

Drainage projects to cost Friendswood \$32 million

Committee presents findings after months of research, projects to take years to complete

The city-appointed drainage committee's recommendations presented would take 15 years to get started, with Friendswood contributing roughly \$32 million, an amount the city does not have in its general fund.

The committee gathered data, observations and

recommendations on how to solve the city's drainage problems. The committee presented the information at the April 1 city council meeting.



Where can political candidates post campaign signs in city limits?

During election season, voters will see campaign signs all over Pearland and Friendswood. To place a sign in a person's yard, the candidate must have the property owner's consent. This also applies to private property that runs along a major roadway.

The Texas Department of Transportation has regulations on where a campaign sign can be placed in a public area. Signs cannot be placed in a right of way, which includes posting signs on trees, telephone poles and traffic signs. If a sign is in the right of way or poses a potential traffic hazard, TxDOT has the right to remove it, according to TxDOT's website.

Both Pearland and Friendswood have additional regulations cited in the code of ordinances for both cities. Notably, signs cannot exceed 36 square feet nor can signs be more than 8 feet from the ground. Also, in Friendswood, signs must be removed within 24 hours of the election date.



ONGOING PROJECTS

1 Hughes Ranch Road expansion

Triple B received notice to proceed on the Hughes Ranch Road project on March 27, beginning the construction process. The road will be converted from a two- to fourlane road with a median and curbs from Smith Ranch Road to Cullen Boulevard.

Timeline: March 2019-February 2021

Cost: \$20.5 million

Funding source: city of Pearland

2 Blackhawk Boulevard reconstruction

The end of construction on Blackhawk has been pushed back to the fall due to rain. The project includes improvements from Friendswood Link Road to Edenvale Street. Improvements include replacement of over 6,000 feet of concrete paving, replacement of curb and gutter and evaluation of existing utilities.

Timeline: June 2018-October 2019

Cost: \$4.58 million

Funding sources: 2013 Friendswood bond

FUTURE PROJECTS

3 Broadway Street widening

The Texas Department of Transportation hosted a public hearing on the Broadway



Street widening project on March 26. The project, which will widen Broadway Street from Hwy. 288 to McLean Road, will consist of widening the road from four to six lanes, constructing an 18 foot raised median and 5-foot-wide sidewalks, converting open ditches to curbs and gutters. Once funded, construction will take three years.

Timeline: TBD **Cost:** \$57 million

Funding sources: TBD

4 Friendswood Lakes Boulevard construction

School brings gift of music to residents

or Heather Scharbor, a place for people to learn music is vital to any community.

"I think we are wired for music, and I think it is such a special gift. ... It makes our lives happy," Scharbor said. "It's good for us in every way possible."

Scharbor brings music to the Pearland community with her business, Allegro Pearland Academy of Music. The conservatory offers lessons for children and adults. The students perform in recitals, at Pearland's Fusion of the Arts and at local nursing homes, which is one of Scharbor's favorite events.

"It's this beautiful experience for the resident and the child because the child gets to see what an impact their music can have on others," she said. "They all have these stories and they say, 'Keep playing,' and they encourage the students."

Scharbor started the business in 2011 and moved to a permanent space in February 2018. After eight years of operation, the business teaches 11 instruments-including piano, violin, guitar, and Scottish bagpipes—and boasts over 400 students and 30

"You have to have the heart for the mission of the school," she said.


For Scharbor, the music mentors teach students music but also aid students' overall well-being.







La Escondida Mexican Grill

Eatery offers traditional Mexican, Tex-Mex dishes

hen Sergio Espinosa opened La Escondida Mexican Grill, he wanted guests to feel as if they were stepping into Mexico with its culture of genuine Hispanic hospitality, he said.

"The best vacation in the world is always Mexico because the people there, they just want to serve you ... and love you," Espinosa said.

Both the Friendswood and Missouri City locations offer a full menu for breakfast, lunch and dinner. La Escondida features everything—from authentic Mexican fare to street tacos to Tex-Mex favorites, all made from scratch. Espinosa's roots reach both to Mexico City, where he was born, and Houston, where he spent most of his teens. He also spent the bulk of his childhood in Louisiana and refers to himself as a "Cajun Mexican."


Assistant Manager Gabriel Rodriguez said fajitas are the most-popular dish. However, General Manager Larry Baca prefers the tequila barbecue carnitas tacos, part of the Taco Tuesday menu.

"Tequila barbecue carnitas tacos are the best because they have fresh homemade corn tortillas, the fresh carnitas. I love the barbecue sauce, and we make our own recipe," Baca said. "We add some tequila, some jalapeno and some onions."

Small pieces of pork, red cabbage salad mix, barbecue sauce and cotija, a white Mexican cheese, go into a corn tortilla to create the dish.

The first La Escondida opened in 1999 in Stafford after Sergio and wife, Lisha, did some soul searching and praying. The restaurant moved to Missouri City in 2006. In 2016, Espinosa opened the Friendswood restaurant in light of his son Daniel's interest in the restaurant business. His son's interest has prompted the restaurant owner's interest in expansion, Espinosa said

"Now that our son wants to get involved in it, we better start growing the company," Sergio said.

is going to vote for it," said James Stahl, a Friendswood resident and a drainage committee member who presented the committee's findings at the April 1 meeting. If some of the proposed changes had been in place during Hurricane Harvey, 850 homes would have flooded as opposed to the 2,830 that did flood, said Lee Coggins, a Friendswood resident and drainage committee member who presented the committee's findings alongside Stahl.

The funding will be included in the city's bond, which will likely be on the November ballot. Council Member John Scott said he is not worried about citizens voting for the drainage resolutions on the November bond.

"I am all for taking it to the citizens advisory committee and having the citizens vote on the bond to approve funding," Scott said.

The overall cost of projects will be roughly \$173 million. Because of this, the projects will require regional help as well as a lot of time, city officials said.

"Friendswood can't go at it alone. Projects will benefit all parties, everyone in the watershed, but the dollar amount that we are talking about far exceeds the city's operations budget, and it far exceeds our obligations as a city," City Manager Morad Kabiri said. "That being said, we realize it is important and are happy to lead the charge. We are going to need partners."

A HISTORY OF FLOODING

The drainage committee took an approach which included observations, data gathering, analysis over a nine-month period. The data ranged from what kind of storms hit and hurt the city as well as a list of projects that could mitigate flooding, Council

Member and drainage committee member Steve Rockey said.

"One of the things we found when we studied other places is it takes a long time, and there is not an easy fix," Rockey said.

The major waterway through Friendswood is Clear Creek, which originates northwest of the city and flows through, meaning Friendswood takes in water from the downstream flow as well as rainwater.

"Clear Creek starts in Fort Bend [County] and meanders its way to us. The water that hits Friendswood is only about 40 percent of water we get in Friendswood," Rockey said. "Friendswood happens to be where seven creeks meet. Our calculations are that when Harvey happened, only 7 percent actually fell on Friendswood, and 93 percent fell somewhere else and came towards us."

Because of this, one of the biggest things the drainage committee had to consider is the city is dealing with the effects of storms as that trickles down to Friendswood.

The committee determined flooding is essentially caused by an inability to drain water as fast as it is coming in. While the committee cannot control the water that drains into Friendswood either from the creek or a storm, the city can control the rate the water leaves the city as well as the amount of water the creek can store to an extent which would be done by de-snagging and terracing, Stahl said.

"The Army Corps of Engineers stated in June 2016 that if we [de-snagged] 20 feet up to the water line, we could reduce damages by 30 percent. We could do that in a matter of months," Galveston County Commissioner Ken Clark said.



Water that is stored can be stored into the soil, by a dam or by widening the river.

THE RESOLUTIONS

The committee presented five resolutions, ranging from asking council to approve the work the committee has done to presenting options on how to clear the creek. The committee worked with Rice University professor Philip Bedient to determine the best possible combination to decrease flooding in the area and lessen the effects of flooding downstream from the city.

While the committee has presented potential resolutions, this does not mean any will take effect immediately. In May, council will vote on a resolution to approve the work the committee has done so far and end the existing committee's work, leaving the remaining work in the hands of city staff.

The citizens advisory committee for the bond will put together individual drainage propositions based on the recommendations the committee gave. The bond committee will be in charge of deciding the drainage projects included in the bond as well as the cost. De-snagging the creek, terracing the creek and raising the bridge at FM 2351 would lessen the effects of flooding at the creek for Friendswood without affecting downstream cities, including League City, Coggins said.

Coggins reported this combination would have decreased flooding during Harvey by 3.5 feet.

"We saw that there was no negative effect for residents downstream," Coggins said. "That is very important to realize."

De-snagging the creek consists of

removing the vegetation around the creek. Terracing cutting a notch out on either side of the creek at the top, effectively creating a channel. This leaves more room for the water to travel or be stored.

"That appears to be the low-hanging fruit that really seems to really get some things done, from Bay Area Boulevard to 528 bridge or at least to Whispering Pines bridge," Council Member Robert Griffon said.

Before any of this is accomplished, the city will have to buy out property along Clear Creek.

"Without the properties, none of these projects are feasible," Kabiri

The city will conduct buyouts as the grant money comes available, as it did for Frenchman's Creek, Kabiri said.

POTENTIAL CHALLENGES

While the drainage committee has presented the resolutions, there are still things that need to be done for the projects to be completed successfully, with funding being one of the biggest hurdles to jump, Kabiri said.

"We need to know that [residents] are committed to funding this. Longterm challenges are going to be that of a constancy of purpose," Kabiri said.

Even if the bond is passed in November to partially fund drainage projects, the projects will be far from completed, he said.

"I know immediately after Harvey,



there was a desire to fix everything quickly," Kabiri said. "Obviously the nature of this problem far exceeds a quick solution, and we're grateful to come to the point where we are right now, but our work is not done by any stretch of the imagination."

The city needs to have a constancy of purpose or a knowledge of why the city is doing a project for the duration of it, Rockey said. The projects that have been the most successful in surrounding regions have been ones with this, he said.

"These undertakings are those that last from anywhere from 10-20 years,

and those depend on outside agencies such as the state and federal government participating with us," Kabiri said. "Due to the regional impact, we will have to go at this for quite a number of years and continue to pursue and maintain the same level of intensity throughout the entire process."

The committee proposed the city hire someone to manage draining and related projects long-term. This will ensure the committee's contributions become a living, breathing document, Kabiri said.


Even with a bond, the city would be unable to entirely fund the whole number of projects. Because of this, both the construction and the expense of larger projects could be shared by different cities and counties, Clark said.

"This is going to take regional cooperation because the last thing we want to do is move the flooding from one community to another community," Clark said. "We need to come up with

an approach to solve the flooding, which is going to take all communi-

National funding is also a possibility, but the number of stipulations attached to the money makes it harder to use, Clark said.

After a 60-year study, the Army Corps of Engineers allocated money dedicated to fixing Clear Creek, as Community Impact Newspaper previously reported. However, the Army Corps and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development both require that areas using money meet certain low-to-moderate income thresholds. which Friendswood does not necessarily meet.

"One type of challenge is that any type of drainage costs money to do, so we are going to have to come up with the money for that," Clark said. "Coming up with solutions is a good first

step, but we are going to have to come up a funding mechanism as well as ways to address this problem."

Shared funding will be mandatory for the larger projects, Rockey said.

"The reality is that to enact the projects we think are important is \$180 million worth of projects. We do not have that money. But we do need to put up some of our own money to entice the state, regional or national sources," Rockey said.

The long-term projects could take decades once funded. However, the result could be less flooding for more residents in and out of Friendswood.

"In terms of order of magnitude, this would be one of the most impactful undertakings Friendswood has ever done in its history," Kabiri said.



"There will be five propositions, each considered on their own merits. We will have a pot of money for the projects. ... There is an option to spend less. That's typically what happens in the real world," Pearson said.

The proposed increase to the interest and sinking rate is \$0.0375.

The last bond Pearland passed was in 2007. The \$162 million bond helped build the Pearland Recreation Center and Natatorium, extend Pearland Parkway and widen Cullen Road. The

2007 projects are in the design or construction phase. This, combined with the city's population and property valuation growth, has made this the perfect time for a bond, City Manager Clay Pearson said.

"Bonds are just one way we finance projects," Pearson said. "This is not the only funding source or the end of the [capital improvement plan]."

PROJECT DETAILS

One of the most expensive projects on the bond is drainage improvements—totaling \$15.9 million—in the Willowcrest subdivision, where Harold Isidori lives. Isidori has been a Pearland resident for more than 40 years and will likely at least be voting for the drainage improvements and the animal shelter, he said.

"I saw the drainage item on the bond, and I'm probably going to vote for it and the animal shelter, too, because I trust the city has done its research," Isidori said.

The city's research includes prioritizing projects based on need, time and expense. Each of the items is something that was originally on a five-year capital improvement plan and needed substantial funding and time rather than just maintenance work, Pearson said

"There is always more projects that everyone would like to do; we make choices and recommendations, and the process goes back and forth," Pearson said.

The projects are also determined by department heads and are narrowed down depending on the funding needed and the time the project would take to get up and running, Director of Engineering Robert Upton said. But ultimately, the decision is made by council, he said.

"City Council had us look at what it would be for a \$70 million bond, a \$90 million bond and a \$120 million bond," Upton said. "Our goal is to get the projects started and nearly completed within the first five years."

The three projects with the biggest price tags are the drainage in the Willowcrest subdivision, the Bailey Road expansion and the animal shelter, coming in at \$15.9 million, \$19 million and \$13 million, respectively.

The city completed Bailey Road reconstruction in 2017, but there is more work to be done.

In the past, the city received outside funding from the Houston-Galveston Area Council's Transportation Improvement Program.

While it is a possibility the city may receive money from H-GAC for these projects to help offset funding, the bond money prepares the city to pay for these road projects as a whole, Pearson said.

The project would widen Bailey Road from a two- to four-lane roadway from Hwy. 35 to Veterans Drive, and add a second bridge, arguably making Bailey another major horizontal thoroughfare for the city.

Another facility included in the bond is the new fire training burn building, which would provide a training space for the city's firefighters, according to the city's bond proposal. The new burn building would include stairs, rooms and a sloped roof.

The bond also dedicates \$2.5 million to the park equipment replacement program.

RESTORING AND REPAIRING DRAINAGE

The Willowcrest drainage project will include replacement of curb inlets and a storm system, as will other drainage projects on the list, according to the bond proposition presented in December.

The bond also includes drainage projects on Piper Road in the Mimosa Acres and West Lea subdivisions and Phase 2 of the Hickory Slough detention pond.

"After [Hurricane] Harvey, the engineering staff went through and saw all of the areas that were inundated with Harvey. We also looked not just in light of Harvey, but areas that have still repeatedly flooded," Upton said.

While the city looked at areas that flooded after Harvey, the bond projects will address 10- and 25-year storms, or storms that have a 10 percent chance and a 4 percent chance of happening each year, respectively. There is no way the city could ward off the flooding the older areas saw during Harvey, long-time Pearland resident Robert Wagoner said.

"It's a difficult subject, and everybody wants something done about it, but unfortunately, I don't think there's anything they can do about it," Wagoner said. The drainage improvements will restore the road side ditches to the original design capacity and will look for ways to provide improved capacity in those areas, Upton said. Undersized storm sewer systems will be replaced with a system that meets city standards, Upton said.

"We can't fix everything, but we want to return the drainage facilities in these areas to their original standard, or if we can improve them, we will then do those improvements," Upton said.

ANIMAL SHELTER WOES

One of the most expensive and contentious items on the bond is the new animal shelter, rounding in at over \$13 million. While the city needs a new animal shelter, the \$13 million price is too steep, Council Member David Little said.

"I would say we're at \$13 million; I would think we need something in the \$9 million range," he said.

While Little said the price is high, the animal shelter is a necessity, he said.

The new animal shelter will include heating, ventilation and air conditioning, sound control, and proper drainage, as well as natural light in the animal cells and exercise areas for its \$13 million price tag. The location of the

new shelter has not been determined.

The new shelter, as well as a new location, are essential, Pearland resident and veterinary technician Rachel Alder said.

"I actually live on the street that the current animal shelter is on. It's very hidden; a lot of people don't know it's there," Alder said.

The shelter, located on Old Alvin Road, is at capacity most days, according to the city's bond proposal.

"The animal shelter is antiquated and undersized for the city of Pearland," Pearson said. "We want to provide a safe and clean environment not only for the animals but for the people that work there as well."

The current shelter holds 83 animals and typically houses 63. Because of this, the shelter has had to turn away strays to avoid euthanasia, Alder said. The new shelter will hold 220 animals, catering to the city's needs now and in the future, according to the city's bond proposal.

"I don't know how big they are trying to make it, but Pearland is huge. For such a large area, this one is really small," Alder said.




