

Kyle continues work on road bond projects

The city of Kyle continued on the road to improved connectivity with City Council's March 15 approval of the city's transportation master plan.

The plan guides long-term transportation projects, with a focus on road construction and alternative transportation modes such as bike lanes and sidewalks, the latter of which the city is requiring with all-new roads, wherever possible.

"People will judge the condition of a city by the state of its roads," City Manager Scott Sellers said.

Among the plan's recommendations is a call to widen Opal Lane from two to four lanes and extend the road over I-35.

Sellers said based on conversations he has had with the Texas Department of Transportation, that project will not happen for at least 10 years.

In the short term, the city is focusing on five road projects funded through a 2013 bond.

Mayor Todd Webster said one of his first priorities after being elected in 2014 was to speed construction of the projects.

"When I was walking blocks, [these projects] were the No. 1 issue [I heard about]," he said. "We've moved as fast as we can, but that's not fast enough for anyone."





Willow Gardens Hot Yoga

Studio heats up local fitness scene

ith classroom temperatures ranging from 85 to 99 degrees Fahrenheit, the warm environment at Willow Gardens Hot Yoga helps the muscles become more flexible and increases blood circulation, said owner and Director Ashley Chandler.

"Think of your body like a steel rod," she said. "And when you apply heat to the rod, [it] becomes more malleable and starts to take shape."

Several types of yoga classes, including Bikram, Iyengar and Vinyasa Flow, are offered at the studio throughout the week.

"Everyone's liking the variety," Chandler said. "And that was my goal from seven years ago, to create a space that offered all types of yoga, not just a set type."

Located at 302 S. Main St., Ste. 103, Buda, in the Buda Mill & Grain, Willow Gardens Hot Yoga opened in October. The studio features a hardwood floor, rustic accents and streamlined decor. The studio was designed with large windows on three sides as a way of providing a peaceful view of the landscape.

"To have an open space where you're connecting with nature while you're connecting with your body—[that's] a really important part of life," she said of the studio's serene setting.

Chandler, who also goes by Ash Willow, started teaching yoga seven years ago.

"The name change is a reflection of

the journey," she said.

That journey began with a 60-day yoga challenge, which Chandler said helped her overcome an eating disorder, and included two years traveling and teaching in Australia, Thailand, Japan and other countries.

"Yoga is medicine," she said. "I practiced [yoga] every day for 60 days, and my life changed, as it does whenever you commit to a discipline."

A yoga basics class is offered weekly, but all classes are open to adults of every age and ability level. An introductory offer for 15 days of unlimited classes costs \$30, and customers can check the website for the most up-todate class schedule.

Leslie Simmons, who attends classes two-to-three times a week, said she was in her 50s when she began practicing hot yoga.

"It's not just for college kids," she said. "What I've learned about yoga is how other people really don't care how well I'm doing or not doing. It's very much about your own personal progress."

Simmons, who owns a counseling and psychotherapy business in Kyle, said she often recommends the hotyoga classes at Willow Gardens to her clients.

Chandler encourages students to practice with consistency, frequency and intensity for maximum benefits.

"It's a yoga practice," she said. "We're





Willow Gardens classes

Bikram yoga, performed at 99 degrees Fahrenheit, takes participants through a set sequence of 26 postures and two breathing exercises. The poses repeat in every class, making it easier for students to see progress over time. Vinyasa Flow yoga, performed at 90 degrees Fahrenheit, emphasizes matching breath to movement. Participants flow through a combination of varied sequences and movements. Candlelight Flow adds candles intended to increase relaxation. All Levels Flow is based on the expertise of the instructor. Power Flow is a more rigorous practice and is recommended for more experienced practitioners. Iyengar yoga, performed at 85 degrees Fahrenheit, focuses on body alignment with the use of props. The practice is recommended for beginners, seniors, those with injuries and pre- or postnatal participants.

Palm Cafe

San Marcos restaurant celebrates 10 years

uco and Olga Alvarado opened the Palm Cafe in San Marcos in 2006, but had it not been for the generosity of friends and former employers, they may never have ended up in Central Texas, they said.

The pair married in 1991 and made the decision to come to the U.S. from Juarez, Mexico, one year later. They settled in Bryan-College Station, where Cuco got work with a roofing company.

Six months later, Cuco received a phone call from his brother, who was living in San Marcos. Having heard that Cuco had recently purchased a car—a 1986 Chevrolet Monte Carlo Supersport that he still remembers fondly—Cuco's brother asked if the couple might consider moving to San Marcos so he could have a reliable ride to work.

Cuco and Olga arrived in San Marcos but nearly decided to move back to Mexico after problems with their apartment. Tommy Cuevas, the long-time proprietor of Cuevas Produce who died in February, stepped in to help the young couple solve their problem.

"He helped us find a house to live in," Cuco said. "He was a very good person."

Cuco found work in the mornings at a factory and in the evenings working as a dishwasher at Garcia's Mexican Restaurant in San Marcos. Olga worked in the kitchen at Red Lobster in San Marcos, and after 12 years the pair saved enough money to buy a building that formerly housed a Mexican restaurant in New Braunfels. Less than a year later, they purchased a building at 504 Broadway St., San Marcos, which formerly

housed a chicken restaurant.

The Alvarados' success in the restaurant industry has been a family affair. Cuco's brother Efraim took over the former Palm Cafe in Kyle—which he renamed to Spicy Bite—and his brother David took over the Palm Cafe in Seguin. His sister, Marycruz, also owns Chepo's in San Marcos.

Cuco and Olga's dedication to their family comes through at the restaurant, they said. Staff are expected to treat guests like family, and the couple said they want customers to "taste the love" used in making each dish, Olga said.

"[Our regular customers] love that Palm Cafe feels like family," manager Mary Tijerina said. "[Customers] get here, and a lot of the regulars, the waitresses already know what they're having. They don't even take them a menu."

Among the most popular items on the menu is the chile relleno plate (\$7.99), which includes a fried poblano pepper stuffed with cheese and meat and served with rice and beans.

The gorditas (\$6.99), another popular item, include two puffed corn tortillas stuffed with cheese, meat and other ingredients.

Cuco and Olga, who recently completed the process to become U.S. citizens, said they always knew they would find success in San Marcos.

"A lot of people told us, 'Don't go to San Marcos. It's just a little town. You have no future there. Don't move,'" Olga said. "Now I told my husband the other day, 'Let's go find all our old friends in Bryan to tell them we were right."



Major projects in the area

1 Aquarena Springs Drive overpass

The Texas Department of Transportation is working to construct a bridge on Aquarena Springs Drive over the Union Pacific railroad tracks in San Marcos. Lane closures within the project area, which spans from near Charles Austin Drive to near Thorpe Lane, lasted through early April. When completed, the road will include an overpass with two travel lanes in each direction as well as two-lane access roads in each direction.

Timeline: June 2015-late 2017 Cost: \$20.7 million

2 Post Road bridge replacement

TxDOT plans to replace the Post Road bridge over the Blanco River with a new bridge that will include 11-foot-wide travel lanes and 5-foot-wide shoulders.

4 Marketplace Avenue extension

The extension of Marketplace Avenue is expected to be complete by July. In early April remaining work included adjusting utilities, final paving, and construction of a roundabout at the intersection of Marketplace and Burleson Street.

Data center: Buda is fastest-growing city of at least 10,000 in the state of Texas

BUDA The city of Buda grew by 77.9 percent between 2010-15, according to a report released by the Texas State Data Center in April, making it Texas' fastest-growing city with a population of at least 10,000. As of Jan. 1, 2015, the city had a population of 12,979.


The city issued 398 single-family home construction permits and 302 multifamily unit permits in 2015. Through April 7, the city had issued 70 single-family home permits.

"The city has done a tremendous job at getting the infrastructure in place to address the growth as we move forward," Planning Director Chance Sparks said in a news release. "The growth presents an opportunity for us to apply new standards designed to implement the comprehensive plan developed by the community."

The city has continued adding businesses as well, said Ann Miller, director of the Buda Economic Development Corp.

"With roughly 150 people moving to the Austin [metropolitan area] each day, Buda is an attractive location since our city provides ample employment opportunities in a diverse range of industries, a great quality of life and a low cost of

living," Miller said. "Over the next few years, I anticipate the southern portion of the Austin metro to continue to grow substantially as there are still large undeveloped tracts of land in this portion of the I-35 corridor."

According to the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts, sales tax collections in the city grew by 61.75 percent from 2010-15.

The Texas State Data Center report indicated San Marcos grew 29.6 percent between 2010-15, from 44,894 residents to 58,185 as of Jan. 1, 2015.

The city of Kyle grew by 18.2 percent during the same period, from 28,016 residents to 33,123 as of Jan. 1, 2015.

Hays County suspends fiscal year 2017 membership in Lone Star Rail District

HAYS COUNTY At a meeting March 22, Hays County commissioners unanimously voted not to renew the county's fiscal year 2016-17 membership with the Lone Star Rail District, which has been planning to bring commuter rail service to the I-35 corridor between San Antonio and Georgetown.

The county pays its membership in a lump sum, so it will remain a member through the end of fiscal year 2015-16, which runs through September.

Hays County Precinct 3 Commissioner Will Conley said the project was "going nowhere fast," and the county and other project partners need to step back and reassess how to make commuter rail a reality in Central Texas.

"We have no realistic capital plan on

how to move forward with this concept and this idea," Conley said. "We have no realistic, practical [operations and maintenance] plans on how to even maintain this program and this project if we were to move forward [or] on how to pay for the costs associated with operating such a project."

Union Pacific Corp.'s termination of an agreement that allowed LSRD to study the freight carrier's rail line for potential use as the track for the commuter rail was also a big blow, Conley said.

"We now have no idea where we would even put our idea of commuter rail moving up and down the corridor," he said.

Conley said the state will need to step up to help bring rail to the I-35 corridor. He said he plans to meet with elected officials and representatives with the Texas Department of Transportation to discuss the issue further.

At a meeting April 15, the LSRD presented four alternatives to the initial preferred route on the existing UP line.

Those alternatives include one proposal to build the rail line parallel to the existing UP line, two proposals to build it along I-35 and a proposal to build it along SH 130.



- Texas Election Identification Certificate issued by DPS
- Texas personal ID card issued by DPS
- Texas concealed handgun license issued by DPS
- U.S. military ID card containing the cardholder's photograph
- . U.S. citizenship certificate containing the cardholder's photograph
- · U.S. passport

The following forms of ID will not be accepted:

- Student ID
- Utility bills
- ID cards issued by employers
- · Any ID, other than U.S. citizenship certification, more than 60 days expired

Voters who do not have a valid form of ID can apply for an Election Identification Certificate at no cost at any driver's license office. 

been slowed by the red tape that many developers complain of in Austin, Patel said.

"You're looking at here, we can probably put up a hotel in—from buying the land to actually having the doors open-two years, give or take a couple of months," he said. "In Austin, on the other hand, it could take anywhere from three to four years."

Patel's project, an 83-room Candlewood Suites that broke ground March 23, is one of about a dozen hotels that are in development or have recently opened in San Marcos, Kyle and Buda within the past year.

The growth of hotels in the area is partly being driven by financial institutions' growing confidence, said Jan Freitag, vice president of global research

with hospitality industry research group Smith Travel Research.

"During Recession Great bankers got skittish," Freitag said. "They didn't like leases where your lease is one night, whereas office leases for are 10 years or longer. The [hotels]

who did [open] did really well. If you opened in 2010 or 2011, you had a phenomenal run."

Freitag said a study of the hotel inventory in the Central Texas area, including San Marcos, Kyle, Buda, Bastrop and Lakeway, showed that between 2012 and 2015 there were 1,078 new hotel rooms added to the market. During the same period, occupancy rates increased from 65.6 percent to 78 percent, which he said shows "very healthy" demand growth.

Hotel demand

Patel said his hotel project is aimed at long-term guests who will stay in Buda for at least five days.

Market studies indicate there is a segment of business travelers who prefer to stay outside Austin to avoid high costs and traffic, Patel said. He hopes his hotel appeals to that group, he said.

"They find it more peaceful to drive five to 10 minutes out and stay," Patel said. "Buda has so many restaurants and stuff to offer, it's not like they're missing too much. It's just to get out of the hoopla of Austin."

In Kyle, a new Comfort Suites and

Hampton Inn are planned, and Economic Development Director Diana Blank said another hotelier is looking into the feasibility of bringing a third new hotel to the city.

Visitors to Texas State University and The University of Texas are driving much of the growth in the city because of its nearly equidistant location between the two universities, Blank said.

The growth of the wedding industry in Central Texas is beginning to touch Kyle, too.

In 2015, Texas Old Town, a wedding and events venue in Kyle, hosted more than 360 weddings, Blank said.

Those weddings often bring dozens of hotel room reservations, Blank said.

Garden Grove and Madeline Manor, two wedding venues, recently opened in the Buda and Kyle areas, respectively, continuing the wedding industry's growth in Hays County.

> Hoteliers were mostly unaware of Kyle's potential as a hotel hotbed until the city began making a concerted push in 2015 to attract more to the area. The city commissioned a hotel market study to back up city officials' claims that Kyle could support more hotels than

The study, performed by Stone Hospitality Group, confirmed the city could support a full-service hotelwhich typically includes amenities such as restaurants and bars—as well as extended-stay hotels similar to Patel's project in Buda and a resortstyle hotel similar to the Hyatt Lost Pines near Bastrop.

"Right now the market is so wideopen that any [type of hotel in Kyle] would work," Blank said.

Until recently, much of San Marcos' hotel inventory was 15 to 20 years old, said Rebecca Ybarra-Ramirez, director of the San Marcos Convention and Visitor Bureau. Studies show travelers prefer staying in newer hotels, she said, so developers are coming in to fill the need, now that they can get financing, Ybarra-Ramirez said.


The city's hotel occupancy rate typically hovers between 60 and 70 percent each month, she said, and can be as high as 95 percent on the weekends.

"Now it seems like everyone is loaning hotel projects money, because [hotels] keep coming," she said.

The cities of San Marcos, Buda and Kyle each collect a 7 percent tax on guests' hotel bills.

From 2006-15, taxable hotel receipts in San Marcos, Kyle and Buda increased nearly 166 percent, from \$19,123,692.79 to \$50,791,505.25, according to the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts.

The city of Kyle anticipates that 7 percent tax will generate \$208,250 during the 2015-16 fiscal year. The city of Buda expects the tax to generate \$601,380 in FY 2015-16, and the city of San Marcos budgeted to receive \$2.13 million in tax revenue for the fiscal year.

Under state law, that revenue must be used to promote tourism, but the benefit of the money goes beyond attracting hotel guests to each city, Ybarra-Ramirez said.

"When these people spend the night in our hotel rooms, they eat, they drink, they fuel up and they contribute to the economy," she said. "Then our property tax rate won't go up as quickly."

Blank said a city's hotel inventory can affect its ability to attract high-profile events as well as its appeal to businesses considering coming to the city.

"When we're recruiting companies, if they don't have a hotel here they would be willing to bring their executive-level person into, they're going to [potentially] keep them in Austin and drive them into Kyle," she said. "That's not going to be a Kyle experience for them. It's going to be an Austin experience."







Construction on Marketplace Avenue began in the fall and is expected to be complete by late May.


The newly built road extends
Marketplace from its former endpoint
at City Lights Drive to Burleson
Street. When completed, the road
will feature one travel lane in each
direction as well as a center left-turn
lane throughout most of the project.

The road will provide a direct connection between downtown Kyle and the retailers and services available at Kyle Marketplace. The road is paying immediate dividends, City Manager Scott Sellers said, as two multifamily developers have purchased property adjacent to the new road extension.

"That's another 1,000 people who will live on Marketplace in the next year," he said. "It's crazy how important that road is to attracting people."


GOFORTH RD. - TYPICAL SECTIONS



A 10-foot-wide shared use path and sidewalks are planned throughout the project area, according to planning documents.


In addition to the reconstruction of Goforth, the city is planning to extend the road from its current end place at Bunton Creek to Kyle Parkway, City Engineer Leon Barba said.

In 2015, Kyle City Council approved an addition to the Goforth Road project that will extend the road from its current end at Bunton Creek Road to Kyle Parkway at a cost of \$1 million.

The start of construction on Bunton Creek Road will be partly determined by the schedule for work on Goforth Road, which intersects Bunton Creek.

In addition to road reconstruction, the project also includes improvements to water and wastewater utilities.

The city expects to begin construction on the project in July, and completion is slated for July 2017.

Construction on Burleson Street will reconstruct the street with two lanes from Miller Street to Lockhart Street and three lanes from Lockhart to Marketplace Avenue. Sidewalks will be included throughout the project area.


The project will also build a new connection from Burleson to I-35 in an




effort to improve mobility.

The city is negotiating with nearby property owners to acquire right of way, Project Manager Jo Ann Garcia said. The city has acquired about half of the 13 parcels necessary to begin the project, she said.

LEHMAN RD. - TYPICAL SECTIONS



Lehman Road will be closed for most of the 18 months the road is under construction, Barba said. Traffic to and from the Steeplechase neighborhood will be routed to Goforth Road for the duration of the project.



The project spans from FM 150 to Bunton Creek Road and will reconstruct the road to include two lanes in most areas and three lanes at cross streets.

Road sections may vary in some areas. Layouts shown here are the most common planned throughout each project area.




