It has been eight years since Plano voters approved Plano ISD's last bond package. Now, they will weigh in on the district's proposed \$481 million bond package

The PISD board of trustees appointed a 29-member facilities and technology task force in August to come up with a plan and proposal for the bond package that would meet current and expected needs of its schools.

The bond package is divided into eight categories: renovations and upgrades, fine arts, technology, classroom and program capacity expansion, early childhood education, safety and security, buses and athletics. The bond package will be voted on in a single proposition.

PISD officials said the bond package, if passed, would not raise the district's current tax rate of See Bond package | 24

Road projects prep city for growth

When Eiko Christian opened Rifle Gear at Windhaven Parkway and the Dallas North Tollway in Plano last April, she and her husband were looking for an ideal spot to grow their business.

Although nearby road construction has posed difficulties for Christian's employees and customers, the California native said these projects are a necessary evil for accommodating the growth

taking place in Plano.


To Christian, expanding the DNT by one lane in both directions may not be enough, however.







Expert helps taxpayers understand the IRS

fter working in accounting as a college graduate for a few months, Regina Resch-Schneidewent said she realized she did not want to simply add and subtract numbers for a living. She said she wanted to help people understand the complex world of taxes.

So Regina decided to pursue the highest degree of education and became a U. S. Tax Court Practitioner counsel, licensed by the U.S. Tax

Court. She said there are about 850 of these federally licensed tax attorneys in the country with her credentials and only three in the state of Texas.

Originally

based in Washington, D.C., Tax Facts has practicing tax court attorneys who help both businesses and individuals in financial management, tax preparation and planning. The company also provides state and federal representation in tax-related matters across the country.

Regina and her husband, Mark Schneidewent, own and run the company's south office at 5164 Village Creek Drive, Ste. 200, in Plano. She and Mark, who serves as the operations director, serve clients from throughout the U.S. with a focus on the southern region and the Dallas-Forth Worth area.

"We are here to help the taxpayers understand the underlying situation: what were their responsibilities? What are their responsibilities in the future? What transpired? How can it be fixed? How can it be resolved?" Regina said.

About 70 percent of her clients are business owners and corporations seeking representation in federal tax court. Regina is also an enrolled agent by the U.S. Treasury.

"We don't give a false impression that their tax will be released down to zero--that they would have to pay nothing," Regina said. "We explain

> things to them the realistic laws and what can be done to help them."

Many times people ignore the letters they receive in the mail from the

Internal Revenue Service. Once the pile gets larger, they realize they need help from an expert in filing their taxes or rectifying an error on their previous tax claims, Regina said.

"It depends on how many notices they threw in the drawer before they contacted us," Mark said. "A lot of people let those [letters] pile up."

Many business owners and individuals also seek a tax attorney when their reduction claims do not line up with their expenses. Often, business owners do not have all of the receipts to substantiate a claim and the IRS starts sending them notices. Regina advises everyone to keep a meticulous record of all expenses they are planning to claim as deductions, such as mileage, meals and office

supplies.

A line item on a bank statement is not enough proof, she said. Saving a scanned copy of itemized bills on one's computer can be the proof the IRS needs in case of an investigation.

"This happens very frequently with businesses. They lack the appropriate records to substantiate their expenses," she said.

Regina said her aim is to simplify the complex tax codes a taxpayer is expected to know, understand and follow. Given the thousands of pages of code, however, taxpayers can become

intimidated and are often ill-equipped to handle a financial crisis created as a result of misinformation, she said.

Getting the right help from an expert can help reduce the penalties associated with erroneous reduction claims, Regina said.

"These are also things that people don't just talk about. People don't sit at a restaurant table and discuss, 'Hey! I have IRS tax problems," she said. "If people talk[ed] about it, they would learn much more and enhance their understanding and help their family [and] friends."

Coconut's Fish Cafe

Family brings Hawaiian flavor to Plano

ather and son duo Tim and Nathan Brasher wanted to bring the flavor of Hawaiian seafood to Plano when they opened Coconut's Fish Cafe at Preston Park Village, 1900 Preston Road, Ste. 329, Plano, in 2015.

Tim traveled to Maui, Hawaii where the original Coconut's Fish Cafe is based—to learn more about the recipes and find a way to tailor

the fast-casual seafood concept to Plano's current dining landscape.

"We went out to Maui, visited the restaurant [and] really

came to love the fact that it was fresh, healthy and a little different," he said.

With wooden tables in the shape of surfboards and a spacious outdoor patio, the cafe covers a space of about 2,700 square feet. Tim also wanted to start a business that would involve his son, Nathan.

The signature fish tacos served at Coconut's Fish Cafe feature grilled chunks of fresh fish, such as mahimahi or ono, with cheese, red salsa, diced tomatoes and mango salsa on two white tortillas. Given the size of the tacos, Nathan said he and his staff members always encourage guests to eat them with their hands rather than using a knife and fork.

"That's how you taste all the flavors," he said.

Executive Chef Eric Lea joined the Brashers and draws from his experience working in kitchens in Las Vegas and Miami to ensure the quality of the food is maintained at Coconut's Fish Cafe, where most of the ingredients come from Hawaii.

"The emphasis is on fresh and healthy food. All the fish is handline caught out of Maui, Hawaii," Lea said. "All of the ingredients we use ... they all come from Hawaii so they have a different kind of flavor profile."

Staff members at the cafe cut fresh

fish and veggies and prepare the restaurant's variety of sauces for the day, Nathan said. Tim said his customers expect

a different level of service and quality from a fast-casual restaurant like Coconut's.

In addition, the Brashers decided to reduce their prices in January in order to meet their guests' expectations.

"We don't have the overhead costs that some of the full-service restaurants do," he said.

For Nathan, working with family helps him instill the same level of trust and familiarity among his employees. Tim said his son works about 70 hours a week, if need be, and keeps the other staff members motivated about their work as well.

"I have always loved going out and trying new food," Nathan said. "This is a great opportunity for me to learn something new and get entrenched in a different world that I hadn't been in and take advantage of that and learn all that I could."




New project

1 Preston Road improvements The projects to add double left-turn lanes on the northbound and southbound sides of A Preston Road at Spring Creek Parkway and B Parker Road are nearing completion. Various lane closures will continue to take place as construction crews finish lane creation and realign the existing lanes. Expected completion for both projects is mid-to-late May.

The design phase is 90 percent complete for a project to improve the intersections at 15th Street and Municipal Avenue and 15th Street and K Avenue. The project also includes spot repairs to the brick pavement along 15th Street through Historic Downtown Plano. Work is expected to begin in May.

Heritage Creekside spurs business development along Plano Parkway

A mix of development from housing to health care is taking shape along Plano Parkway between Coit Road and K Avenue as a result of the 156-acre, \$900 million mixed-use project—Heritage Creekside—under construction nearby.

"This area includes a few of the remaining large undeveloped commercial properties in Plano," said Eric Hill, development review manager for the city of Plano's Planning Department. "This area is attractive because of the large greenfield properties [that] have good access and visibility to [the President] George Bush [Turnpike]."

Located at the southwest corner of Plano Parkway and Alma Drive, Heritage Creekside will add more than 400 mixed-use apartments, lofts, townhomes and single-family homes to Plano's east side. The first phase of the project, which includes 327 multifamily units, has begun and is expected to be complete by the end of

the year, Hill said.

The development by Rosewood Property Company of Dallas will also feature 127 single-family homes, 2.3 million square feet of office space, three restaurants, limited retail and a 15-story hotel. Rosewood has owned

the land for roughly 40 years and was waiting for the right opportunity before solidifying any plans, Rosewood Property President

Bill Flaherty said. Up until 2014, the property was zoned for dense office space. Flaherty submitted a rezoning request that year and learned city planners were working to create a new urban mixed-use zoning ordinance at the time. The ordinance was approved by the City Council last May.

"It was my contention that if we were granted [the urban mixed-use] zoning we would lead the start of a renaissance for eastern Plano," he said. "There is a lack of quality development in central and east Plano."

Austin developer 5C Memory Care is building a new memory care center at Plano Parkway's vacant creekside property. Located across the street from Heritage Creekside, the center will provide professional care, pro-

grams and activities to individuals suffering from dementia and Alzheimer's disease. The facility, named Bader House at Pit-

man Creek, was named after a World War II British flying ace.

The 11,000-square-foot facility will feature 24 private rooms and will open this fall. The company chose Plano—and Plano Parkway in particular—for its diverse population as well as its proximity to new mixed-use

developments, such as CityLine in Richardson and Heritage Creekside, said Brad Laughlin, managing partner for 5C Memory Care.

The company also plans to build a second facility next door.

"Our goal is to locate in areas where we've got our target audience of 65 [years of age] and up and we also wanted to be in an area with adult children," Laughlin said. "It's in a really good location demographically."

Another newcomer to the Plano Parkway corridor is the Shri Shirdi Sai Baba Temple of DFW. The temple, which has been at 2109 W. Parker Road, Ste. 212, since 2003, bought the land in 2011. The 17,600-square-foot temple is expected to be complete by the end of December.

"We have wanted to build this temple for the entire DFW community. One of the reasons why we chose Plano Parkway is because a lot of cities like Frisco [and] McKinney are growing north of Dallas," said Gopal Narra, a member of the temple's board of directors. "[The city of] Plano is so cooperative with the building permits and [is] very good with promoting diverse cultures in Plano."

New Growth

As mixed-use development Heritage Creekside begins to take shape, other businesses are working to expand along Plano Parkway on some of Plano's remaining vacant commercial land. Many of these developments are expected to be complete by the end of this year.

Trustees approve new boundary changes

PLANO The Plano ISD board of trustees at a March 1 regular meeting agreed to change its attendance boundaries for Brinker, Aldridge and Mendenhall elementary schools beginning in August. The changes were made to prepare for future enrollment and to ensure that the students move smoothly from one school to the next in the feeder pattern, according to district officials.

"The value in that realignment was not only moving students out of the campus that was at capacity but also moving them out of the feeder pattern altogether," board President Nancy said.

Since this realignment is conducted to address capacity challenges in the future, the board voted to let these students stay in their present school as long as they are able to

provide their own transportation. New students must adhere to the new boundary lines. Public input sessions on the affected campuses will be held before the transition to help families prepare for the change in the upcoming school year.

Students living in the area surrounded by Preston Road, Spring Creek Parkway, Parkwood Boulevard and the northern boundary of Plano ISD will move from Brinker Elementary School to Haun Elementary School. As far as realigning of boundaries for students at Mendenhall Elementary School is concerned, the area enclosed by the Dallas Area Rapid Transit rail, Plano Parkway, Jupiter Road and Renner Road will be moved to Forman Elementary School. Collin College raising tuition to grow workforce programs

COLLIN COUNTY Collin College students will see an increase to their tuition beginning in fall 2016.

The Collin College board of trustees unanimously approved the increase during the Feb. 23 board meeting. There will be an increase of \$3 per credit hour for in-district students and a \$5 increase per credit hour for out-of-district and out-of-state/out-of-country students effective fall 2016. Collin College President Neil Matkin said the increase is expected to generate nearly \$2 million in additional revenue during fiscal year

2016-17. The tuition rates will increase from \$39 to \$42 per hour. The additional revenue will help in the expansion of workforce programs and support the additional student services planned as part of the quality enhancement plan required for the regional Southern Association of Colleges and Schools accreditation.

The last time Collin College increased tuition was in 2014. Matkin said he and the board expect tuition to increase again in the next five years as the county continues to grow in both scope and population.

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Arts District Comes to Life with Opening of McCall Plaza

owntown Plano features a vibrant mix of residential spaces, performing arts, galleries, event venues, unique shops and restaurants. All are nestled in or near the familiar historic buildings, convenient DART rail, beautiful Haggard Park and unique Interurban Railway Museum.

"The community in the Downtown Plano Arts District is really seeing a renaissance," said City of Plano Administrator of Arts, Culture & Heritage Michelle Hawkins. "The downtown merchants, the local arts groups, the neighbors and the City all want this funky, inspiring area to be recognized, and McCall Plaza is another aspect that is helping that vision."

Slightly larger than half an acre, the newly-revamped McCall Plaza is designed as a flexible outdoor space with a covered stage designed for musical performances. The venue is ideally located among the various bars and shops in the area and is in immediate walking distance from the DART's Downtown Plano Station.

"This is the perfect venue for intimate outdoor concerts in a vibrant downtown setting," said Hawkins.

McCall Plaza construction started last year and is soon to be completed. The featured stage is unique because it can be used from two sides. If performing talent is facing 15th Street, an audience of 150 can be served. If the talent is facing 14th street (which would require the closing of the adjoining parking lot), a standing-room crowd of more than 1,000 people can view the stage.

McCall Plaza is part of the expansion of the arts vision in Historic Downtown Plano. The plaza is named for former Plano Mayor and civic leader David B. McCall.

Prior to its revitalization, McCall Plaza featured Dish, Block and Feather, a granite public art piece by sculptor John Thomas Campbell. It has been relocated to Harrington Library on 18th Street.

"That art had been there for as long as I can remember, along with a water feature that lined the area. It was a great area to let the kids play and to take a break under the trees," said Hawkins. "With the McCall Plaza stage, you can still let the kids play and take a break, but this allows us to bring some entertainment into downtown, too."

McCall Plaza's grand opening will welcome the weekend on Friday, April 15 at 4:30 p.m. with remarks from Plano Mayor Harry LaRosiliere and David McCall, Jr., as well as a performance from Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Bluegrass Band.

On Saturday, April 16, the Downtown Plano Arts District will host an artists' showcase. Several local arts organizations will be featured throughout the day including DAAYO, Shine, Plano Children's Theater, Chamberlain Dance, Plano Metropolitan Ballet, Art Centre Theatre, Collin County Ballet Theater, Edge Dance, Plano Community Band and Plano Dance Theater. Joe and Vicki Price will wind down the evening with their blues band on the McCall Plaza stage.

When McCall Plaza is not being used for City-sponsored events, the stage will be available for rent via Plano Stages (www.planostages.com). Plano Stages also manages Plano's Courtyard Theater, the Cox Building Playhouse and the Amphitheater at Oak Point Park.

Hawkins pointed out a rich history is tied to the downtown Plano area that many residents have yet to explore.

"The Plano Conservancy for Historic Preservation, housed in the Interurban Railway Museum, is very dedicated to preserving and promoting the area's history," she said.

The group has two events coming up in the downtown area: Tombstone Mysteries on Saturday, April 16 and Hike Through History on June 4. Tombstone Mysteries is a preservation effort to repair and restore headstones in Plano Mutual Cemetery, as well as perform general cemetery cleanup and maintenance. Hike Through History walks guests through the downtown area pointing out items and places of historical significance.

Another fun event coming soon is the Downtown Plano Art & Wine Walk. This unique event will be conducted on the second Thursday of the month, April through November of this year. Participants of this "sip and shop" event will sample selected wines at favorite shops throughout the arts district while enjoying live music and curated art exhibitions.

"There's a revitalization downtown...
more people want to be downtown and do
things," said Hawkins. "Former Deputy
City Manager Frank Turner had a vision
for this place.....to provide music and
night life. We're right near the DART
track, there is so much close by. Downtown is beginning to expand beyond just a
little piece of 15th Street. We are working
with the downtown merchants to really
revitalize this area. If you haven't been to
downtown lately, come. The community
has really come together. There's a lot of
new energy. It's a really unique part of
Plano that everyone should experience."

Receive Traffic Alerts at Your Fingertips

Keeping up to speed on road construction along the commute through Plano is about to get easier.

Residents and commuter drivers will soon be able to sign up for email and text updates about road construction, road conditions and road closures. The traffic alert system is in the final stages of development.

"The idea came from our engineering department," explained Stephen Tanner, Senior Marketing Coordinator with the City of Plano. "We wanted to create a system to help our residents know what road construction projects are underway so they can plan their commute, their weekends and their rush hour times."

Residents can currently check the City of Plano website, plano.gov, for weekly road construction projects, but Tanner said this new system will allow residents to receive real-time updates via text or email. Alerts will be customized to target roadways that drivers frequently use.

"We wanted to create an alert system to push this important information out to our residents instead of them having to search for it," added Tanner. "Traffic and road construction are on the minds of many Plano residents. We understand it can be really frustrating. We are working hard to keep residents informed. We are making sure they are better prepared for their commutes with this program."

"This type of traffic notification system is unique," said Tanner. Many other cities rely solely on websites to provide traffic and construction information to residents.

The program is expected to be introduced this spring.

Plano First in Texas with Wi-Fi in Parks and Recreation Centers

Most City of Plano recreation centers and parks now feature free Wi-Fi, thanks to Toyota, Time Warner Cable and American Park Network (APN).

"Many patrons have asked for Wi-Fi access while they are working out at recreation centers or while they sit on the bleachers watching a game," said Tony Han, Strategic Technology and Special Projects Manager with City of Plano Technology Services. "They want to send a quick text to the grandparents with pictures of their children playing baseball or soccer, or to check emails on the run. Wi-Fi allows parents to connect to friends and family while enjoying the parks and the recreation centers in Plano."

APN's "Oh, Ranger!" Wi-Fi is made possible by financial support from Toyota. All equipment and installation is being provided at no cost to City taxpayers as a function of this public-private sponsorship between the City of Plano, Toyota and APN. Plano is the first city in Texas to be served by the partnership.

APN's service will cover Carpenter Park, Jack Carter Pool (when construction is complete), Arbor Hills Nature Preserve, Oak Point Park & Nature Preserve and the Amphitheater at Oak Point Park, High Point Tennis Center and Haggard Park. For these locations, access is free.

The Time Warner Cable (TWC) free Wi-Fi program is two years old and started as a nationwide business hotspot service that is now being used in parks and elsewhere. TWC will cover all costs to install and operate the Wi-Fi services.

TWC's service will cover Liberty Recreation Center, Plano Aquatic Center, Tom Muehlenbeck Recreation Center, Carpenter Recreation Center,



Oak Point Recreation Center (when remodeling is complete), High Point Park, Heritage Yards and Enfield Park. For these locations, access is free for the first 60 minutes and \$2.95 for each additional hour. TWC customers can enjoy unlimited free Wi-Fi time.



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

Collin County Sheriff Terry Box

Longtime county staple set to retire in December

For some it might be hard to imagine Collin County as an area filled with rural communities and small cities mainly linked by dirt or gravel roads. But that is exactly what the county consisted of when Collin County Sheriff Terry Box took office Feb. 14, 1985—a position he holds until Dec. 31. Box said the biggest challenge during his time as sheriff was keeping up with the explosive growth in the county.


During his more than 30 years as sheriff, Box has seen the county grow from more than 204,000 people to a projected 2015 population of 949,673.

There were roughly 35 inmates in the Collin County Jail when Box began his tenure. Today, he said, there are about 900 inmates housed in a facility Box led into a statewide spotlight.

The facility, which Box had a hand in helping come to fruition, is the longest-standing jail to be certified by the state and has been certified by the state for 28 years, Box said.

The facility has received so much attention that Box was appointed by then Gov. George Bush to serve on the Texas Commission of Jail Standards first as a board member then as chairman. The board is tasked with overseeing jail standards and their enforcement for county, municipal and private jails.

Now, with several accomplishments under his belt and a career that he said took him further than expected, Box plans to enjoy the friendships he has created with no plans to work on anything other than a '55 Chevy or perhaps his golf swing.

You have been Collin County sheriff for more than 30 years. What made you decide it was time to retire?

Until you live in that environment for that many years, it doesn't appear on the outside to be much stress. But when you respond to the public and everyone wants to meet with you and you have to make time for them, plus I never leave home without returning a phone call, it just adds up. I had open-heart surgery years ago; I have had bypasses; it's just time. Plus, I feel myself slipping and maybe not pushing things as hard as I did before, and I think it's time for new leadership to come in here and take this operation to a new level. My career has been wonderful, I have been blessed and I am ready to not have to worry every day about what new laws are coming and what the Commissioners Court is going to do budget-wise.

In your time as sheriff, you have established a reputation of being fair and honest. What do you think contributed to that?

I was raised in McKinney, and I didn't know anybody else who loved

one another as much as my mother and daddy. I was raised in the Church of Christ, and I was taught what's right and what's wrong. My family growing up taught me that our family name means something; my character means something.

I remember my dad owned an upholstery shop downtown where the cycle shop is now. He got into the used furniture business and sold a bunch of used furniture on credit. He got into some debt with the bank because people weren't paying him. He went to the bank and told them he was getting out of the business and asked to set up a payment plan for what he owed. Filing for bankruptcy wasn't even a thought in his mind. He paid them \$66 a month for years to get it paid off.

I grew up in a time when a handshake meant something. If I owed you money, I owed you money and I was going to pay you. I think if you always do what you think is the right thing, you can always live with it.

Have you had to work to keep up that reputation?

I've had to fire folks who did the wrong thing who were very dear to us.

We have cried when they have left the room. People know that I am fair and honest, but if you lie or steal or something like that, you won't be working here.

I always had the theory—and this is how I have lived my whole life—and that is whatever the perception of you is, that is how you are. I always thought, I have no college degree, but if I dress right, act right and have people around me who have degrees, then we will be perceived professionally.

Do you worry about how the sheriff's office will operate once you leave?

You always worry that things will change when you leave, but I have talked to [sheriff candidate] Jim Skinner a lot lately and he wants to pick up right where I left off and keep things running smoothly.

What accomplishments are you most proud of?

I am probably the proudest of the [Annual Terry Box Shoot Out 'Fore' Kids] golf tournament out of everything in my whole career. No other elected official has raised \$2.2 million

for charity in their whole career and I am really, really proud of that. They wanted me to start that in the beginning to help fund my campaign. I thought about it and decided to do it for charity instead. And in the past 24-25 years it has done pretty good.

How will you spend your time once retired?

I have a building at AeroCountry, so I have a place to go in the mornings to get out of my wife's hair. I will have a place to go with an office area, a four-post lift for my cars and a little place to go to keep busy and hang out. I go to the Barrett-Jackson car auction and the Mecum auction every year. It's a mecca. I was on TV last year driving a 'Cuda four-speed Hemi across the auction block. It's really cool. I do that, and it's away from my job—you're not talking law enforcement. Every day I am here at about 7:30 a.m. There is so much stuff going on around here that if you ever get out of the loop, you'll lose it. I have 500 employees and personnel issues, new things coming up constantly. Our world is evolving so much and I am a dinosaur.





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
AVERAGE PRICE ACROSS THE US PER SEASON INT PROGRAM **OUR 28 DAY**



\$1.439 per \$100 of valuation—the second-lowest tax rate in Collin County. Plano ISD Superintendent Brian Binggeli said the proposed bond package is different than the 2008 bond because the district is in a different phase of its development.

"Our enrollment has stabilized. Accordingly, we did not need to include multiple new schools in this bond package as was the case in previous bond packages," he said.

Nancy Humphrey, PISD Board of

Trustees president, said the 2008 bond program was intended to last for four years. However, the district's state funding was cut and the workforce was reduced in 2011.

"Those were leaner times and we it wasn't a good time to go out for a bond," she said. "It was just not a good economic time."

Single proposition rationale

Trustees discussed at length the merits of a single proposition bond versus a bond package with multiple proposals. Trustee Missy Bender said in a regular meeting Feb. 2 that a single proposition bond program provides flexibility in using available funds if economic conditions change in the years to come.

PISD Chief Financial Officer Steve Fortenberry said a single proposition bond package does not affect the way money will be spent. However, it will provide for more movement in terms of savings and adjusting to the changing prices in the market.

Trustee Yoram Solomon cast the lone dissenting vote at the Feb. 2 meeting, during which the board voted to put the bond program on the ballot.

Solomon said he wanted the program to be divided into multiple items in

order to give the residents more voting options.

"I am not objecting to any specific item on the bond," he said. "The only fact that I am objecting to is the single proposition. The only thing I was hoping for was the multiproposition bond package. It is a matter of giving people a choice."

Major bond items

The major bond package items proposed to receive most of the funding would be renovations and upgrades, fine arts and technology. During a public hearing Dec. 17, parents, teachers and



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other community members expressed a need for a performing arts center in Plano complete with a stage, improved acoustics and ample seating space. About \$94 million would be allocated to the district's fine arts program, out of which about \$68 million will go to land acquisition and construction. The remaining \$26 million would be used to update fine arts facilities on individual school campuses.

About 18,000 secondary school students are involved in fine arts programs, Binggeli said. Some orchestra programs currently perform in gymnasiums in order to accommodate more people. Parent groups spend about \$45,000 a year in renting a facility outside of PISD venues for concerts.

"At least 70 times this year, one of our fine arts programs will actually need to rent a venue because more people will want to come watch them perform than we have the facility to hold them," he said.

Parents expressed another concern regarding technology upgrades in schools at the public hearing. The proposed bond package includes about \$73 million for improvements to PISD's wireless connectivity, and career and technical education programs as well as to replace and purchase additional devices for staff and students.

"The first critical part of the technology part was to get us on a five-year replacement cycle," Binggeli said about investing periodically in updating technology.

If approved, this bond package would

be rolled out over a five-year period. Some bonds will be sold within the first year while others will be sold later, Fortenberry said. For example, the bonds allocated for the fine arts center might be used after a site is acquired and the layout, architecture and construction plan is finalized, which would take more time. On the other hand, projects such as renovations and upgrades could begin within the next year, he said.

The \$9 million allocated toward

the replacement of 90 school buses would be spent over a five-year period to prevent them from reaching their 15-year life span all in the same year, according to the district. Portable classrooms will also be replaced with permanent classroom space.

Funds have also been allocated for the creation of a Special Education Transition Center. All three of Plano's senior high schools have a special education transition program for adults 18 to 22 years old who need to remain in the school system. Creating a consolidated center for these students would enable the district to improve special needs education and create additional space in the senior high schools.

"We can offer expanded opportunities and partner with different companies for life skills training and find job opportunities for these adults," Humphrey said.

Additional district projects

Initially, the bond task force recommended a bond package of \$524 million. In a Jan. 19 special called meeting, trustees decided to reduce the amount of additional debt by \$43 million.

In order to still fund what the

trustees saw as worthwhile projects while not adding to the existing bond debt, the district decided to allocate \$16 million in unissued bonds from the 2008 program and \$27 million from the surplus funds generated through the 2013 Tax Ratification Election to make up the \$43 million difference.

If the bond package of \$481 million is not approved, the \$43 million might be reallocated for other projects in order of importance.

A portion of the funds— \$16 million—will be allocated to replace the four portable buildings at Plano East Senior High School.

"We never sold the \$16 million of debt [from the 2008 bond package] so the taxpayers have never been paying interest on it. We generally sell the bond money when we need it. So this money just sat unsold," Fortenberry said. "The cost to replace the portables was roughly \$16 million, and so it matched pretty well."

The remaining \$27 million is expected to be spent on reroofing projects for district buildings.


