver program known as the 1115 waiver did come out of negotiations, he said.

"The 1115 waiver is a bucket of money to invest in health improvement projects," Zerwas said.

Another option is the 1332 provision of the ACA that could give states block grants to reimburse Medicaid programs. Zerwas said the provision would not become an option until

federal fiscal year 2017.

"I see that as an opportunity for states to take greater control over Medicaid—[but] like block grants, you always have to be wary of the strings that come attached," he said.

Private coverage

Janda said Community Health Choice supports private coverage for Medicaid, and he believes the state will eventually find a way to draw down more funding for Medicaid.

"It's much better to have people in a managed system," he said. "They wait until they're so sick they end up in an emergency room, and the person is much sicker than when they would have gone to the doctor."

Hawkins also said the private market route could be more viable.

"I think from a policy perspective when I talk to colleagues in other states who went the private market route, early returns are positive," he said. "For providers, the private *******

"The objective is really to try to get people who need care to get care. We believe at the end of the day that is going to be a less expensive alternative even though those monthly payments aren't going to cover all the costs of the care," said Michael Norby, executive vice president and CFO. "It's still a better alternative than having them avoid taking care of themselves and ending up in the ER for a \$100,000 inpatient stay."

market is a better alternative. I think with private market rates, even under some of these higher cost-sharing plans, you'll have a better chance of negotiating rates more reflective of the costs than in dealing with the state. We argue the private market option works on a lot of different levels."

Whether federal funds arrive in the form of Medicaid expansion, block grants or waivers, Norby said the funds will be welcomed regardless.

"We're faced this year, next year [and in] 2018 with the probability we're going to be essentially capped from a revenue standpoint," he said. "This is all the money we have. Inflation happens. Labor, wages, supply costs, etc. go up 2-3 percent a year. We're going to have to figure out a way to mitigate those increases because our revenue is stuck."





capability to grow with our community over the next five years."

Looking ahead, he said hospital officials are exploring expansion in the new tower on floors five and six in the next five years. Plans for the fifth floor could include a general medicine and surgical floor, he said.

"Katy has grown so much and the hospital has grown, and a lot of people still have the mentality of needing to go down to the [Texas] Medical Center, but we can provide it at Memorial Hermann Katy," he said.

Texas Children's West

Texas Children's Hospital West Campus is also planning for growth.

"We have a \$50 million expansion underway right now, and it's a threeyear expansion," Texas Children's West Campus President Chanda Cashen Chacón said.

"We've just started the second year of that and really the goal is to build out almost all of our remaining shell space that we have on the campus right now. That's really not because we want to build—it's because the community needs us to build."

The hospital is expanding its medical office building space to include ambulatory care and adding space in its inpatient building for beds along with expanding operating rooms and interventional radiology, she said.

In October and November, the hospital opened 18 acute care beds. Eight of those beds are in a special isolation unit, which is exclusive to the West campus, Cashen Chacón said.

By the end of the expansion, the hospital will be an 86-bed facility.

In addition to the building expansion, the hospital group owns additional land on its campus.

"The next step would be expanding building capacity on the campus," she said. "We are trying to stay ahead of the growth curve of the pediatric population in this area, which is very challenging."

Houston Methodist West

In January, Houston Methodist West Hospital will begin Phase 2 of its expansion project, which will include taking its patient bed count from 193 to 288 and adding more operating rooms, among other projects.

Houston Methodist West has been in the Katy area for only five years, but Vice President Peyton Elliott said there was a need to expand about two years sooner than anticipated.

"This campus has been master-planned for a 400-bed hospital campus with four medical office buildings," Elliott said.

To this end, the construction beginning in January will not be the last project for the West campus.

Future phases of growth will include adding 100 more beds. The cost and timeline of the project has yet to be fully determined.

"This is a very young community, but it is projected to age and as the population ages, they need more medical care, so that's another driver of need for increased hospital beds," said Vicki Brownewell, vice president and chief nursing officer.

MD Anderson Cancer Center

Near Hwy. 6 in west Houston, MD Anderson Caner Center is expanding to provide medical services to those who may not want to travel to the TMC downtown, said Kent Postma, executive director of MD Anderson's Houston-area locations.

Plans for an outpatient facility were approved in late August by the Texas board of regents and will be built east of Hwy. 6 and north of I-10.

"MD Anderson has patients who

come from all over Texas, all over the U. S., all over the world, and with over 30 million people in the state of Texas, we know that not everybody can come into the Texas Medical Center. As we've gone out in the suburban markets of Houston, we've been able to attract patients [who] have told us otherwise they may or may not have chosen to come into the [TMC]," Postma said.

The cancer center already has a presence in Katy, including a radiation treatment center on the former Christus St. Catherine campus owned by Houston Methodist.

Postma said the outpatient campus is the focus of MD Anderson's west Houston efforts for the next five-plus years.

"We hope to migrate the imaging services, the radiation, the medicine, the surgery [services] that are peppered throughout these different locations into a campus location right there at Hwy. 6 and I-10, and that will allow for 'one-stop' services."

Houston-area employers, providers prepare for ACA changes in 2016

Two years after the major pieces of the Affordable Care Act were implemented nationwide, health care providers, residents and businesses across the Greater Houston area have adjusted to the changes brought on by health care reform.

However, with open enrollment set for Nov. 1, the ACA will affect more businesses and bring higher penalties to noncompliant residents in 2016.

The employer shared responsibility mandate—which stipulates employers of at least 100 full-time employees must offer a minimum level of coverage to full-time employees—will expand in January to employers of 50-99 employees, according to the ACA.

Concerns the mandate would cause employers to fire employees or cut hours when the first phase was implemented this year may have been overblown, said Tony Nista, vice president of medical underwriting and analytics for G&A Partners, a Houston-based human resources services provider.

"We should give [employers] credit," Nista said. "They understand it's probably more economical to have one full-time [employee] they have to offer benefits to than to have two part-time individuals just because they don't want to pay the cost of coverage."

Nista said most employers of at least 50 employees already offer insurance to their employees with the exception of some companies in the hospitality and food service industries. He estimates 75 percent of employers were already meeting most of the ACA requirements prior to the legislation's passage.

Health care providers

With more than 300,000 residents across the Greater Houston area now insured through the federal marketplace, at least 60 percent of those patients' health care costs are covered by health care providers thanks to the ACA, said Dennis Laraway, executive vice president and chief financial officer for Memorial Hermann.

Laraway said about half of Memorial Hermann's patients who are insured through the federal market-place were previously uninsured.

"That's favorably received by the provider community because we had often been providing services previous to the [ACA] at uninsured and uncompensated levels," Laraway said.

Despite an increase in the number of insured in the Greater Houston area, Laraway said he does not attribute overall patient growth of about 4-5 percent per year at Memorial Hermann to the ACA.

"It's not really as a result of the ACA," he said. "Even though we've seen a pull back in the energy sector with declining prices in oil and natural gas, this is still very much a growth region."

The ACA has not changed the services Memorial Hermann provides or the quality of services provided to all populations, Laraway said. In fact, the hospital system—which already offers health insurance plans—plans to offer plans on the federal marketplace and private marketplaces in January 2017.

Individual shared responsibility mandate

Individuals who opt to not have health care insurance in 2016 will have to pay a penalty when they file their income taxes the following year. The penalty is increasing from 2015 and will be either \$695 or 2.5 percent of their household income—whichever is higher.



Employer shared responsibility mandate

The Affordable Care Act requires employers of at least 50 full-time equivalent employees to provide a certain level of health care coverage to their full-time equivalent employees—or employees who work an average of 30 hours per week—or pay an annual penalty.



Tier 1 penalty

Employers of at least 50 full-time equivalent employees who do not offer at least minimum essential coverage to 95 percent of their full-time employees are required to pay \$2,000 per full-time uninsured employees.



Tier 2 penalty

Employers who do not provide the minimum qualifying level of coverage may be subject to this penalty. For every employee not provided coverage who is eligible for a subsidy on the health insurance marketplace, the employer can be fined up to \$3,000.

OPEN ENROLLMENT

The next open enrollment period begins Nov. 1 for coverage that starts as soon as Jan. 1, 2016. The last date to enroll in plans for next year is Jan. 31, 2016. rose to 305,000 last year, said Porfirio Villarreal, public information officer for the Houston Health Department.

Villarreal said the region still has plenty of uninsured to reach as Texas leads the nation in uninsured residents. Beginning in 2016, the penalty for residents who do not have health insurance will be \$695 per year or

2.5 percent of household income—whichever is higher.

Texas Children's extends services to mobile technology platforms

Texas Children's Hospital is now offering a smartphone app called Texas Children's Pediatrics Parent Advice Center that helps parents

determine the right place to go when their child is sick.

"It's almost like, 'OK, my kid has a sniffly nose. What do I need to do? Where do I need to go?' and so it's helping families know, 'Do I need to go to my pediatrician or do I need to go to urgent care or do I need to go to the emergency center' because we really want to help families," Texas Children's West Campus President Chanda Cashen Chacón said.

The app helps parents find

treatment centers within the hospital's system and allows access to MyChart, an app that acts as a patient portal for access to medical records.

Cashen Chacón said Texas Children's is also working on concepts for other apps.

"We also have started piloting an app that families use when they come into our operating room here where it helps them see where their child is in the process," she said.





Memorial Hermann Convenient Care Center

In June, Memorial Hermann opened a 24-hour emergency room and comprehensive medical care center at the corner of the Grand Parkway and the Westpark Tollway. The 30,000-square-foot center features 24-7 emergency care, physical and occupational therapy services and sports medicine and rehabilitation. Specialists are on staff, along with lab and imaging services.



Urgent Clinics Medical Care

Urgent care clinics have opened up across the Katy area in recent years, including Urgent Clinics Medical Care on the Grand Parkway near the intersection of I-10. The facility provides prevention and wellness services, in addition to orthopedic care and general medical care. Other clinics with locations in the area include Optum Clinic and Urgent Care, Next Level Urgent Care, MedSpring Urgent Care and First Choice ER.

FREESTANDING ERs vs. HOSPITAL-BASED ERs

Freestanding emergency centers are required to provide the same level of service as hospital-based emergency rooms with the exception of trauma care. All ERs must operate 24 hours a day and have physicians on-site at all times.

What are the most popular aspects of your wellness program?

Our most popular [initiative] has been the integration of fitness devices. We entered into a partnership with Fitbit that allowed us to subsidize the cost of the devices to our employees and spouses. About 60 percent of our employees have purchased a device so far.



HEALTH INSURANCE TERMS AND DEFINITION



IN NETWORK/OUT OF NETWORK

Exclusive provider organization (EPO): A type of plan where claims are only covered if a health care provider is within the plan's network.

Health maintenance organization (HMO): A type of plan that limits the insurance coverage to health care providers who work for the organization. The plan will typically not cover out-of-network providers.

Preferred provider organization (PPO): A type of plan where health care providers contract with an insurance provider to create a network. Health care providers outside the network can also be used but will cost more than an in-network provider.

TH INSURANCE ACCOUNT

Health savings account: A medical savings account for individuals enrolled in a high deductible health plan (HDHP). Funds in the account are deducted from an employee's paycheck before taxes and are eligible for certain medical expenses. Funds roll over from year to year if unused.



Flexible spending account: An account set up through an employer to set aside pretax wages to pay for out-of-pocket medical expenses. Funds can be used to cover costs, such as copays and qualifying prescription drugs. Unlike an HSA, funds from an FSA do not roll over from year to year.



Health reimbursement account: Employer-funded group health plans that can be used to reimburse employees for certain medical expenses up to a certain amount each year. Unlike an HSA, health reimbursement accounts do not use employee money to pay expenses.

HEALTH CARE PLANS AND COVERAGE

Qualifying life event: A life change that can open a special enrollment period, which allows individuals to make changes to existing insurance plans. For example, adding a new spouse or child to a plan. Typically, the special enrollment period spans 30 days.

High deductible health plan (HDHP): A plan with a higher deductible than other health plans that is usually combined with an HSA or HRA to help pay for out-of-pocket medical expenses.

Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act (COBRA): A federal law that allows individuals to temporarily keep health coverage after loss of employment, loss of coverage as a dependent or other qualifying life events.

Health insurance marketplace: A state- or federal governmentrun resource where individuals and small businesses can research health insurance options, compare costs and enroll in coverage. Plans in the heath insurance marketplace are sorted into four categories based on the percentage of essential health care costs covered. Costs vary between health plans.

HEALTH PLAN CATEGORIES PLATINUM: 90 PERCENT **GOLD**: 80 PERCENT

SILVER: 70 PERCENT BRONZE: 60 PERCENT


Deductible: The amount an individual pays before a health insurance provider begins coverage.

Claim: A request for payment sent to an insurance provider from a patient or a health care provider.

Copay: A fixed amount an individual pays for a health care service, like a doctor's appointment, through insurance.

Out-of-pocket costs: Medical expenses that are not covered through insurance. This can include copays and deductibles.



Chanda Cashen Chacón

President, Texas Children's Hospital West Campus

Chanda Cashen Chacón has been with Texas Children's Hospital for 13 years and began serving as president of the West Campus in January.

A native Texan, she came to the hospital system after attending graduate school at Yale University. She said she began her career with Texas Children's Hospital as an administrative fellow. Before moving to West Campus, she was involved in outpatient operations in the Texas Medical Center as well as its pharmacy, Heart Center and Fetal Center.

Her pursuit of a career in health care stemmed from a bad experience in adult medical settings when she was a child, Cashen Chacón said. At age 11 she was in a car accident that left her temporarily unable to walk. She relied on a wheelchair and was in chronic pain, she said. For two years medical professionals

could not figure out what was wrong.

Her family eventually found an orthopedic surgeon who was good at working with children. He brought two Shetland sheepdogs to her first appointment and spoke directly to her, Cashen Chacón said. He also correctly diagnosed and treated her cracked vertebral discs.

That experience changed her life trajectory, and she pursued a career in health care because she did not want another family to go through the negative hospital visits her family had experienced, she said.

Cashen Chacón said the West Campus facility is working to stay ahead of the area's growth curve. She cites expanded specialty care, including sports medicine and a new pediatric special isolation unit, as ways the hospital is meeting the needs of Katy-area families.



Why did Texas Children's Hospital decide to build in west **Houston?**

We look at where the pediatric market is. We really want to build infrastructure close to families and where they live. Houston's gotten so large and it takes a lot of time to travel [to the main campus], and the patient experience for us is key.

Why would parents choose pediatric care over a traditional hospital?

It's really for [the] unique training we have in dealing with children. We always say, 'Kids aren't just small adults.' When you walk in, when you see what [the hospital] looks like, we have personnel who are trained to help children and their families and

their siblings understand what's going to happen. They're called child-life specialists, and those employees really focus on how children learn and experience [events] and they help make it less scary.

What specialties are unique to the West Campus?


The one that comes to mind is the special isolation unit. By far that is probably the most unique service that we provide here that will not be replicated anywhere else in our system. Another service that is really the hub here right now is sports medicine. We provide that service all over the Houston market, [and] we've invested quite a bit [in Katy] because there are a lot of kids out here.

What are a few examples of why a child might require a stay at the isolation unit?

You may have heard about the outbreak of [Middle East respiratory syndrome] and also hemorrhagic fever, Marburg [virus], [or] Lassa [fever]. Those would be really serious pathogens [for which] we would call in our specially trained team. If we had a measles outbreak here like we saw in California [earlier this year], we could cohort those patients and keep them safe, our employees safe and other patients here safe as well. Also with different strains of the flu—which are really a lot more prevalent than any of the special pathogens—that would be an ideal patient to have in this unit.

Do vou work with your neighbor **Houston Methodist?**

Texas Children's and Baylor College of Medicine manage their NICU at Methodist West and across the [Houston] system, so we have really strong alignment both in partnership and in how we care for patients. We just opened a helipad here. It's the first helipad in the [Texas Children's] system. [Houston] Methodist West next door also has a helipad, and so we've had really good partnership discussions. If something happens to our helipad or if something happens with theirs, we will work together to say, 'OK, land over here. Land over there,' because it's the right thing to do and with families and patients, we don't want it to be confusing. We partner to do the right thing for our families.

Health care providers target a growing Cypress population

CY-FAIR As people continue moving to Cypress, health care providers are doing everything they can to keep up with growing demand for services.

Providers, such as Memorial Hermann Health System, Houston Methodist Hospital System and North Cypress Medical Center, have been targeting master-planned communities along the Grand Parkway in their expansion efforts. At the same time, developers are dedicating parts of commercial projects to medical office buildings.

"The evidence was overwhelming that we needed to have a presence out in Cypress," said Scott Barbe, CEO of the Memorial Hermann Cypress Hospital under construction near Fairfield.

The Memorial Hermann Hospital is the largest project underway in Cypress, consisting of an 80-bed acute care hospital, a 45,000-square-foot convenient care center and 125,000 square feet of medical office space.

The development of hospital satellite centers and independent emergency centers are also addressing needs in the growing community, said Leslie Martone, president of the Cy-Fair Houston Chamber of Commerce.

Barbe said the convenient care center will include a sports medicine and

rehabilitation center, physical therapy treatment and a MD Anderson Breast Screening Center. It will cater to patients in emergency and nonemergency situations.

Master-planned communities in the area are keeping demand for health care services in mind as they develop retail projects. Plans for the Lakeland Village Center in Bridgeland include medical office space. In addition, the first wave of tenants at the Boardwalk at Towne Lake includes a 10,000-square-foot Texas Children's pediatrics office, making it one of the larger tenants.

Mischer Investments, the Cypress



Creek Lakes developer, brought health care tenants to the Shops at Cypress Creek Lakes, including a Cy-Fair Medical Group location. More health care tenants could also come to a development at Tuckerton and Fry roads, said Randy Corson, Mischer's vice president of residential development.



Average price of homes sold Oct. 2014 vs. Oct. 2015




