"Bed and banks"

The "bed-and-banks" bill would transfer the ownership of the land in the riverbed and along the banks of the San Marcos River located within city limits from the state to the city. San Marcos officials say this would allow for the city to better protect the river and its wildlife

Hotel occupancy tax revenue use

Buda Mayor Todd Ruge said he has discussed working with San Marcos to receive state approval to use hotel occupancy tax to fund city parks.

Railroad siding relocation

The city of Kyle is hoping for legislation that will allow the relocation of a switching station—a line of railroad track that allows one train to pull off the main track while another train passes—from Center Street. The current location of the station causes major congestion downtown, officials have said.

Hays County-area legislators prep bills for next session

Lawmakers to propose changes to annexation, marijuana possession and property tax laws

The 85th Texas Legislature will convene Jan. 10, and Hays County legislators are supporting bills that include decriminalizing marijuana, transferring ownership of the bed and banks of the San Marcos River, and reforming the annexation process for cities.

'BED AND BANKS'

State Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, prefiled Senate Bill 71, a bill that deals with San Marcos specifically but could have statewide implications.

If passed, SB 71, or the "bed-and-banks" bill, would transfer the ownership of the land in the riverbed and along the banks of the San Marcos River located within city limits from the state to the city.

Kristi Wyatt, city of San Marcos spokesperson, said this would allow for the city to better protect the river and the wildlife that calls it home.

San Marcos' east side primed for single-family housing boom

San Marcos' most recent comprehensive plan, a city document that guides city growth, calls for increased development on the city's east side.

During the plan's formation, "the public indicated a preference for some redevelopment in the urban core and for new development along east-side corridors and I-35," the


plan states.

Four projects on the city's eastside could bring as many as 4,000 new single-family homes as well as multifamily housing and retail properties.

"That's the direction we want to grow," San Marcos Permit Manager Abby Gillfillan said. "It's not over the [Edwards Aquifer] recharge zone. It's not environmentally sensitive land."

THE TRACE COMMUNITY

In January, California-based real estate development firm HighPointe Communities will break ground on Trace, a community that, when fully built out, will include 1,000 single-family homes, parks and a site for a new San Marcos CISD elementary school as well as commercial, office and retail space.







Gray Gardens

Farmers' market takes root in downtown Buda

ray Gardens is a sustainable urban vegetable farm located on Main Street in Buda. Owned by the Gray family for about 20 years, the farm began selling produce six years ago at the Buda Farmers' Market, which Gray Gardens also curates, Farm Manager Jonas Jones said.

At the Buda Farmers' Market, Gray Gardens sells the vegetables it grows, such as okra, peppers, eggplant, kale, onions and broccoli. Its most popular vegetables are tomatoes, Jones said.

"[At the market] we can tell people directly what everything is and where their food comes from," he said. "I think it's an awesome, empowering thing."

The Buda Farmers' Market operates on Tuesdays and Saturdays, Jones said. The Saturday markets often have more vendors, he said, but the Tuesday market prices are sometimes cheaper. Saturday markets also have live music performances.

"The people here want to provide

good food," Jones said. "They're not out here to rob you. They're growing great food, and they do it because they love it."

Besides farmers markets, Gray Gardens also supports itself through a community-supported agriculture, or CSA, program.

CSA's were started in Japan during the 1970s by mothers who wanted more direct access to naturally grown food and to pay farmers directly, Jones said. The concept has only recently taken off in Texas.

Through the CSA, members buy a share into the farm and pick up a weekly portion of vegetables. It helps the farmer with upfront capital to prepare for the upcoming season, he said. Last season, Gray Gardens provided food to 40 families through its CSA program.

"It helps relieve stress for the farmer, because there's no security in farming, whether it's the market, or it's nature," Jones said. "At the end of the day, even if everything works out 100 percent, you're still working with Mother Nature."

The farmers at Gray Gardens will often work 14-hour days, he said.

"We're all a little quirky, I guess, to do that," Jones said. "I wouldn't trade it for anything else."

Jones said Gray Gardens has considered relocating to another part of Buda in the future, one surrounded by more "trendy" businesses.

"Buda's growing, and we want to grow with it," he said. "We're fortunate to have a community and be here and do this. Where's the farm on Main Street in San Marcos [or] Kyle?"

Every farm is fighting to "stay above the red," Jones said.

"No matter who you vote for, whether you do or you don't, the most important thing you can do, especially in your local economy, is voting every time you spend your dollar," he said. "If you don't support these systems, then you're going to lose them."

OTHER VENDORS

Susana Rueda at **Frolla Patisserie** sells artisanal, gluten-free pastries at the market nearly every weekend. Her most popular treats are her homemade gluten-free Twinkie-like treats, which cost \$5 for a package of two.

Darn Good Goods sells restorative ointment made from locally sourced beeswax. A variety of formulas, such as lavender and citrus are available. A 6-ounce jar costs \$10.

Ron Gross sells a variety of flavored olive oils made in Dripping Springs. Flavors include chili, garlic and Meyel lemon. A 250 ml bottle of traditional olive oil costs \$15.

backdrop, she said. In addition to hosting the wedding, the restaurant can provide catering.

"I definitely think this is a bride and groom's dream spot to have a wedding, so I would like to do more of those," she said.

The restaurant has capacity for about 45 guests, Wallace said. On "nice nights," the outdoor patio, which faces the sunset, is also open to guests, providing additional seating.

"It's a bit of a drive out here, but it's worth it," she said. "That's for sure."

Kyle inn expands food service to accommodate nonguests

n 90 acres west of Kyle, Sage Hill Inn Above Onion Creek has been a relaxing getaway for

guests from across the nation for more than 20 years. It has only been since last year that the inn's popular dining room has opened to nonguests.

The Restaurant at Sage Hill offers a three-course prix fixe menu featuring dishes such as Shiner Bock Rosemary Dumplings, Cobb Creek Chicken Pot Pie and Sweet Potato Bundt Cake.

Autumn Wallace, executive chef and dining room manager, said the restaurant takes pride in its fresh vegetables, which are picked from a garden a few steps from the restaurant's entrance.

"The dishes that really highlight things coming out of the garden, people get really excited about that," Wallace said. "And they taste great because they're really fresh, and we pick it right before dinner service. The gorden features a seri

The garden features a variety of vegetables, including lettuce, carrots and radishes, as well as fresh flowers, which are placed in guests' rooms daily.

"We are pretty spoiled," Wallace said. "We have a really big garden."


In addition to vegetables from the nearby garden, the restaurant sources its meat and other ingredients from a variety of local and regional producers. The beef from the restaurant's pot roast, which is on the winter menu, is sourced from 44 Farms in Cameron, Texas. The restaurant's coffee, served alongside desserts, comes from Independence Roasters in Brenham.

The restaurant is open to nonguests Monday -Wednesday, and dinner seatings take place from 6-7 p.m. The three-course prix fixe meal costs \$75 per person. Beer and wine are available for an additional cost.

Wallace said she would like to host more weddings at the inn. The Hill Country setting makes an ideal

FM 1626 South improvements

The span of FM 1626 from FM 967 to FM 2770 in Kyle and Buda will be improved to include five lanes with a continuous center-turn lane and shoulders. Hays County and the Texas Department of Transportation hosted a groundbreaking for the project Nov. 16.

Timeline: November 2016-late 2018

Cost: \$20.56 million

Funding sources: TxDOT, Hays County

Dacy Lane improvements

The portion of Dacy Lane from Beebe Road to Hillside Terrace in Kyle and Buda will be improved to include two travel lanes in each direction as well as a center turn lane and sidewalks. The project will be built using \$20 million of Proposition 2 bond funds approved by voters in the Nov. 8 election. The county is currently working to determine how the bond projects will be managed. County Transportation Director Jerry Borcherding said the Dacy Lane project will likely be one of the highest-priority projects.

Timeline: TBD Cost: \$20 million

Funding sources: Hays County

Goforth Road expansion

Goforth Road will be expanded to include two to three lanes in areas between I-35 and Bunton Creek Road. The city aims to

have the bridge on Goforth over Plum Creek completed by January.

Timeline: April 2016-March 2017

Cost: \$6.6 million

Funding sources: city of Kyle

Bunton Creek Road reconstruction

Construction on Bunton Creek Road began Sept. 23. The city of Kyle plans to reconstruct the 1-mile portion of Bunton Creek from I-35 to Lehman Road. Road reconstruction began in late November.

Timeline: Sept. 23-September 2017

Cost: \$5 million

Funding sources: city of Kyle

The city of Kyle is planning to reconstruct Burleson Street to include two lanes from Miller Street to Lockhart Street and three lanes from Lockhart to the I-35 frontage road. Due to delays in right-of-way acquisition, the construction start date for the project has been pushed to August 2017.



County begins work on bond projects

Hays County voters approved the two bond propositions on the Nov. 8 ballot, and work on designing and planning for Proposition 1 projects is underway.

Of the 63,034 voters who cast ballots for or against Proposition 1, 51.15 percent of voters supported the measure, which will fund improvements and an expansion at the county jail on Uhland Road in San Marcos as well as a new law-enforcement center and co-located communications center near the Hays County Government Center on Stagecoach Trail in San Marcos.

Hays county Commissioner Will Conley, who is part of a public safety facilities committee, said the committee will soon begin looking at details of the projects and begin working on timelines and construction phasing.

Initial construction plans presented to the court this summer call for \$106.4 million of construction projects. Construction at the site of the current jail—which will include renovating and expanding the jail as well as building

a new vehicle maintenance facility—is expected to cost \$62.4 million. Construction near the government center—including the new law-enforcement center and co-located communication center—is expected to cost \$44 million.

Conley said the sequence of construction will be especially important because the law enforcement center and county communications center are currently located on the site of the jail. Those facilities will need to be moved before jail expansion can begin.

As of Nov. 21, the county was holding 140 inmates in jails outside of the county. Hays County has contracts with seven counties to hold prisoners, but those counties' jails are cutting back the number of inmates they are receiving, Conley said.

way," Conley said.

The county spends about \$50 per day to hold inmates in jails outside the county. That number does not factor in the cost of transporting inmates or other related expenses.

On Nov. 22 commissioners approved initiating the process of seeking requests for qualifications from firms to perform environmental and traffic impact analyses related to the public safety projects in Proposition 1.

County Development Services Director Clint Garza said the court could select firms to handle the work by Dec. 20. Then contract negotiations would begin with the selected firms, and

Voters also approved Proposition 2, which will fund transportation projects throughout the county. Hays County Transportation Director Jerry Borcherding said the Commissioners Court may decide to appoint a subcommittee to manage the transportation bond program and determine the sequencing of projects, or commissioners may handle management themselves. That decision will likely be made by mid-December, he said.

Although the sequence of projects has not been determined, Borcherding said a \$20 million project to widen Dacy Lane will likely be one of the highest-priority bond projects because of the recent opening of McCormick Middle School on Dacy.

"We've been working on that for some time now, and we want to go on and finish up Dacy Lane."

design of the facilities will be presented to court by February, Garza said.

"I'm still of the opinion that the most pressing issue we have in this county is our circumstance at the jail and law enforcement center," Commissioner Ray Whisenant said. "We need to get things moving because it's costing our taxpayers dollars every day."



County prepares disaster recovery grant allocations

HAYS COUNTY The county has been allocated \$7.4 million of a \$50.97 million disaster-recovery grant awarded to the state of Texas from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. The grant is aimed at helping the county recover from the Memorial Day weekend and All Saint's Day floods in 2015.

Members of the Hays County Commissioners Court discussed the grant at a meeting Nov. 15.

Projects located in the city of San Marcos would not be eligible to be funded through the grant because the city received a \$25.08 million disasterrecovery grant from HUD in February.

The General Land Office, a state agency that oversees state land and will oversee the grant administration, determined that 68 percent of funds—about \$5.03 million for Hays County—should go to nonhousing and infrastructure-related projects, and 32 percent of the county's funds-about \$2.37 millionshould go to housing.

Commissioner Will Conley, who represents a portion of western Hays County that includes Wimberley, said the county may have a hard time finding housing projects to spend the money on because projects cannot be located in San Marcos.

"If we cannot find good, quality housing projects and needs, then I think, stating the obvious, we'd like that to be able to go toward more of the infrastructure needs and demands in the county that our staffs and public and ourselves have identified and our other local municipalities have identified as important in their communities and different geographic areas of the county," Conley said.

Commissioner Debbie Ingalsbe, who represents a portion of the county including San Marcos, echoed Conley's sentiment, saying that although many homes in the county were affected by the flooding, they may not qualify for the county's disaster-recovery grant.

Buda appoints seven to sustainability commission

BUDA City Council appointed seven residents to serve on the city's newly created sustainability commission at a meeting Nov. 15.

According to city documents, the commission will serve as a City Council advisory board on matters related to sustainability, such as environmental stewardship and social awareness.

"The commission will take a holistic look [at] sustainability and make recommendations that best suit the residents of Buda," City Planner Meredith Johnson said in an email. "[Their] goal is to address issues that are not only related to the environment but also to livability as a whole."

City Secretary Alicia Ramirez said the city began advertising for positions after council approved the creation

of the commission at its Sept. 20 meeting. Since then, the city received 16 applications. Each council member made one nomination.

Appointees include Carly Montez, Brooke Prendergast, Vincent Lecca, Rex Drake, Amy Chung, Eric Martinez and Marni Martinez.

Johnson said citizens serving on the commission will make policy recommendations to the council related to air quality, water conservation and green space preservation. The commission will examine best practices for development and how to promote a sustainably built environment. According to the city, the commission will also pursue grant opportunities and develop educational opportunities for Buda residents.

Four City Council races head to runoff Dec. 13

Candidates in four races in San Marcos and Buda failed to receive more than 50 percent of the vote, meaning those races will go to a runoff election Dec. 13. On election day voters must cast ballots at their precinct's designated polling place. Polling places will be open from 7 a.m.-7 p.m. in San Marcos and Buda.





Austin-based organization expands foster family support program into Hays County

In the Buda area, an Austin-based charity supports 22 foster children and their families.

Austin Angels recruits, engages and trains groups of volunteers, such as friends, neighbors, church groups and businesses, to form a team for what the charity calls its Love Box program.

The teams are matched by Austin Angels with a foster family whom they sponsor for a year, Director of Programs Rebecca Rice said. Each month, the group delivers a box to the family filled with things the family needs on a daily basis, such as laundry detergent or toilet paper. The group also packs movie tickets and other gifts.

"We really encourage the volunteer groups to make it their own and tailor what they're delivering every month to the needs of the family," Rice said. "[We prioritize] building relationships with kids, telling them they're important,

cared for and thought about."

There is a lack of stability for many children in the foster care system, she said. It is not unheard of for a child in the foster system for eight years to be moved to a new family 20 times.

"More often than not, kids live in unstable environments, and they don't get the message that they're important and that they're loved and cared for," she said. "Statistically, the outcomes for foster youth are unspeakable and unacceptable."

According to Austin Angels, 80 percent of the prison system is made up of former foster youth. Additionally, 30 percent of the homeless population went through the foster care system. Only 3 percent of foster children who age out of the system at age 18 go on to earn college degrees, despite grants and funding that could provide free higher education.

"The biggest challenge is knowing how many obstacles these kids face,"



Buda City Council proclaimed November as Adoption Awareness Month at its Nov. 7 meeting. The proclamation was accepted by Austin Angels representatives.

Rice said. "Without caring adults intervening and stepping in to help, their outcome and their future is bleak. It's a sad future. Statistically, we know that."

In September, there were 66 children in foster care in Hays County, according to the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services.

"Our culture and our community is largely blind to the crisis that's happening in the foster care system," Rice said. "I feel like a lot of times when people hear what's actually going on, they feel compelled [to

help]. How can you not get involved?"

Rice said Buda-area residents can form a Love Box group to sponsor a family or pledge to make a monthly donation to Austin Angels.

"We know every one of the kids we serve has the potential to be great," she said. "They just need the chance. They need someone to believe in them and guide them [to] live to their fullest potential."

A CLOSER LOOK ATTHE LEGISLATION



'BED AND BANKS'

Current law dictates that the city of San Marcos must obtain state and federal permits before beginning work on any projects below the river's average water line. Even for small repairs to existing infrastructure in the river, state agencies must grant approval prior to the city starting work. If the city were to take ownership of the river, the process would be more efficient and allow for easier dayto-day maintenance, city staff say.



The city is not required to obtain state or federal permits to remove litter in and along the river, manage flora or keep up with other maintenance issues.



MARIJUANA DECRIMINALIZATION

HB 81 aims at decriminalizing the possession of small amounts of marijuana. Marijuana possession and consumption would still be illegal, but the bill would lower the offense to a Class C misdemeanor, similar to a parking ticket. The offense would not show up on criminal background checks.

ANNEXATION REFORM

State Sen. Donna Campbell, R-New Braunfels, plans to propose annexation reform by filing legislation that would protect private property owners from forced annexation by cities. Details on the proposed legislation have not been released as of Community Impact Newspaper's press time.






KYLE CENTER STREET SIDING

When trains pull into the switching station on Center Street and have to wait for other trains to pass, they can block the crossing for nearly an hour, Kyle Communications Specialist Kim Hilsenbeck said. Trains blocking major arterials in the city can create issues for police and emergency services and can be dangerous when pedestrians try to walk between train cars, Hilsenbeck said. City staff say they are not sure where the switching station would be relocated.

HOTEL OCCUPANCY TAX

According to the Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts, from September 2015-September 2016, the city of Buda collected more than \$600,000 in hotel occupancy tax revenue from six local hotels. With approval from the state, the city could use that money to promote ecotourism and develop Garison Park on a 40-acre piece of land located at the end of Garison Road. Proposed ideas for the park include trails, a kayak and canoe launching site, a zip-line, climbing boulders, a ropes course, and a nature center.

"[The bill would] help us to make everything run smoother and allow us to do the things we do on a day-to-day basis more efficiently," Wyatt said.

The city is responsible for removing litter in and along the river, discouraging invasive wildlife and non-native plants, and installing native plants, among other maintenance, city staff said.

The Edwards Aquifer is home to seven endangered species, such as the fountain darter, Texas wild rice and the Texas blind salamander. Because the bed and banks of the river belong to the state, the city cannot enforce laws that would protect the river and wildlife.

"Everybody that lives here knows that we have a lot of endangered species we work really hard to protect. Sometimes it's hard to protect them because we don't have jurisdiction," Wyatt said. "If people are going in and pulling [Texas wild rice up, it's not within our jurisdiction to ticket them or stop them."

Owning the land would also simplify the process for making repairs in and along the river, such as at access points, Wyatt said.

Currently, state and federal permits must be obtained prior to work on any projects below the average water line, city staff said. Even for small repairs to existing infrastructure in the river, state agencies must grant approval before the city can start work.

According to the bill, ownership of the property automatically reverts to the state if the city fails to provide for the protection of health and general welfare, recreation, beautification and civic improvement, or if the city sells any or all of the property. The state would also retain oil, gas and other mineral rights.

"We have no intention of selling the land. That's not something we would want to do," Wyatt said. "We want to protect the river and everything in it."

MARIJUANA DECRIMINALIZATION

State Rep. Jason Isaac, R-Dripping Springs, said he's invested in an issue that he admits is still unpopular with many Republicans who elected him: decriminalizing the possession of small amounts of marijuana.

"When I explain it to people, the feedback is overwhelmingly in support of the idea," Isaac said at a Nov. 16 Dripping Springs town hall meeting.

He supports HB 81, filed by state Rep. Joe Moody, D-El Paso, that would impose a fine rather than the arrest and jailing of those found to be in possession of up to an ounce of marijuana.

He used an example of Texas State University students who "make a mistake" and are found in possession of small amounts of marijuana.

"When they go to get a job when they graduate college, guess what comes up on their criminal background check, and guess who doesn't get hired?" Isaac said. "People that you and I have invested in, [in] their educations, so that they can meet our workforce needs."

Marijuana possession and consumption would still be against the law, but if passed, HB 81 would lower the offense to a Class C misdemeanor, "like a parking ticket," Isaac said.

"It's an economic development issue to me," he said. "We want them to be able to get jobs. We want them to be economic contributors to the state of Texas. This would help do that."

CENTER STREET CONGESTION IN KYLE

Kyle Mayor Todd Webster said although the city will not hire a lobbyist or have a formal legislative agenda, the city is interested in one issue.

"We've had quite a bit of engagement with [state Sen. Donna Campbell, R-New Braunfels,] and Isaac about the rail siding relocation issue," Webster said. "It's a long shot, but we're hoping to try to get some financial support so we can work in partnership to try to

move the Center Street main siding."

Webster said the siding's current location near Center Street can cause trains to come to a complete stop, which happens four or five times per day at a minimum, he said. When this happens, traffic can be blocked on Center Street and nearby streets for nearly an hour,

and it creates major problems, he said.

"It's definitely a quality-of-life issue and mobility issue for us," he said.

Kyle's location on the I-35 corridor means traffic in the city can affect commuters in other towns.

"I think it's a regional mobility issue," he said. "Kyle residents aren't the only ones moving through there."

ANNEXATION REFORM

Campbell said she plans to file legislation to bring about annexation reform that would protect private property owners from forced annexation by cities. Annexation should not be a one-sided revenue grab, she said.

"[Annexation] simply is something

that big cities use to add to their tax base and to continue with their unsustainable spending and their borrowing," Campbell said at the Nov. 16 Dripping Springs town hall meeting. "I believe annexation should be a collaborative process where all the stakeholders are brought together, and every citizen has a voice in that. The way it is right now, in the big city, if the city wants to annex, they do. It's very difficult for people to have a voice in that."

HOTEL OCCUPANCY TAX REFORM

Buda Mayor Todd Ruge said he is working to receive state approval to use hotel occupancy tax revenue to fund city parks. He said he has talked with San Marcos officials about working together.

"We have a lot of hotels in Buda," he said. "By state law, we can only spend [HOT tax revenue] on certain things."

From September 2015 to September 2016, the city collected about \$609,912 in HOT tax revenue, records from the Texas Comptroller show.

The HOT tax fund is "very healthy," Ruge said, and he would like to see the funds go toward other city priorities.

"If we can get some localized legislation, we [could] tap into that extra money we have sitting there and divert it into our park system and promote ecotourism," Ruge said.

The city budgeted funds for legislative activity, he said, and City Council will meet to discuss issues related to the upcoming legislative session so members "can all be on board."

"If we propose anything, they'll be local bills," Ruge said. "[It] isn't anything very radical."

PROPERTY TAX RELIEF

State Sen. Paul Bettencourt, R-Houston, filed a bill Nov. 29 that aims to reduce the tax burden on property owners, but San Marcos and other Central Texas cities along I-35 say the legislation

would do more harm than good.

Dubbed the Texas Property Tax Reform and Relief Act of 2017, Senate Bill 2 would lower the rollback tax rate and require voter approval for a rate in excess of the rollback rate.

The rollback tax rate is the rate that would raise the same amount of tax revenue as the previous year plus 8 percent. SB 2 would reduce the rollback rate from 8 percent to 4 percent and trigger an automatic tax ratification election when a city, county or special district exceeds the rollback rate, among other measures.

"Texas taxpayers have been facing property tax bills that are increasing 2.5 to 3 times faster than the median household income," Bettencourt said in a statement. "Throughout Texas, in hearing after hearing, the Select Committee heard the same message loud and clear: Texans are asking for and deserve property tax relief."

But the cities of Austin, San Marcos, New Braunfels and San Antonio would have lost at least \$770 million over the past decade under this law, according to a news release, while saving the average homeowner just a few dollars a month. Without this revenue, cities in the I-35 corridor will struggle to accommodate the rapid growth in the area, officials said.

"The state's proposal would negatively impact every resident who wants a street repaired, every neighborhood that seeks better police protection and every business that needs improved infrastructure to better serve their customers," San Marcos Mayor Daniel Guerrero said in a statement. "Texas cities are thriving, and this proposed legislation would stunt the progress we have made."



City officials have said they are hopeful the development will spur more homeownership in San Marcos.

Council Member John Thomaides said he was concerned about the potential for investors to buy up a large number of houses and rent them out, thus threatening the owner-occupied character of the development.

Steve Metcalfe, an attorney for the developer, said it would be very difficult to enforce a restriction on investors buying properties in the neighborhood. An investor could come into the neighborhood and buy 10 different properties using 10 different names, he said.

Instead the development will rely on the single-family occupancy limits within the city's zoning ordinance to help ensure the single-family residences are truly single-family. The multifamily portion of the development will have the same restrictions. The ordinance limits the number of unrelated people who can share a residence within certain zoning districts in the city.

HighPointe also plans to provide \$2.5 million in cash and in-kind assistance to the city to build a fire station within the development. City Manager Jared Miller said the station's proximity to homes within the neighborhood should lower some residents' home insurance rates.

Steve Vliss, president and CEO of HighPointe Communities, said the developer is aiming to attract first-time homebuyers. The Austin-area real estate market has grown at a fast pace, Vliss said, but some potential buyers have been left behind in that growth.

"We felt that was an underserved need, and it was only going to get more so over the next several years," Vliss said

Home prices in Trace will likely start below \$200.000. Vliss said.

OTHER EAST SIDE DEVELOPMENTS

In addition to Trace, developments have been planned on more than 3,000 acres east of I-35 in the city limits and extraterritorial jurisdiction—an area just outside the city limits where the city has limited control.

Cotton Center, a 2,358-acre development planned to be built east of the San Marcos Regional Airport, is planned to include single-family homes as well as parks and commercial space.

The project is being developed by Walton TX LP, a Canada-based real estate firm that is also planning the mixed-use Gas Lamp District in southeast San Marcos near the outlet malls.



Gillfillan said Walton is working with the city on the Gas Lamp District project, although there are currently no plans for construction to begin in the near future.

Whisper, a development located just south of Yarrington Road off the I-35 access road, is planned to include 600 single-family homes in its first phase. The development will also include 241 acres of commercial and retail space.

Assistant Planning Director Kristy Stark said the city is working with Robert McDonald, the project developer, on plans for the 706-acre property.

"Hopefully within the next couple of months you'll see that moving forward through [the planning and zoning commission] and through City Council," Stark said.

McDonald estimated work on the development's infrastructure would begin in early 2017.

Once roads are built within the development construction will begin on a 50,000-square-foot commercial building.

In early December, The LaSalle

Municipal Utility District, another community planned to be built northeast of San Marcos, requested an extension of its development timeline. Under the extension request, work on the community would likely not begin for a few years.

HOUSING AVAILABILITY

The city of San Marcos has historically issued fewer single-family home construction permits per year than neighboring communities.

In 2014 and 2015 the city issued 278 and 238 single-family home permits, respectively. From Jan. 1-Nov. 30, the city issued 330 single-family home permits.

The city of Kyle issued 507 single-family home permits from Jan. 1-Nov. 30. The city of Buda issued 291 during the same period. Buda's total

San Marcos officials said they are hopeful the new developments will help the city's housing inventory keep pace with the explosive growth the region is experiencing.

"It's going to hopefully change the balance of single-family and multifamily in San Marcos to owner-occupied versus rental and provide more opportunities for people to own a home," Miller said. "That's a difficult thing right now because the market is so sparse; there is a lot of competition out there."


