Cedar Park mulls food trailer rules

Input from cities, chamber, public could influence mobile operations

By Emilie Lutostanski

When entrepreneurs Andy and Mai Lan Bradford sought to open a food trailer in Cedar Park earlier this year, they discovered the city lacks any specific direction on how or if mobile food vendors can operate.

"One thing I noticed is nothing regulates the food truck business," Andy Bradford said.

Cedar Park ordinances permit two types of vendors: peddlers such as ice cream trucks which can stop on the roadside for a maximum of 15 minutes to sell merchandise, and seasonal vendors such as snow cone stands, which can be set up for 30–60 days. No provisions exist for mobile food vendors.

"As the popularity of food trucks has increased in our region, we have received inquiries from a variety of different types of mobile food vendors," Assistant City Manager Josh Selleck said in a statement. "In the past we've been able to accommodate these users [only] when they fit within the existing code."

Spurred by the interest of potential vendors, in July City Council discussed how the city might regulate food trailers and asked staff to bring back options to consider.

"Staff will be looking at guidelines and

models from various other cities in the area in order to determine a model that best fits Cedar Park," Selleck said. "Additionally we will be collecting input received from the community, the chamber of commerce, and restaurant owners [and] managers. The Cedar Park [food trailer] model will need to work in conjunction with the frameworks established by state and county regulations."

City staffers said they anticipate bringing back initial information to City Council in late August or September.

An array of options

During the past two years, Austin-area cities such as Buda, Hutto and Round Rock have tackled the issue of regulating food trailers within their city limits. In September 2012, Round Rock City Council approved a one-year development agreement with the owner of a parcel of downtown land on which 12 independent food trailers were allowed to operate in accordance with Williamson County health regulations.

Land-use plan to guide P&Z, City Council decisions

Leander residents can see exactly where city leaders will promote future commercial development after City Council voted to approve the city's first future land-use plan Aug. 7.

The plan envisions specific types of commercial development at the intersections of major highways and local roads. By mapping the anticipated growth areas, members of the Leander Planning and Zoning Commission and City Council created an official guide for making future zoning decisions that encourage construction of


successful retail centers in Leander, said Tom Yantis, Leander director of Development Services.

"Previously we didn't have this tool in place to help us determine: Is this the right location for the requested zoning of this piece of property?" Yantis said. "What we hope is that [the future land-use plan] achieves, over time, concentrations of commercial and high-density residential and office districts at these key intersections."

Capital Metro receives \$50 million from TxDOT for MetroRail expansion

Capital Metro is moving forward with plans to upgrade its downtown Metro-Rail station and purchase four new rail cars that will double the capacity of the 32-mile commuter line through a \$50 million grant from the Texas Department of Transportation.

The Texas Transportation Commission—the governing board for TxDOT—approved awarding the grant June 26.

"The additional rail cars will allow us to run at higher levels of benefit," said Todd Hemingson, Capital Metro's vice president of strategic planning and development. "We see a need for that. We think the demand would be there."

The additional funding—combined with an \$11.3 million Transportation Investment Generating Economic Recovery, or TIGER, grant from the Federal Transit Administration and \$18 million from Capital Metro—will enable the transit agency to shave train headways, or the timee between rail vehicles, from 34 minutes to 15 minutes during peak hours.

Depending on the availability of future funding, Capital Metro will may be able to add a MetroRail train after 7 p.m., Hemingson said.

Upgrading the downtown station at the Austin Convention Center will allow Capital Metro to shift the station farther to the east and have three tracks and two platforms, Hemingson said.

"The station will be a much more inviting environment and more comfortable with more space on the platform," Hemingson said.


Capital Metro has been speaking with area stakeholders, including the city of Austin, Hilton Austin Hotel and the convention center, about transforming the area surrounding the station into a gateway to Austin with a transit and pedestrian plaza.

The transit agency has not yet set a timeline on construction or purchasing the new rail cars, but Hemingson said design is about 10 percent complete.

The \$11.3 million TIGER grant will allow the agency to add siding, also known as double tracking, near the Lakeline, Howard and Crestview stations for increased capacity. The money will also help to realign a portion of the tracks in East Austin.

Included in the \$29.3 million from the TIGER grant and Capital Metro funds is \$6.2 million for the double tracking and \$2 million to modify the MetroRail cars. Upgraded rail cars will allow MetroRail and freight to operate at the same time.

Capital Metro plans to start construction on these upgrades in 2015.

Districts prepare for SAT changes

Entrance exam will change scoring and make essays optional

When current high school freshmen take the SAT tests in 2016—as well as those who take the college readiness assessment exam in subsequent years—they will encounter a redesigned test focused on eight key changes made by College Board, a not-for-profit organization in charge of the SAT and the Advanced Placement Program.

Major updates include a new focus on practical vocabulary words; questions that assess how students interpret and use information sources; a new essay portion in which students will analyze an information source; a new approach to math that will stress algebra, percentages and ratios; the addition of more analytical questions in math and social studies; and a new focus on important historical documents such as the U.S. Constitution and the Declaration of Independence. There will also be no penalty for wrong answers.

Along with the eight key changes the scoring system has been changed from a possible maximum score of 2400—800 for math, 800 for reading comprehension and 800 for writing—to 1600 with the essay section of the test being optional.

The newest changes negate some of the previous updates made to the test in 2005 when the essay section was introduced and the maximum score was increased from 1600 to 2400.

Martha Salazar-Zamora, deputy superintendent of instruction and administration at Round Rock ISD, said the changes are a welcome step that will bring the SAT into better alignment with the knowledge and skills students need for college.

"I think that this redesign is definitely a positive step for [the] SAT," Salazar-Zamora said. "There's a tighter focus. There's going to be an emphasis on relevant rather than obscure vocabulary. There is greater use of real-world context and analysis of expository text from a wide range of disciplines."


Lisa Brittain, Leander ISD director of college and career readiness, said many of the same preparatory tools used for the current version of the test will remain in the future. Students will still be able to take preparatory assessments such as the pre-SAT, or PSAT, and the ReadiStep exam before tackling the new SAT.

"The new PSAT and ReadiStep exams will launch prior to the SAT in October 2015," Brittain said. "Leander ISD students are provided the opportunity during the school day—at no cost to all students—to take the ReadiStep in eighth grade and then the PSAT in ninth through 11th grades. Since these exams will also be redesigned and released before the spring 2016 SAT, all students—particularly our juniors—will have had an October exposure to the exam that is a good snapshot of what can be expected on the SAT."

Leander ISD also aims to embed the SAT's test structure and format into coursework at the high school level, Brittain said.

"In addition to the work going on in our classrooms, we do offer mock or practice SAT and ACT assessments at all of our high school campuses," she said. "These opportunities are great to work on endurance for these 3.5-hour plus exams ... which is hard to replicate in the 90-minute classroom setting."

The biggest challenge in preparing students for the new test will likely be communicating what the changes could mean for them, Salazar-Zamora said. Students will need to understand

what the return to the 1600-point scale means and how they should decide whether to take the SAT's now-optional essay portion. Students hoping to enter writing-intensive fields should consider taking the essay portion, she said.

College Board announced the SAT redesign in 2013 and said the new test will focus on the core knowledge and skills that are shown to be the most important to prepare students for college and career.


Less than half of the students who take the SAT are college-ready, according to the College Board website.

College Board also announced it will be transparent in order to take the mystery out of the exam, providing a full SAT blueprint before the first administering of the test in spring 2016.



Some Leander residents may find services and stores closer to home after The Shops at Crystal Falls shopping center opens in the fall at the southeast corner of Crystal Falls Parkway and the newly expanded North Lakeline Boulevard.

The shopping center sits on about 5 acres and includes two buildings. Property broker Evan Dyer with developer Hunington Properties Inc. said the corner's main strip center will include Crystal Falls Vision Center, Jack Brown Cleaners, The UPS Store, On Q Day Spa, On the Rocks Wine & Spirits, Crystal Lake Dental, and Freedom Orthodontics. Two spaces are vacant; Dyer said he hopes at least one restaurant will join the plaza. Completion of the 19,240-square-foot

strip center was postponed because rain delayed landscape work, and in early August, Hunington obtained its cer-

tificate of occupancy for the suites, Dyer said. In an adjacent standalone building, Driver's Edge Auto Repair opened in early July.

"You've got higherend homes [in Crystal Falls] than what

would be traditional in Leander," he said. "We want to bring a higher level of service to Leander in that area."

The developer also owns a 3.4-acre site northeast of the Crystal Falls and Lakeline intersection. Dyer said several businesses have expressed interest in that property that is zoned for general retail, which can include restaurants or shops. Dyer said the developer may build another shopping center on the site.

Hunington is also planning shopping centers on Parmer Lane in Austin and on Greenlawn Boulevard in Round Rock. The Shops at Crystal Falls is the developer's first project in Leander, Dyer said.

Dyer said Hunington bought the two Leander properties in spring 2012 after Randalls announced its interest in building a store southwest of the new intersec-

> tion. The new grocery store is expected to open in time for holiday shopping in 2015.

The store will include at least 59,000 square feet and anchor a shopping center of buildings that total about 23,000 more square feet, according to a

development agreement signed by Randalls and the city of Leander on Sept. 27, 2012.

According to the agreement, Randalls must open the shopping center within two years of the completion of Lakeline Boulevard's extension to the Mason Hills subdivision. That portion of North Lakeline Boulevard—funded by Williamson County and homebuilder KB Home opened in February.

The Lakeline extension to Old FM 2243 will be completed by December. The new road and Randalls should encourage more traffic on the west side of Leander, Leander City Manager Kent Cagle said.

"Randalls will be submitting [construction] plans in the next two or three months," Cagle said.

On July 17, Leander City Council approved Randalls' request to transfer the property development agreement to the retailer's site developer, Property Development Centers LLC. That means Randalls is preparing to start construction soon, Leander Mayor Chris Fielder said.

"It's something we've been waiting on for a long time," Fielder said.

Cagle said Randalls and other new shops will be convenient for nearby residents.

"It's going to be a great amenity for those neighborhoods in that area [whose residents] have been traveling a pretty good distance for those services," Cagle said. "But since we're predominantly residential, we definitely welcome high-end commercial development."

WilCo prioritizes affordable housing

Changes give Habitat for Humanity additional funding for land

Williamson County commissioners voted June 3 to make access to affordable housing in the county a high priority, a step that allows organizations such as Habitat for Humanity the ability to receive funding from the county's Community Development Block Grant.

The CDBG is a federal grant distributed by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, or HUD. The county received \$1.25 million in CDBG funding, which will be used to pay for projects for the 2014–15 fiscal year beginning Oct. 1, said Sally Bardwell, Williamson County community grants coordinator. The county typically receives the same amount in CDBG funding annually, she said.

The commissioners' vote updated the county's consolidated plan, which serves as a guide for how the CDBG's funding will be distributed through 2018.

HUD data indicates the number and percentage of renters and homeowners who may be subject to housing problems related to housing needs and defined income limits. It showed that the current recession has increased the number of households experiencing housing affordability problems.

Williamson County officials used HUD's information to assess the affordability of the area's rental units and single-family homes based on demographic, economic and housing criteria.

"We obviously ... have to have more affordable housing," said Nikki Brennan, executive director of the Georgetown Housing Authority. "I think [the need is] pretty much all over Williamson County."

In Williamson County more than 500 people are on the public housing waiting list, and more than 600 are waiting to receive assistance through the housing choice voucher program.

Prioritization of affordable housing means CDBG funds will go to efforts

that expand the supply and improve the condition of affordable and lower-income housing as well as the activities that leverage public and private resources.

In accordance with this, Commissioner Valerie Covey motioned to reallocate \$100,000 of CDBG funding for city of Georgetown projects to Habitat for Humanity of Williamson County projects throughout the county.

"[Habitat is] in the process of looking at different areas to continue what they do, and I really support them a lot because it's sweat equity and it gets properties that are just sitting there—some of which need to be cleaned up—back on the tax roll," Covey said.

Covey said she felt it was important for Habitat to have access to the money in case land becomes available.

Habitat is building homes throughout Williamson County, said Debbie Hoffman, Habitat for Humanity of Williamson County executive director.

"We finished building on our last lot in Round Rock on June 8," Hoffman said. "The family purchased the home from us at zero percent interest on June 11."

The organization has a handful of anticipated projects that would continue into early 2015. The next house scheduled to be built is in Jarrell, and construction began in July, Hoffman said.

"From there we will be building in Leander and Taylor over the next 12 months," she said. "In addition to the new construction homes mentioned, we are completing repairs on homes owned by families whose income is at 50 percent or below the median income for Williamson County."

Habitat also has three other undeveloped lots on Moonglow Drive in Leander; however, not all of its land comes from county funding.

"We obtain land through city partnerships, individuals and other funds," Hoffman said. "We have plans to build two

more houses in Leander before June 2015. Right now we are raising funds for the second of the two scheduled."

She said the first of these homes is scheduled to be built in the fall, and the second will be built in early spring.

Solutions

Affordable housing is defined as shelter costing lower-income residents no more than 30 percent of their household income—either to rent or the mortgage, taxes and homeowners insurance on a home, Brennan said.

Each year a fair market rent, or FMR, is published by HUD to establish an area's average rent, she said. In Williamson County and the Austin area the FMR for a one-bedroom apartment is \$853, which means a household must earn an hourly income of \$16.41 to afford the apartment, according to HUD.

"Our backbone of the community as far as retail workers, construction workers and even teachers are not making this kind of money," Brennan said.

Area cities are taking different approaches to developing an affordable housing solution. Leander, for example, is turning to transportation.

"Our number one way of addressing

affordability in the future will be having housing built around the rail station because it will have easy access to public transport, which is going to be a much more sustainable way of addressing affordability" City Councilman Dave Siebold said.

Siebold said Leander's plan helps give people the option to live in a suburban area while maintaining a job in Austin. By living near public transportation hubs, the option of eliminating a car expense becomes available.

"That's a monthly expense that you don't have, and that money can go to other things," he said.

Although Cedar Park does not have lowincome housing locations or Habitat homes, the city does try to maintain a percentage of residences as affordable housing.

"Cedar Park has a wide variety of home prices within the community," Cedar Park Director of Community Affairs Katherine Woerner said. "Approximately 24 percent of homes in Cedar Park are valued at \$149,000 or less, which provides opportunity for homebuyers at all income levels."

Woerner said the median home value in Cedar Park is \$187,400 and the city does have multiple apartment complexes with income-sensitive units.





Council OKs Hero Way office park

LEANDER A 42-acre office park could be built north of Hero Way after Leander City Council on Aug. 8 approved rezoning the site from interim single-family rural use to heavy commercial.

The collection of five properties is located between CR 270 and Palmera Ridge, a planned residential development on the site of the former Kittie Hill Airport. Zoning change applicant Ryan Betz, manager of commercial real estate firm Betz Co., said he believed the office park would take residents' needs into account.

A property that is zoned heavy commercial can include office space, storage facilities, lumber yards, indoor manufacturing, warehouses and wrecker impoundment.

"We'll be bringing a quality development that will fit a need for jobs in the city," Betz said.


Homeowners southwest of Hero Way and CR 270 spoke against the rezoning Aug. 8. City Council members at first voted to postpone the rezoning vote after Betz asked for more time to do further research. After a meeting recess, City Council returned to the item and unanimously approved the rezoning, with conditions that the site cannot be used for outdoor entertainment or businesses such as pawn shops or same-day loan establishments.

Councilwoman Kirsten Lynch said Betz's offer to comply with the restrictions could help ease neighbors' concerns.

Leander residents including Andrew Lewis said the rezoning would overwhelm Hero Way with traffic.

"There's a lot more traffic, and there's a lot of speeding," Lewis said. "If you change it to [heavy commercial zoning], it wouldn't

Charles Schwab office incentive approved

TRAVIS COUNTY Commissioners Court approved an economic incentive agreement with Charles Schwab Corp. during its Aug. 5 meeting.

The court approved the agreement 4-1 with Commissioner Ron Davis opposed.

The county stands to earn \$3.3 million to \$3.6 million in taxes from the agreement over 10 years.

Charles Schwab announced plans to build a 250,000 to 300,000-square-foot regional office at 2309 Gracy Farms, a 50-acre site in North Austin.

The company would invest \$196.7 million, maintain 1,683 jobs and create 823 new jobs, according to the agreement.

The average employee salary would be \$79,602, the median salary would be \$69,032 and the minimum wage would be \$15 per hour. The company would offer health benefits and 401(k) programs to employees, among other benefits.

Katie Petersen Gipson, Travis County senior planning and budget analyst, said the investment would be split in two parts. Charles Schwab would invest \$111.7 million by the end of 2016 and \$56.9 million by the end of 2023.

In exchange for meeting the agreed upon benchmarks, Travis County will offer a 48.5 percent rebate on property taxes. The company could qualify for an additional 3 percent rebate for constructing the new facility to eco-friendly building standards.

The county has a recapture provision to recover funds from the last five years of the agreement if Charles Schwab does not meet benchmarks by the end of the term.

During the Aug. 5 meeting, some speakers took issue with offering incentives to a wealthy company and questioned whether local residents would benefit from the new jobs.

Others endorsed the agreement as a way to encourage local job and economic growth.

Speakers on both sides of the issue said Charles Schwab should want to come to Austin without an incentive.

Commissioner Gerald Daugherty said Travis County "is in the incentives game" because many areas want to attract companies like Charles Schwab.

Commissioner Margaret Gomez said she would support the agreement but felt a larger discussion about housing affordability needs to take place.

City mulls 2014–15 budget

CEDAR PARK On Aug. 14, City Council introduced the city's proposed 2014–15 budget and tax rate.

Residents can share feedback about the proposed budget and property tax rate during public hearings on Aug. 28 and Sept. 4. City Council plans to vote on the budget Sept. 16.

During a meeting July 31, department directors and City Council discussed the tax rate, projected budget revenue and expenses.

Director of Finance Joseph Gonzales said growth and higher property value appraisals led to a lower proposed property tax rate—down from the current \$0.4925 to \$0.485 per \$100 of valuation in 2015.

Gonzales said his department expects the city's 2014–15 revenue to reach about \$39.35 million, \$3.7 million higher than 2013–14 revenue. The city's Finance Department expects to spend about \$39.33 million from the city's general fund, which is supported by the city's tax rate, he said.

The budget's general fund expenses were similar to those in the 2013–14 budget. The city plans to spend about 51 percent of the general fund on public safety and 16 percent on public works, leaving about 33 percent for culture and recreation, support services and city administration.

nary 2014–15 budget Aug. 5 that is larger than the 2013–14 budget and includes significant cost increases to hire additional personnel.

At the scheduled court session, commissioners approved proposed budget amounts of about \$146.1 million for the general fund, \$22.1 million for the road and bridge fund, and \$74.6 million for the debt service fund.

Budget Officer Ashley Koenig said her department received requests for 139 positions for the 2014–15 fiscal year, compared with 80 positions requested in 2013–14.

"That's probably the biggest task with respect to the budget," she said. "We look at the job description, the salary requested and what the benefit is to the county as far as recommending that position."

In the proposed general fund, county departments requested filling 123 full-time-equivalent positions totaling \$7.06 million. Of those, the budget office recommended funding 25, or about 20 percent of the

requests, which total \$1.5 million.

Staff requested that eight full-time-equivalent positions totaling \$386,000 be funded through the road and bridge portion of the county budget. However, money for only one of those jobs totaling \$79,000 annually was recommended by the budget office.

Senate Bill 1611, or the Michael Morton Act, led to four additional personnel requests.

"... Basically prosecutors and law enforcement agencies are required to turn over all evidence on defendants accused of crime," Koenig said. "In addition to turning that over, all of the evidence must be documented."

In order to comply with this, staff requested transitioning part-time positions, including a digital evidence technician in the county attorney's office, a discovery clerk in the district attorney's office, an evidence technician in the sheriff's office, and an assistant warehouse coordinator in records management and preservation, into full-time positions.

Commissioners will adopt the 2014–15 budget Aug. 26.





ACC offers employers on-site continuing education

By Emilie Lutostanski

In early 2013, CEO Ed Trevis recognized a training need for the employees of his Cedar Park-based company, Corvalent, and he said he was surprised to learn about Austin Community College's on-site instruction offerings.

"The convenience of ACC coming to our site and teaching employees, that is something a lot of colleges don't do," Trevis said. "It helped us put more employees into training."

ACC's continuing education department works with employers in a variety of industries to develop employees' skills in technology, manufacturing, communication and more. Trevis said ACC instructors trained more than a dozen employees in Microsoft and other applications.

Don Tracy, ACC continuing education business operations and marketing director, said the college's continuing education department tailors curriculum to fit the company's needs.

"This part of the college is very flexible, and we focus on the needs of the business and the exact type of training and learning outcomes they desire," Tracy said. "We do it at their time and their place where at all possible. We even run classes for some clients in the middle of the night because that's when their employees are on shift."

Although Trevis said he paid ACC for Corvalent's employee training, about \$24 million per year is available for continuing education to businesses statewide through grants from the Texas Workforce Commission's Skills Development Fund. ACC and other community colleges and technical

schools throughout the state work with businesses to find gaps in employees' skills, build a curriculum to address the gap, and apply for TWC grant funding to pay for instruction.

'The Skills Development Fund program that's run by the TWC is a great opportunity for community colleges to access dollars to help support training for new and existing workers [as well as] build the training capacity of community colleges to do similar training with organizations around the state," Tracy said.

In fiscal year 2013, 60 applications for Skills Development Fund grants were submitted to TWC, and 51 were approved, including two in the capital area, according to the Skills Development Fund annual report.

Andres Alcantar, TWC chairman and commissioner representing the public, said TWC accepts most applications because companies understand the requirements of the grant.

"Generally when a company decides to commit, they have already done the due diligence, and the colleges and TWC staff assigned to the colleges know enough to provide guidance to really result in a successful grant application," Alcantar said. "Fifty-five percent of the project must be for technical occupations or training, and that is the best way to for us to ensure that the majority of the funds, as intended in the program, are being invested in a way that supports the high demand of occupational needs of industries. It's for individuals to acquire the skills that are current and indemand in an industry."



Concordia University Texas expands course options for nursing and adds online programs

In an effort to meet industry demands for higherqualified nurses, Concordia University Texas is expanding its nursing coursework options this fall, said Melinda Brasher, Concordia University Texas associate vice president for communication. The school is adding online and on-site Registered Nurse to Master of Science in Nursing certification programs, she said.

Currently nurses are required to complete a twoyear associate degree program to be eligible for an RN exam, she said. By enrolling in Concordia's new program, RNs who have an associate degree can gain both Bachelor of Science and master's degrees in nursing, she said.

"The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation is recommending that 80 percent of the registered nurse workforce have bachelor's-level degrees or higher by 2020," Brasher said. "Health care institutions are supporting this. We anticipate there will be demand to seek out higher levels of education in nursing."

She said Concordia's new nursing program is not typical of all universities, as there are only 11 similar programs available in the country. The online program offers a flexible schedule for working nurses, she said.

"Many health care institutions are already requiring associate's degree nurses to seek a bachelor's degree within five years," said Kathy Lauchner, Concordia University Texas director of nursing. "Programs like Concordia's Bachelor of Science in nursing and the new Master of Science in nursing are helping nurses meet that requirement as well as advance in their careers."

The added MSN degree will likely mean a significant increase in salary for the student after graduation, Brasher said.

The program is pending approval by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges, which governs the university's certifications, she said. Approval is expected prior to the start of classes, she said.

Enrollment in Concordia's nursing school has been at capacity every semester since the program opened in 2010, she said.

Increased online options

Two additional online programs will be offered to Concordia students beginning this fall—a two-year Master of Business Administration degree and a four-year Bachelor of Arts in criminal justice degree, Brasher said.

The MBA program has been offered on-site for the past two years, she said. The criminal justice program was offered previously and, by request, has been brought back as an online-only option, she said.

"There is market demand for online programs," Brasher said. "The [MBA and criminal justice] programs are viable in an online format and easily accessible."

She said all of Concordia's online programs provide students with an instructor and counselors in the same way as the programs function on campus. These courses also focus on the university's principles of developing Christian leaders and ethical learning, she said.

With the three new programs, Concordia offers 12 online degree or certification options, Brasher said.

ebra Dowden said she is a natural entrepreneur, but her husband. Bruce, is not.

"I worked 28 years at a job [purchasing for a mining company] that I didn't really like, so that kind of tells you how much of a risk-taker I am," he said.

After extensive research into business concepts that allowed the couple to help others while earning a living, the Dowdens quit their executive positions and moved from the Tyler area to open the 101 Mobility Austin franchise in Cedar Park in April 2012.

101 Mobility began selling franchises in 2008 and now has more than 80 locations throughout the country. The sales, service and installation business

provides mobility and accessibility equipment, including stair lifts, auto lifts, porch lifts, patient lifts, power wheelchairs, scooters and ramps to bypass stairs. Short and long-term rentals are also available.

101 Mobility gave the Dowdens an opportunity to improve mobility for disabled veterans and also help aging individuals, Debra said.

"Bruce has always been really connected with the elderly," Debra said. "He attracts them walking down the street. They'll pick him out and talk to him."

About 40 percent of the store's business is with the Department of Veterans Affairs, she said, while other jobs come from retail sales and referrals from home health

agencies. One agency introduced them to Loren Goodman, a woman who at age 25 developed transverse myelitis and was paralyzed from the neck down. She and her young sons moved in with her parents, and the challenges of mobility essentially

confined her to an upstairs bedroom.

"Bruce and Debra were like angels sent to our family," Goodman said. "I never thought I would be able on a regular basis to be out of the house again. They made a tremendous impact on my life."



Floyd Piano Company

Leander shop owner's family has long history servicing and selling pianos

loyd Piano Company owner David Floyd said he has been around pianos most of his life. But while he tickled the ivories as a music student starting at the age of 5 in suburban Houston, Floyd said he discovered his true passion was working on the instruments to ensure perfect harmony.

Floyd's grandmother Joyce Cochran was the Houston-area district manager for the San Francisco-based piano retailer Sherman Clay & Co. in the early '80s when Floyd's mother, Deborah, decided to start a business selling Yamaha pianos.

The business thrived in Houston and was able to add a restoration shop. By the late '90s, the company opened a retail space in Stafford. Eventually Floyd's family launched a successful music school—the Fort Bend Music Center—that offers private instruction for a range of instruments to music students in the Southwest Houston area.

As a teenager Floyd said he found his niche in the restoration side of the business. At first he only took on small jobs, but in time, he learned to rebuild a full range of piano brands—from Steinway to Baldwin to Yamaha.

"Basically, I've been working on pianos since my mom decided not to pay for a babysitter," Floyd said.

Two years ago, Floyd and his wife, Lori, moved to Austin. Floyd worked for Strait Music Co. and Steinway Piano Gallery, but in October he decided to launch his own restoration and sales business. Floyd said he chose Leander for its friendly small business climate and proximity to potential clients who live throughout Williamson County.

"I'm service-based—I wanted a nice, large shop with all the fixin's to where we can do any kind of a job," Floyd said.

"I really like to get my hands dirty and really like to get into [the] work."

Floyd has been working on clients' instruments in his shop since last fall, but his inventory of Baldwin grand and Vertical pianos arrived in June.

"I chose Baldwin and Hallet Davis because they're complementary lines but they're not very expensive. Hallet Davis is a line that we're pretty proud to have, but Baldwin is our flagship line," Floyd said.

For Floyd, the most important aspect of a purchase is service after the sale. Floyd and his carpenter, Kyle Bass, are committed to perfection, Floyd said.

"When we unbox a piano, we fully prep it," Floyd said. "We go through and we make sure all the keys work properly. There's about 23 moving parts per each key on a piano, times 88 [keys]. So you've got to make sure all those moving parts work in concert with each other. That's what turns our pianos into instruments."

Bass said although he has only worked with Floyd for a few months, he is impressed by Floyd's attention to detail.

"We don't send anything back [to the customer] without it being perfect," Bass said. "I've never worked for anyone like that—that no matter what it is, it's gotta be right. It's gotta go out the door perfect."

Floyd Piano Company offers a range of services to help keep pianos at their peak performance level, including piano tuning and voicing as well as restoration projects on pianos in need of rebuilding or repair.

Floyd said the combination of quality inventory and personal service sets his business apart from the competition.

"There are some really good piano shops in Austin, but they don't have a floor for sales. There are some really good sales departments here in Austin but they don't have a shop," Floyd said. "We offer both."

Installing player systems

Floyd Piano Company specializes in servicing and installing player systems such as Piano Disc, QRS and Disklavier. Player systems have come a long way since the days of player pianos in the late 19th century, owner David Floyd said. Modern systems can be remotely operated via iPad, are capable of a range of expression and can be installed on almost any piano.

Keys for Kids

Floyd said he is working on creating a piano donation program for promising young musicians who can't afford to pay for a new piano. Floyd said the program will accept and tune donated pianos to deliver to students who are selected by area instructors. Piano teachers who are interested in participating in Keys for Kids can call Floyd for additional details.

Grand opening sale

Floyd Piano Company plans to have a grand opening sale during store hours Aug. 29 and 30. Floyd said all showroom pianos will be on sale with some as much as 45 percent off the retail price, and the store will also offer discounts on services through coupons.

Tony C's Pizza | Wine Bar

Restaurateur uses old-world technology for classic New York style pizza in Avery Ranch

he secret to a perfectly charred pizza crust with caramelized toppings, according to restaurateur Tony Ciola, is the oven.

Tony uses a hearthstone oven that burns anthracite coal at nearly 1,000 degrees at Tony C's Pizza | Wine Bar, which has locations in Avery Ranch and Bee Cave. Tony opened the Bee Cave restaurant in 2008 with the help of his father and business partner, Dan. Tony said the family's history in restaurants goes back six decades and owes its start to his grandfather's stint as a pitcher for the Philadelphia Athletics.

"My family first got in the restaurant business in 1949 in Virginia Beach. My [great] uncle Dominick started his restaurant on a loan he borrowed from my grandfather [Louis] with the money he made playing Major League Baseball," Tony said. "That restaurant was open for 60 years."

Tony worked for his dad's restaurant, Ciola's, which was open in Lakeway for about 10 years, before opening the Bee Cave location. Tony launched Tony C's in Avery Ranch in late 2012 with business partner Creed Ford IV.

"We actually started looking at the area about four years ago," Tony said. "We knew it was a great neighborhood—very similar to Lakeway but with more people."

Tony said the idea to go with a coal-fired

oven was the result of a trip he and Ford took to New York City at the suggestion of Tony's father. In the Big Apple the pair visited numerous pizza restaurants including Lombardi's, the first pizzeria in the United States.

"Creed and I tried like 20 pizza places in New York, and after going to Lombardi's, we were sold on that idea," Tony said, referring to coal-fired pizza. "We're the first in Austin to do a coal-fired oven."

The restaurant offers specialty pizzas such as prosciutto and goat cheese, fig and honey, or arugula pesto with roasted chicken and Kalamata olives. For lighter fare. Tony C's offers salads such as a beet and arugula bowl served with candied walnuts and goat cheese fritters, topped with a grapefruit vinaigrette. Seafood lovers can try the stacked ahi bowl, which is served with sesame-seared tuna, stacked crispy wontons, mangoes and avocado with a sesame ginger vinaigrette.

Tony C's offers weekday happy hour specials from 3-7 p.m. including a \$3 discount on appetizers; \$1 discount on bottled beer; and \$2 off draft beer, Bellini cocktails and wine by the glass.

"A lot of our staff members moved here when we opened and really enjoy the area," Tony said. "We've also hired a lot of local help as well. They're all excited to have new options come in the neighborhood."

"We've done some unique menus in the past; pretty much anything you see on our regular menu, we can also do for catering," McElveen

The restaurant requires 24 to 48 hours notice for catering orders with at a minimum of 10 people and has a catering menu with prices

Owners offer fresh international drinks

ric and Wendy Neat said they want to make Roasters Coffee Cafe more than a local coffee shop.

Since the couple reopened the Little Elm Trail business in April 2013, they have offered space for individuals to work or relax, and for groups to meet and knit or hold Bible studies.

"We both have a passion for coffee and for customer service and serving people," Eric said.

Wendy said she views the shop as a comfortable community outreach.

"It's more of a ministry to me; it's kind of a home away from home," she said.



Austin Steam Train Association

Group hires new director and plans museum

n July, the Cedar Park-based Austin Steam Train Association hired new executive director Lil Serafine to help its train-centered tourism stay on track.

The ASTA was founded in 1989 and offers train rides that include murder mystery performances, costume parties and trips to Bertram and Burnet that can include tours of historic downtowns. A 15-member board of directors, seven paid staffers and a crew of volunteers keep the organization running, Community Outreach Coordinator Cody Eastman said.

Serafine began work at the organization July 1. She has about 25 years of experience with nonprofit groups throughout the U.S., including Recordings for the Blind and Dyslexic—now named Learning Ally—and Grace After Fire, a group that assists female veterans.

"I was born in Chattanooga, and my first [train] experience as a child was on the [Chattanooga] train," Serafine said.

Serafine said she rode the Austin Steam Train years before she learned in May of the newly open executive director position. After riding the train a second time to Burnet, Serafine said she found a new appreciation for the tourism experience and the age diversity among train riders.

Older residents treasure the days when passenger trains were still common in Central Texas, she said, and many children enjoy witnessing what seems like a fantasy-world vehicle brought to life.

"This morning I was taking a tour with a group of moms and their little toddlers who were just having a thrill being on the train," Serafine said.

Future museum

In March the ASTA moved to a new office space within the Railyard Shopping

Center that would allow more room for a museum, Eastman said. Staffers and volunteers said they are not sure when the museum would open.

"We've always wanted to do something like this [museum]," Eastman said. "Before, our office was the museum."

Staffers need more funds and more time to plan a quality attraction, he said.

Organizers hope the museum can have free admission and oversight by volunteers who know and love the history of Central Texas railroads. Eastman said volunteers have donated items from Texas railroad history to the association such as vintage engineering equipment, 1940s train calendar pages, original passenger train pamphlets and a Southern Pacific Co. clock that dates to the 1950s.

Volunteers said they also hope to raise money to restore the ASTA's original 1916 Southern Pacific 786 steam engine, which was taken out of service in 1999 when inspectors found a crack in the boiler. Since then the train has been pulled by a 1960 Alco diesel locomotive. Work to repair and restore the steam engine has taken longer than the group expected, Eastman said.

"It would be a huge hit for us to make the restoration by 2016," he said.

Serafine said the organization hopes to use the repaired engine for train rides.

Meanwhile, staffers and volunteers will continue to promote the association, especially on social media, Eastman said.

"We want to keep growing," he said. "We're going to introduce a pumpkin patch ride here in October. ... We want to be sure to give people the best experience that we can and that they walk away knowing that they've been treated like family."

Real estate growth trending westward

LAKE TRAVIS For the first time in history, in 2013 the Austin metro area experienced more construction starts on homes than San Antonio. A lot of that growth is being directed at the north and west parts of the Austin area, said Madison Inselmann, regional director of Metrostudy Austin, a company that tracks housing market information.

The Lake Travis area—stretching from River Place and Westlake west to Spicewood—has prepared for major growth the past two years, according to statistics provided by Metrostudy. Total housing starts—privately owned new houses on which construction has begun—in the first quarter of 2013 increased by 47.9 percent compared with the first quarter of 2012. The numbers increased an additional 4.8 percent year-over-year for the first quarter of 2014, resulting in 1,123 new housing starts.

"Not everyone who moves [to the Austin area] is going to buy a home, but the numbers say there is still a demand for [new home builds]," Inselmann said.

Laura Mitchell, president of the Lake

Travis Chamber of Commerce, credits the recent growth in the region west of Austin to Lake Travis ISD's reputation as a top-performing district.

"Low lake levels have not seemed to affect the growth rate of development," Mitchell said. "While the lake is one of the primary reasons people are moving here, it is not the only reason."

Lakeway City Manager
Steve Jones said the city will
probably see a decline in new
housing permits as a result of
residential areas being built out.

"However, I don't see a slowdown in the area in general," Jones said. "We've got a lot of homes in the \$350,000 to \$400,000 price range, which seems to be in high demand."

Roughly 80 percent of the housing starts during the first quarter of 2014 for the Lakeway area are priced at \$300,000 and above, according to Metrostudy. Nearly 15



percent are above \$500,000.

About 60 percent of the new home construction in the Austin metro area takes place at least 15 miles away from downtown, Inselmann said.

"Almost 90 percent of the growth in Dripping Springs has been on the eastern border," Inselmann said. "You could make a pretty good comparison of Dripping Springs to Lakeway about 15 years ago." Full story by Leslee Bassman and Kyle Webb

Hope Alliance

ROUND ROCK According to studies from the World Health Organization, one out of every three women in the world will be a victim of domestic violence in her lifetime. In Williamson County, help comes in the form of Hope Alliance, a nonprofit that has helped domestic violence and sexual assault victims since 1984.

Hope Alliance Development Director Melinda Biggs and Executive Director Patty Conner said that rather than being depressing and disheartening, the work is fulfilling and inspiring.

"It's amazing watching the resiliency of the clients, seeing them thrive and change and realize they are not alone," Biggs said. "Seeing the changes people can make is incredible."

Hope Alliance offers counseling and support groups for its clients. The nonprofit has a legal advocate on staff who helps survivors apply for protective orders and crime victim compensation funds. Hope Alliance also has a violence prevention program that is active throughout Williamson County's schools.

Prime Focus Forensics

HUTTO In the 1980s, C.M. "Mike" Adams began his career in digital forensics when the profession was much more obscure and known only to insiders as "data recovery."

Now just about everyone has a potential computer risk in the palm of their hand in the form of their cell phone, said Adams, who owns Hutto-based digital security firm Prime Focus Forensics. Adams acts as a digital detective, spotting gaps in cyber security for private clients and businesses. It is also Adams' job to glean forensic evidence from electronic devices—including smartphones—for private customers and courts.

"Most people think they are phones, but they are really computers with phone capability," Adams said.

As smartphones become more commonplace, so does the danger of digital security breaches. Private investigators often call Adams, who is a certified private investigator himself, about cases in which spyware—malicious, hidden monitoring programs loaded onto an electronic device without the owner's knowledge—has been

installed on someone's cell phone.

"It's nefarious stuff," Adams said. "If somebody can get cell phone spyware on your phone, they own your phone just like you do."

Adams also advises private businesses on cyber security. Whenever he visits a company's offices, he finds many digital hazards, particularly in rooms that house network supplies such as routers and servers. A business's most valuable information flows through devices in those rooms, which are often largely ignored or misused, he said. Businesses will often have trashcans and janitorial supplies in their server rooms, Adams said. Full story by JJ Velasquez



Garbo's

NORTHWEST AUSTIN Heidi Garbo opened her first restaurant, Garbo's, on July 8 out of necessity.

Her food truck, Garbo's Lobster Truck, had experienced so much growth since its opening in March 2013 that she had to buy a second truck to handle demand for catering, rentals and special events as well as her regular route throughout Austin. The Wells Brancharea restaurant will further help Garbo grow her business, she said.

Fresh lobster, clams and diver scallops are flown in from her family's business in Maine, but Garbo's also uses seafood from the Gulf, including black drum fish and shrimp. Other seafood on the menu includes oysters and crab. Because the price of seafood fluctuates, Garbo said she plans to offer a variety of specials.

"We thoroughly believe in specials," she said. "We get bored and like to try new things."

She hired chef Mateo Vannucci, a native of Arkansas who has never visited New England. However, Garbo said he brings his own ideas to the table of what

Clay Pit

AUSTIN Upon opening the wooden door of the Clay Pit, aromas and the sound of finger cymbals fill the air.

The restaurant, which specializes in traditional and contemporary Indian cuisine, has been located on Guadalupe Street since 1998.

"Even though you're in Texas, we've had folks from the U.K., folks from India, folks from all over the world where there is some really high-quality Indian cuisine come here and not only be pleasantly surprised that there's good Indian food in Austin, but that it's actually great," Clay Pit Manager Graeme Fickling said. "It exceeds what they might have ever had before."

The original intent of the restaurant, Fickling said, was to bring Indian food into the mainstream, just as Italian and Mexican food have been able to break their way into daily American life. program to see how things went, because our ordinances do not permit mobile food vendors to set up on-site somewhere," said Brad Wiseman, Round Rock Planning and Development Services director. "It didn't seem to be that successful in terms of popularity. ... It was ultimately decided that it wasn't something the City Council wanted to continue. That pilot program expired, and we did not adapt or change any of our ordinances to pursue mobile food vendors in Round Rock."

As in Round Rock, Cedar Park City Council could opt to allow mobile food vendors and locations on a limited basis. Cedar Park resident Levi Lambert has met with city staffers since 2013 to try to structure a 2-acre food trailer park as a planned use development on the east side of Parmer Lane near FM 1431.

Plans for the proposed Lambert's Foodapalooza food trailer park include eight food trucks owned by Lambert but serving different cuisines; a permanent commercial kitchen, restrooms and covered pavilions; an outdoor movie screen; and a shaded playscape.

Lambert said he hopes to open the park by spring after completing the land purchase from the neighboring church, garnering support from additional investors and establishing utilities at the site.

"How the food trucks behave in connection with the on-site commissary—that hasn't been done by anyone," Lambert said. "It's what makes ours so much different from any other food trailer park out there. I want it to be a family attraction and a destination."

During the July 10 council meeting, Cedar Park Planning Manager Amy Link offered another option: City Council could amend the existing ordinance regarding snow cone stands to include a provision for food trailers.

"A permit would be required with an annual renewal so you would know who's in town. We would also require that the

applicable county permits be obtained," Link said. "We would look at prohibiting these types of mobile food vendors in residential districts if they plan on staying for a long period of time."

Varying opinions

After discussion at the meeting, Councilman Corbin Van Arsdale solicited feedback about food trailers in the city from Cedar Park residents.

"Several people mentioned having set locations that are just for food trailers. Other people mentioned that they didn't have a problem with them being next to brick-and-mortar places, but they didn't want to create more problems for pedestrians and cars," Van Arsdale said. "The people who were against it were passionately against it, and they had different reasons. One I kept hearing was, 'I don't want to be like Austin."

Cedar Park resident Mike McCloskey said just because adjacent cities have food trailers does not mean they are suitable for Cedar Park.

> "I am very concerned for whether it is fair to the brick-and-mortar restaurants that have made a significant long-

term investment in the community and already have to compete with other restaurants under equal terms," he said. "To allow someone to bring a food trailer to the city without community ties and without the same regulations as other restaurants should be treated with concern."

Bradford said he thinks food trailers in Cedar Park would add charm and diversity.

"I think that this could spawn a whole variety of types of business that could [operate in] this town versus your chain restaurants," he said. "We knew there was some evolution happening as far as having the food trucks out here. We thought [opening a commercial kitchen] was a good opportunity to be out here before that happens rather than being reactive."

More food choices

In July the Bradfords opened Korner Kitchen on South Bell Boulevard in Cedar Park. The commercial kitchen offers to-go meals cooked by Mai Lan and rentable space for independent chefs, caterers, chocolatiers, wholesale food preparers and food trailer operators.



GEORGETOWN

The city allows food trailers to operate in certain zoning districts such as general commercial and industrial, among others. Georgetown Senior Planner Mike Elabarger said. Individual food vendors must be permitted through the Williamson County and Cities Health District and must obtain a 90-day temporary use permit from the city.

Though mobile food vendors can apply to operate on sites throughout the city, staffers worked with the developers of the San Gabriel Food Park to establish parking and safety guidelines that allow multiple food trailers to operate in one place, Elabarger said. The food trailer court, which is the first inside the Georgetown city limits, received clearance to operate July 1.

Cedar Park city staffers are gathering information from other cities about how to regulate mobile food vendors. Currently no ordinances exist that specifically address the long-term operation of food trailers in the city. Nearby communities have varying ways of regulating mobile food vendors and food

LEANDER

The city's ordinances address only peddlers and temporary food vendors that visit sites for a short time, but no provisions exist for long-term food trailers. Planning and Development Director Tom Yantis said earlier this year a resident expressed interest in opening a food trailer park in Old Town, so staffers began developing a citywide ordinance that would address restrooms, parking and more. However the applicant withdrew the request to open a food trailer court.

The city allows food trailers to operate in commercial zoning districts. They are required to be permitted by Williamson County as well as the Hutto Police Department.

Food trailers are limited in the city's historic district downtown. The historic preservation commission and City Council established one lot downtown where mobile vendors may operate. City Council also approved an agreement in July 2013 that allowed a company to operate up to eight food trailers downtown. However. the agreement fell through because of issues between the company and a neighboring landowner.



Ordinances only allow peddlers such as ice cream trucks which can stop on the

roadside for a maximum of 15 minutes to sell merchandise, and seasonal vendors such as snow cone stands, which can be set up for 30-60 days, or sometimes longer if parked next to a big-box retailer.

CEDAR PARK

ROUND ROCK

In September 2012, Round Rock City Council agreed to a one-year pilot program that created a downtown food trailer park. The development agreement

between the city and Starcorp Inc. effectively lifted the ban on permanent mobile food vendors within the city but allowed only the Round Rock Food Trailer Park to operate.

By the end of the first year of operation, the popularity of the food trailer park diminished, said Brad Wiseman, Round Rock Planning and Development Services director. City Council chose not to renew the development agreement in fall 2013.

"That pilot program expired, and we did not adapt or change any of our ordinances to pursue mobile food vendors in Round Rock," Wiseman said.

Since then no other companies or individuals have submitted plans to the city for a food trailer park, he said.

PFLUGERVILLE

The city does not allow food trailers in the city, Pflugerville Public Information Officer Terri Waggoner said. However city staffers are working to update the citv's unified development code and are considering adding provisions that would regulate mobile food vendors.

Two food trailer courts, the Pflugerville Pfood Ranch and La Placita, opened outside the city limits in 2013. Pflugerville Pfood Ranch is closed. La Placita's beer garden is available to rent for events at which food trailers can operate.

providing space for local food vendors while awaiting more explicit guidelines for food trailers from the city.

"The reason we opened this up is because we want to be food truck owners and also open it up to other small businesses," he said.

With the exception of certain edibles that fall under the Texas Cottage Food Law, local food vendors must prepare their products in a commercial kitchen according to Williamson County and Cities Health District standards.

In April, Karen Luna opened Andy said Korner Kitchen is Luna's Kitchen, a restaurant that

offers daily breakfast and lunch specials, customized meals, and a commercial kitchen that can be rented by personal chefs, candy makers, mobile food vendors and others. Luna said some of the individuals who rent space at Luna's Kitchen are entrepreneurs moving toward legitimizing their home-based food operations. They help offer more variety for consumers, she said.


Some critics say the addition of food trucks in Cedar Park will drive down business for existing brick-and-mortar restaurants. But Luna said commercial kitchens,

food trailers and restaurants can all coexist in Cedar Park.

There is enough of a market out there for everyone. Everybody eats," she said. "My food, I know not everybody is going to like it. So if there is something else people can choose from, that's better for the customer. And that's what I want to do-give people lots of options."

citizen volunteers to a Comprehensive Plan Update Committee. They helped assemble the city's 2009 Comprehensive Plan that included an early and informal version of the land-use map.

City Council joined P&Z on March 18 to review the 2009 map and modify the development nodes before officially

adopting the land-use plan. After council's vote the plan went into effect immediately.

> "This will be a help with

the [2014] comprehensive plan," Place 2 Councilwoman Kirsten Lynch said.

Without a land-use plan, the city may unintentionally invite scattershot development along arterial roadways, Yantis said.

"It's not good for the commercial developments themselves to be so spread out because there's a lot of synergy that you get when you have compatible uses close to each other," he said. "It helps the shopping center thrive if it has a concentration of traffic generators."

Council members can amend the plan, and existing areas that overlap with the map's commercial junctions can keep their zoning unless City Council approves an area redevelopment plan, P&Z Vice Chairwoman Michelle Stephenson said.

"If it's currently zoned residential, it will stay," she said. "It doesn't have to change." Yantis said the map aids smart growth.

"We'll end up having fewer [retail] locations but more successful projects," he said. "A plan like this helps to create better, more vibrant places."

Leander's new land-use plan would designate locations for three different types of development sectors, or nodestown centers, community centers and neighborhood centers.

Many of the city's intersections are being developed as community and neighborhood centers that can include small- to medium-size shopping plazas and restaurants. City planners want also to promote industrial sectors, and are planning large-scale commercial growth in town center nodes located at the intersections of major thoroughfares, said Tom Yantis, Leander director of Development Services.

Of the city's five planned town center intersections, only onethe junction of US 183 and Old FM 2243—already includes a large shopping center.

Yantis said commercial brokers are showing high interest in undeveloped sites at the intersections of Hwy. 29 and Ronald Reagan Boulevard, Crystal Falls Parkway and Toll 183A, and Hero Way and Toll 183A. A planned town center at Hero Way and Ronald Reagan cannot attract much business until the Palmera Ridge subdivision developer has installed new utility lines, Yantis said.

"Within the next year or two we'll probably have [development] going on in all of these nodes." he said.
