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

Pearland expands size through annexation ordinances

Process moved along due to SB 6, which requires voter approval for annexation as of Dec. 1

With the passage of Senate Bill 6, or the annexation bill, cities in large counties are now required to get voter approval for annexation. The bill went into effect Dec. 1.

As Pearland stretches into both Fort Bend and Harris counties, which are both larger than 500,000 residents, the city is directly affected by SB 6.

At the Nov. 27 meeting, Pearland

City Council passed ordinances 1548, 1549 and 1551, annexing areas A, C and L. While areas A and C, near CR 48 and McHard Road, respectively, were slated to be annexed in

Strained construction labor worsened by flood demand

Trade advocates work to recruit apprentices



Am I at-risk for contracting the measles in Brazoria County?

Over the last two weeks, Brazoria County officials reported they were in the process of confirming through blood work whether a Pearland student had the measles virus. Although the test showed it was not a confirmed case, it may have left many residents possibly wondering how the virus is spread.

Measles starts with fever, a runny nose, a cough, red eyes and a sore throat, which are followed by a rash that spreads across the body, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The virus is highly contagious and spreads through coughing and sneezing. More information can be found at www.cdc.gov/measles. Between Jan. 1 and Nov. 4, 120 people in 15 states were reported to have measles, according to the CDC. The majority of people who contracted the virus were unvaccinated, and the disease can spread in communities where groups are not vaccinated, according to the CDC.

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



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

COMPLETED PROJECT

Estimated timeline Project description

Construction on Winding Road began in December 2016 and ended in June 2017. Construction took place on the entire 2,508 feet of Winding Road in Friendswood and the street was completely rebuilt for \$868,787. There was no drainage work done. The project was presented to the City Council for completion at the November meeting.

December 2016-June 2017

FUTURE PROJECTS

2 Hughes Ranch Road expansion

The waterline for the Hughes Ranch Road project is currently being constructed. The city of Pearland plans to send in the bid for the project in mid-2018 so that construction can start in fiscal year 2018-19. Construction will include reconstruction of CR 403 from Cullen Boulevard to Smith Ranch Road from a two-lane asphalt open ditch roadway to a four-lane concrete curb and gutter boulevard for two miles.

Timeline: September 2018-2020

Cost: \$33,184,000

Funding source: city of Pearland, federal and state sources

Mykawa Road reconstruction

The city of Pearland has just submitted a design contract on the Mykawa Road project to the Texas Department of Transportation for its review. Construction on the three-mile stretch of Mykawa from Beltway 8 to FM 518 will consist of traffic signals, four-lane concrete curb and gutter-divided boulevard section roadway, including storm sewers, outfalls and detention.

Timeline: begins August 2020

Cost: \$40.033.000

Funding sources: city of Pearland, Houston-Galveston Area Council, TxDOT



HOW IT WORKS

Texas' farm-to-market road designations date back to pre-World War II

In unincorporated areas of Texas counties and less developed parts of cities, drivers may notice unconventional designations for roadways. Instead of highways, streets, roads, avenues or parkways, roads in these areas often have a FM-or farm-tomarket-designation.

In the years before and after World War II, these secondary roads were of great importance to rural travelers, according to a U.S. Department of the Interior study, Historic Road Infrastructure of Texas, 1866-1965.

The development of FM roads was integral to providing transport of farm and ranch produce to market, ensuring regular mail-delivery service and providing access to schools, medical care, church and social gatherings.

The first "feeder" roads—which served as precursors to the FM road system—were constructed in the 1930s using Works Progress Administration funding following President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal.

The development of the FM road network took shape following World War II with an increase in funding.

Texas Winter Games comes to Pearland

Statewide games move out of Frisco and into Pearland for 2 years

The Winter Games of Texas, a statewide Olympic-style amateur sporting event, will be held in Pearland on Jan. 12-14 for the first time.

For the past 12 years, the event has been held in Frisco. Pearland won a two-year bid from the Texas Amateur Athletic Federation to host the games in 2018 and 2019.

"The games have been in Frisco for quite some time and have become a regional draw rather than a statewide event," said Kim Sinistore, executive director of the Pearland Convention and Visitors Bureau.

After the two years in Pearland, different cities-Pearland included-can bid to have the games held in its city.

"It gives people the opportunity to get acclimated to the area ... We find that moving things around especially on this level is very beneficial for [the tourism] industry," Sinistore said.

Pearland has quick access to Hwy.

288, I-45, I-69 and the Sam Houston Parkway, making it ideal for sports tournament planners, Sinistore said.

"Because this event has been hosted in Frisco for so long, we do expect people coming from the Dallas-Fort Worth area," said Carry Capers, assistant director at the Pearland Parks and Recreation Department.

The Pearland Visitors Bureau is pairing with the city's parks and recreation department to host the games, which will consist of a three-day sporting event for amateur athletes.

"We're very excited to host this prestigious event in Pearland and [we] look forward to welcoming athletes from across the state to our city," Sinistore said.

The event is hosted by Texas Amateur Athletic Federation.

"TAAF is extremely excited about the confirmation of the city of Pearland hosting the 2018-2019 TAAF Winter Games of Texas. The location,

"The level of preparation is pretty extensive," Capers said.



Alvin ISD acquires Massey Ranch property

Minor boundary shift moves development into one district

The Massey Oaks development, Massey Ranch, was fully allocated to Alvin ISD in November.

The neighborhood is made up of 975 planned lots, 650 of which were originally allocated to AISD. The other 325 were allocated to Pearland ISD, said AISD.

The city of Pearland acquired the property in July through voluntary annexation and decided the area must be completely within one school district.

"Alvin ISD received a request from the land developer of Massey Oaks to reverse the 1996 transfer of 0.2 square miles of land from Alvin ISD to Pearland ISD," Alvin ISD Board President Nicole Tonini said. "After receiving the request, Alvin ISD along with the city of Pearland and Pearland ISD engaged in conversations largely focused on limiting the confusion associated with having a neighborhood divided by school district boundary lines."

Both districts agreed to a minor boundary change to give the schools completely to AISD- AISD at its Nov. 14 meeting and PISD at its Nov. 28 meeting.


While AISD has no existing plans to build schools in the development, it is a possibility in the future, said Daniel Combs, assistant superintendent of professional learning and student and community engagement.

"The location and timing of future schools is largely dependent on the number of students that reside in that particular geographic area and the available capacity of nearby schools," Combs said. "To this point, Alvin ISD has not formalized any plans regarding a future school in this development."

The Massey Oaks development was originally completely within AISD's boundaries. In 1996, roughly a third THE MASSEY RANCH PROPERTY

required that the entirety of Massey Ranch belong to one school district. AISD has acquired the full property.

of the development was transferred to PISD at the request of resident whose child attended a PISD school. Now that the child and their family have moved, Massey Oaks Development, LP, has bought the land and requested that the area be allocated back to AISD, according to Alvin ISD.

The request that Massey Ranch be allocated to one school district came from the Pearland City Council. The council moved to allow the developers to continue building Massey Ranch, but it had to belong to one district.

"Alvin ISD has been experiencing rapid student growth for a number of years and we anticipate this growth to be commonplace in our district for the foreseeable future. There are a number of current developments, some smaller and some that exceed 6,000 projected homes, within the Alvin ISD boundaries," Combs said.


Alvin ISD is currently building new schools in their district, which have been funded by the 2015 bond. Pomona Elementary and Shirley Dill Brothers Elementary opened for the 2017-2018 school year.

"The addition of the Massey Oaks development will be handled in much the same way Alvin ISD works to accommodate students from across our district," Combs said.

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Marrone Market

Friendswood store sells high-end antiques

haron Brown opened Marrone Market in Friendswood two years ago after working with antiques in the Memorial area of Houston.

Brown's store features an eclectic collection of items from all of over the world, as well as gift pieces, such as cosmetics, stationery and kitchen ware.

"I only buy what I love," she said. Brown began her business selling antiques in another storefront in the Memorial area, which is where she learned how to spot an authentic antique from a fake.

"I learned the trade in the first two years," Brown said.

Brown picked up a love of antiques while traveling. While traveling abroad with family, she picked up a couple pieces for the store, including signed lithographs, or prints, from Italy.

"I just loved the character," Brown said. "It's just so much about life."

While she was in Italy, she also signed a contract with Gori 1919, an Italian soap company that sells soap made from olive oil. The Gori soap is one of the store's most popular items,

Brown said.

Many of Brown's pieces are a bit pricey, due the age, authenticity and rarity of some of the antiques.



Mediterranean mainstay celebrates 30 years in Pearland

araiz Karafa has always loved cooking, but she never dreamed of opening a restaurant.

Her first catering job, which eventually led to her opening Cafe Taraiz in Pearland, was a friend's wedding.

"When she came to my daughter's baptism, she saw the food and she said, 'I want this food at my wedding,' and I said, 'I don't know where you get it,' and she goes, 'You,'" Karafa said. "I did her wedding in '86, and I left there with a page full of names wanting me to [cater] their parties."

Karafa launched her catering business in 1987 in Pearland. After catering numerous parties, friends asked her to open a restaurant where she could offer her Mediterranean and American dishes, Karafa said. "We started off with a bang because there was nothing here in Pearland," Karafa said, "When we started off 30 years ago, we were the only restaurant that wasn't Mexican or barbecue."

When Karafa opened her restaurant at 2401 S. Washington, Pearland, it was called Taraiz Gourmet. When she moved to her current location at 9415 Broadway St., Pearland, seven years ago, Karafa renamed the restaurant Cafe Taraiz.

"Thirty years ago, everyone who walked in, you knew who they were. You knew their name and who they were because the community was a small community," Karafa said. "But now, we get people from Sugar Land, from all over the Houston area."

The growth has not only brought


more residents, it has brought more restaurants to the city as well, she said.

"They're still opening [restaurants]," Karafa said. Every time I lift a finger, a new one is coming in. But they don't last very long. They open and close, they open and close. When new restaurants open, people go and try [them], and then they come back because they know this is steady and always the same."

Cafe Taraiz still serves both American and Mediterranean food. Karafa will tweak the American food options, and experiment with Italian, Cajun or French recipes, but the Mediterranean food always stays the same.

"We make everything like my mom and grandma made it," Karafa said.





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Westwood Elementary

Friendswood elementary school still intact 50 years later

n October, Westwood Elementary School in Friendswood ISD turned 50 years old. Former Principal Lynn Hobratschk notes the technology at Westwood Elementary is one of the biggest changes at the school over the years.

"Since I've been there, the technology is really stepping up," Hobratschk said.

Hobratschk was principal of Westwood from 2004-2012. During that time, she worked with the PTO to get laptops for the teachers in 2004. The school's PTO was established in 1968, one year after the school opened.

"We were probably one of the first campuses [in the district] to give each of our teachers a laptop computer. Teachers in the district were accustomed to having desktops," Hobratschk said.

Other than the technology, not much changed in Westwood over her years as principal.

"Westwood had so much rich history and so much pride within it that it wasn't something to change; it was just something to keep developing," Hobratschk said.

Located at 506 W. Edgewood Drive, Friendswood, the school still stands in its original building. The office wing of the building was added in 1993.

As the oldest of FISD's elementary and intermediate schools, Westwood was built

in 1967.

It currently holds pre-K through second grade.

At one point, Westwood held 900 students, and operated out of portable classrooms as well as the elementary school. After this, Bales Intermediate School was opened in 1994.

Westwood has decreased in enrollment over the years.


When Hobratschk was principal, the school had around 700 students. Now, the enrollment numbers are closer to 500. This is due to more schools in the district being open as well as a decrease in students in the district, Hobratschk said.

One of the traditions Westwood has carried on is being named a School of Character.

Westwood was named a school of character in 2007, during Hobratschk's tenure. According to Hobratschk, this is one of the primary focuses at Westwood.


"That character development has been great at that school, and we believe in working with the whole child and that continues to be a focus," Hobratschk said.

fiscal year 2017, Area L was meant to be annexed at a later date.

"The city of Pearland, as well as other cities have prioritized annexation," Council Member Trent Perez said. "We have been honest with people that the passing of Senate Bill 6 is a motivation."

ANNEXATION BEFORE DECEMBER

Each of the areas up for annexation are part of Pearland's extraterritorial jurisdiction, an unincorporated area the city has regulatory power over. Pearland, like many larger cities, has an ETJ with the intention of eventually incorporating into the city, City Manager Clay Pearson said.

"The city of Pearland, like many fast growth cities, has had an ETJ, a future growth area," Pearson said. "Sometimes [ETJ] comes in ... a developer

brings those into the city, [other] times there are areas that have strategic partnership agreements. Sometimes, its major road projects like Bailey Road [that lead to annexation]."

SB 6 divides counties and

municipalities, including cities, into two groups. Pearland is a Tier 2 municipality, which means it is located in one or more counties with more than 500,000 people.

Under SB 6, residents in an ETJ that Tier 2 municipalities want to annex are allowed to vote on the annexation. Voter approval in areas being annexed is now required as of Dec. 1.

"To me, it was just a bad timing on it. It wasn't our fault; it was the Legislature's fault," Council Member Woody Owens said.

Ordinance 1548 proposed annexation of Area A, which consists of approximately 895 acres within Brazoria County, located north of MUD 22, east of CR 564, south of CR 92 and west of CR 48, according to the city of Pearland.

Ordinance 1549 proposed annexation of Area C, which consists of approximately 20 acres, containing

three parcels. Area C is located north of McHard Road, abutting Clear Creek, according to the city of Pearland.

Ordinance 1551 proposed annexation of Area L, which contains 1,004 acres northeast of Hwy. 35, between Dixie Farm Road and CR 129, according to the city. Area L included the Pearland Regional Airport.

Originally, the council was also presented with ordinances 1550 and 1552, which called for the annexation of areas I and P, respectively.

Area I consisted of 338 acres located near Southbelt Industrial Drive, west of Almeda School Road, south of Beltway 8 and east of FM 521, according to the city of Pearland.

Area P consisted of 281 acres located south of Magnolia Road, north of Bailey Road, west of Manvel Road and east of Webber Drive and Deerbrook Court, according to the city of Pearland.

Council Member Keith Ordeneaux has said he would be fine with ETJ citizens voting on the annexation, if the citizens in the city could vote as well.

"As I have stated many times in public meetings, I would have been OK with the state allowing everyone affected by an annexation to have a voice; but this would have to include the existing city taxpayer that are currently in the city as their taxes fund current and future service to the ETJ, which as of today has paid no property taxes towards these services or investments," Ordeneaux said in a written statement.

EFFECTS OF ANNEXATION

Because the ETJ is not incorporated into the area, its residents do not pay

property taxes to the city. However, the city does provide some services to the ETJ through service agreements.

The city did a study in 2016 tracking how much the taxpayers pay to the ETJ's fire services. The study found taxpayers spent an estimated \$1.74 million on fire services in the city's ETJ. This is 17 percent of the city's fire services budget, which is nearly \$10.25 million.

After SB 6 was passed in the summer, the annexation of areas A and C were going to be discussed in fiscal year 2017. Areas I, L and P were added due their potential for growth, Pearson said.

"All of these areas are already next to very developed and heavily invested roads and utilities and next to our existing 120,000 residents," Pearson said.

Since the bill was passed, the City

Council moved all areas up to be considered in November. Area P was voted down, 4-3, at the Nov. 13 meeting, taking it off the agenda indefinitely, Pearson said. Area I was passed over without any action at the Nov. 27 meeting.

With annexation, these Areas A, C and L will receive more city services, such as water and sewer. However, it may be 10-12 years before water and

sewer treatments are installed, Owens said.

With annexation, residents will also pay taxes to the cities, and will be required to get building permits from the city.

Council members are divided on the topic of annexation.

Perez said he supports the annexation of the areas because of the need for growth.

"I firmly believe that annexation is a necessary part of a city's growth," Perez said.

Council Member J. David Little has voted in favor of annexation for the areas he believes are primarily industrial, he said.

"It doesn't affect individual citizens; it doesn't affect people that live in those areas. I was looking at it from their per-

spective," Little said.

Like Little, Owens voted for the annexation of areas that did not affect ETJ residents.

"I only voted in the one area to approve that, and that's C. That's the 20 acres off of Cullen and nobody lives there. Nobody is hurt," Owens said.

Area L, which contained 1,004 acres northeast of Hwy. 35, between Dixie

Farm Road and CR 129, became smaller during the Nov. 13 meeting when Perez proposed an amendment.

"The priority for me is the airport area," Perez said.

With the amendment, Little voted for the annexation of Area L on Nov. 13. Little was absent from the Nov. 27 meeting.

"Once [Council Member] Perez removed the residential areas, I was for that," Little said. "I was prepared to vote against it otherwise."

Like Little, Owens is in favor of annexation that does not affect residents.

"The time period is wrong right now. Everything that happened with [Hurricane] Harvey, it's a difficult pill to swallow right now," Owens said. "It's a big problem. Personally, I hate to see people go through this. They moved out for a reason, and I respect that."

Stephen Alexander, one of three owners of the Texas Aviation Partners said annexation of the Pearland Regional Airport could be beneficial. Texas Aviation Partners manages Pearland Regional Airport.

"We are excited for what the future opportunities will be and what the infrastructure plans are," Alexander said. "Those are all key factors to the airport's vitality. We don't have a lot of information from the city [on plans for infrastructure improvements], but we are very much looking forward to what those plans are, which will only in turn assist and facilitate the growth of the airport."





As of Dec. 1, 2017, residents of an area being annexed must approve the annexation if they reside in a county of 500,000 residents or more.



The Texas Legislature passed Senate Bill 6 in August. SB 6 states citizens in a city's extraterritorial jurisdiction must be allowed to vote on annexation. The bill went into effect Dec. 1.

are usually more expensive to hire than unlicensed, nonunion companies, but said the adage, "You get what you pay for," rings true.

"Just like when you go to the grocery store and you have a name brand and the generic right next to it, we're the name brand," Puente said.

Homeowners can take steps to protect themselves from less reputable

contractors, according to the Federal Trade Commission. The FTC recommends on its website that homeowners get written requests from multiple contractors, sign a contract in advance money being exchanged and never pay in cash.

Lord, Puente and the FTC said a reputable contractor will be willing to provide a license from the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation for electricians and insulation installers and the Texas State Board of Plumbing Examiners for plumbers.

But Jeff Reina, co-owner of TriFection Remodeling and Construction, a general contractor that serves the Greater Houston area, understands that homeowners are anxious to get back to normal after the flooding.

"In the short term, there's a lot

of people out there that—because they're getting a little desperate will start using whoever [is available] on their homes," Lord said. "It may damage their home, which is a major investment."

> "We're a growing company, so we're always looking for skilled labor. We've got a reduced ability to find skilled trade labor," Reina said. "It was an

issue, even before the hurricane."

Retiring workers, limited knowledge of the field and its pay are worsening the construction labor shortage, said Lisa Givens, Texas Workforce Commission director of communications.

"Even though it may be that kids in high school think this is not a viable option, if you're doing an apprenticeship, you're getting paid," Givens said.

According to the TWC website, salaries for skilled construction labor at the apprentice level start at about \$30,000.

"I'd just say in general across our society, there has just been a shift away from vocational training in our schools," Reina said.

The skilled trades are in high demand right now, said Michelle Ramirez, the strategic planning manager at the Workforce Solutions office, which covers the Houston-Galveston region, including the Pearland and Friendswood areas.

Construction jobs make up about 7 percent of the Houston metro area's economy, according to reports provided by Workforce Solutions.



"Even the city of Houston needs craftsmen. [It is] repairing public facilities, and we know they are trying to fill at least 400 jobs," Ramirez said.

Reina said because he works for a growing company, the company is always looking for skilled labor.

"It's been an active push to build up trade schools and get more skilled labor," he said. "It was an issue, even before [Hurricane Harvey hit]."

After the storm, it became an even bigger challenge, Reina said.

"Given that you have a situation with tremendously greater demand for rebuilding homes than the current supply ... there's a meaningful shortage out there," he said. "That's why

there are homeowners that are struggling to find contractors that are able to put their home back together anytime soon."

RECRUITING CHALLENGES AND TOOLS

To aid in the Harvey recovery effort, PLU 68, which represents plumbers throughout the Greater Houston area, is working with the Texas Board of Plumbing Examiners to help qualified individuals from out of state obtain temporary permits, Lord said.

The challenge with temporary permitting is ensuring those receiving permits can do the work correctly, Puente said.

Both PLU 68 and the council

perform outreach in schools in the Greater Houston area, the goal being to get shop classes back in schools to teach the basics, Lord and Puente said.

PLU 68 has a \$1.9 million apprenticeship program for the Greater Houston area. The program includes classroom and hands-on work as well as building code instruction for safety reasons, Lord said.

For the current semester, the union accepted about 120 out of more than 400 applicants for the apprenticeship program, Lord said. But younger applicants often cannot pass basic skills testing such as reading a measuring tape or reading basic diagrams.

Puente said one of the challenges is to ensure that apprentices have a mentor, as unions maintain a ratio of no more than two apprentices per journeyman on a job site.

He and Lord both said the trades have gotten a false reputation of being less respectable than a white-collar job that requires a college education.

"At the moment there are not enough [construction professionals]," Puente said. "All of [the construction trades] are short-staffed because of the amount of work that's out there and the need."






